



Testimony given at the trial of Ser-seant Nebelung, charged with coninuous mal-treatment of his men noves the Frankfurter Zeitung to comment that it is plain that officers in the German army permit and even enourage systematic cruelty toward hose in the ranks.

Following on the recent cases wherein one non-commissioned officer was convicted of 1,800 acts of cruelty, inother of 1,300, and a third of 57 Nebelung's trial attracts unusual attention. People are beginning to believe that the outrageous persecution of privates is prevalent throughout

The evidence given shows that Nebe ung frequently beat recruits with broomsticks and pokers, compelled his en to run on the drill ground till they dropped from exhaustion, then goaded them with kicks and blows to rise again and run ti'l they fainted. He made his men don heavy overcoats and stand close to heated stoves till they were overcome with faintness.

Another of his practices was to make them go down on all fours and sing songs in that position while he sat astride the back of his victim belaboring his head. He forced men to take a rifle between their teeth and crawl around the drill ground on hands and knees while he goaded them with hersewhips. Blows on the face and boxes on the ear were of the commonest occurrence.
