

WOULD BE HARMFUL TO CITY Mr. Williams' view of the law is based on the fact that the contract was entered upon before Mr. Waggoman became a member of the council and a construction of the law that would vitiate the contract under those conditions would be harmful to the interests of the city.

Under such a construction of the law, if L. S. Leversedge, while he was building the viaduct, had made a race for seat in the council and been success ful, his contract with the city would have been knocked out. TO OUR CUSTOMERS AND FRIENDS: Receipts at the Fort Worth market last week, 9,285. Cattle receipts the first three days of this week are 5.900. Cows suffered a decline of about 15 cents, while steers have continued steady. There have been some extra fine cows here this week, which have sold from \$2.25 to \$2.60. We think this class of cows should sell a little stronger. as there are but few in the country.

STEERS.-Smooth, fat, well finished 1100 to 1200-lb. steers, \$3.60 to \$4.00; 900 to 1050-lb., \$2.75 to \$3.20; medium flesh feeders of good quality weighing from 800 to 950-lbs., \$2.50 to \$2.75; 950 to 1050-lb., \$2.75 to \$3.00. Demand limited on account of oil mills not being in position to quote prices on meal and hulls. COWS .- The cow market is about 10 cents lower than last week and steady. Choice cows have been selling

from \$2.25 to \$2.60, while the bulk of the good butcher cows have sold from \$2.00 to \$2.15; good medium butcher cows, \$1.75 to \$2.00; canners, \$1.25 to \$1.50.

BULLS are selling from \$1.75 to \$2.10 for good heavy butcher and feeder bulls, while light bulls are bringing from \$1.50 to \$1.75. VEAL CALVES are selling at steady prices; best selling at \$3.00 to \$4.00, while medium grades are bring-

ing \$2.00 to \$3.00. HOGS are not coming in in sufficient numbers to supply the demand, and the packers are taking everything at strong prices. The top today is \$6.30, and the bulk of the good stuff for the week sold at \$6.20 to \$6.30. SHEEP continue to come in limited numbers and there is a strong demand for at least three times as many muttons as we are receiving. We would, therefore, advise our customers to send in a few cars, as they will bring

from \$3.25 to \$3.50 if they are fat and weigh from 80 to 90 lbs. Receipts at the Northern markets continue heavy and the markets are over supplied with medium grades of all kinds of cattle. Extra well finished cattle of all kinds are bringing fairly good prices considering the excessive receipts.
