Railroad Commission Hears

Complaints Concerning the Depot

NEGROES TROUBLESOME

It Is Alleged That they Annoy Ladies in the Waiting Room

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 16.-Quite an array of railroad men and attorneys were on hand yesterday when the railroad ommission called its docket.

The first case taken up was the proposition to fix a rate in cents per 100 pounds for the transportation of rough wooden blocks, including house blocks, rough logs of ash, bois d'arc, hickory, oak, magolia, linn, cedar, gum, walnut, etc., to be used in the manufacture of handles, spokes, felloes, furniture, cooperage, etc. After some remarks by J. W. Allen and R. Fife, in which both expressed the opinion that the case could be settled to the satisfaction of all persons concerned. the case was passed.

SMITHVILLE DEPOT

The application of the citizens of Smithville for an order from the commission to compel the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway to erect a more commodious depot at that place was taken up. S. C.
