# NUHIHER DID

Neither Cotton Picking Nor Condition of Staple Was Seriously Affected

(Special to The Telegram.)

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 22.—The norther that a cold, prolonged rain might set in orators of the party. did not materialize into fact and neither picking nor development of the crop seem to have been retarded. There are some complaints of scattering fields suffering from dryness. Light, warm rains might yet be beneficial in these localities, but in most of the district the crop is advanced beyong the necessity of extra moisture.

Picking has gotton under good head-From forty to fifty bales a day have been coming into the Dallas market for the last three days. Approximately 400 bales have been received to date in the city. Three thousand bales are estimated to have so far been marketed at Mesquite, Garland and Lancaster, the Main st. other principal market points of the county. At these places last year at the corresponding date a total of about 10,000 bales had been received. Farmers, weighers and buyers express the opinion that daily receipts will be decidedly large before the end of the current week, as all of the seventy-three gins in the county are now busy. An idea of the lateness of the crop may be grasped when it is stated that ginning began in Dallas county last year on August 20; this year the first bale was ginned in the county on Sep-

Frank Rugel of Mesquite, says: "If frost holds off till the middle of November we will pick out better than a third of a bale to the acre in the eastern part of Dallas county; perhaps as much as half a bale. We will pick out more than we did

Bob Sims of Christian Valley says: "I have never known the cotton to open up faster than it has since last week's cold There's lots of it ready to pick The crop is all right in my sec-We'll get a half bale to the acre We don't need rain; all we need is plenty of heat during the days and a late frost. We're going to pick as fast as we can for fear this 10-cent price may not last." Rev. Mr. Lively, from the Long Creek neighborhood, said: "The crop is much better in my neighborhood than it was last year, although it is not promising as well as it did three weeks ago; it's beer too dry, and now it's too late for rain to do much good. We'll beat a third of bale to the acre, even with what's in sight. If sunshine and warm temperature continue and a fairly late frost is had. we'll make a half bale to the acre."

### DISPUTE IS UNSETTLED

Quarantine Station at Galveston Is Still to Be Permanently Located

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 22.-There are no developments in the controversy between the state and federal authorities in regard to the location of the quarantine station in Galveston.

The fifteen acres of land, more or less, was ceded by the state to the federal government in 1887. The quarantine station was located and improved in 1878. Those who have gone over the controversy from a legal as well as a business point of view think the state would not have ceded land on which the quarantine improvements had been standing for nine years, and that the federal government cannot make good its claim to this prop-The general government now has thirty times as much land as the state sold. Under the "more or less" clause in the cession, however, the state may have some trouble, as from present indications the courts will have to settle the dispute.

An Ingenious Operation That Is Performed by Machinery.

The first pins made in this country were very crude indeed, merely a bit of wire twisted into a knot for a head at one end and sharpened to a point at tions before they are considered fit for

In comparison with the size of the object manufactured the operations seem bewilderingly numerous, but if there be one process more remarkable than another it is "papering the pins." Worth and other western cities. He also The papers, baving been passed has large land and cattle interests in through an ingenious machine which, at regular intervals, according to the size of the pin, pinches up a fold and pricks a hole in it, are ready to receive the pins.

For this purpose there is another mafeeds the pins, the other the papers. The first part of the machine is a box four deep. The bottom is composed of small square steel bars, sufficiently far apart to let the shank of the pin fall through, but not the head. These bars are just as thick as the space between papered pins. The lower part of the bottom of the box is made to detach itself as soon as the row of pins is complete. Row after row, at regular intervals, is received and passed down a corresponding set of grooves until it reaches the ready pricked paper. By the nicest possible adjustment these pins come exactly to their places and are pressed into them. By this method two little girls can in one day put up many thousands of papers.-Kansas
