Running from the house after the shooting, Kriselmeyer was surrounded by neighbors, who beat him down. He escaped, but was again surrounded. A policeman finally reached his side and, revolver in hand, held the mob back until aid was secured. The crowd followed, however, until the prisoner had been safely locked up.





A story comes from Washington anent the plaint of the president of the United States against a newspaper reporter, which we are loth to believe. but which, unfortunately, seems to be true. It appears that Senator Scott of West Virginia called on President Roosevelt one day and received a message from him to wait a few moments. The senator waited in the antechamber. The few minutes passed and a few more until he had waited more than half an hour. Meanwhile other callers were shown into the sanctum sanctorum of the chief executive, men whom Senator Scott thought of no greater consequence than himself. So, finally, he thought he had waited long

He was followed by a White House attache, who called to him, "The president wants to see you now, senator. "I haven't got time now."

It is understood he wanted the reporter removed as a warning to all reporters that they must be mighty careful about the dignity of the president of the United States,

This does not sound like Roosevelt. but its truth seems to indicate that the doctrine of lese majeste is to become operative in this country. It is somewhat surprising to note this attempt to buoy up the presidential dignity, for President Roosevelt's daily life is anything but starched.
