WEST SIDE MAN TALKS OF WALKS. Wants to See Improvements in Every Part of Fort Worth to Improve the Footing. "The South Side is not the only section of the city needing sidewalks," said a West Side resident this morning. "I have a walk in front of my place and I have been reading what The Telegram has had regarding the need for more walks on the South Side. It is a necessity all over the city. On the West Side the sidewalks are few and far between and the walk I have put down a great expense is trampled with mud every time it rains, because my neighbors do not put walks in front of their places. I think a sidewalk is one thing that a home place needs a carpet put to the parlor, and I would like to see The Telegram agitate the question until those who have failed to make the improvement are ashamed of taking some action. 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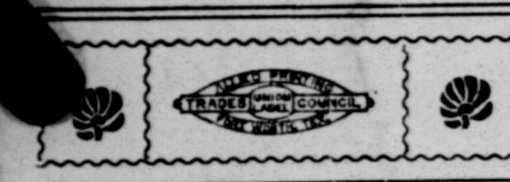

THE PRESIDENT'S EXPENSES

There has been much said about the recent western tour of President Roosevelt, and the fact that he accepted a special train from the railroads. This matter has been emphasized by reason of the fact that although he accepted this valuable courtesy from the railroads, he has recently declined presents of small value which were tendered him. Harper's Weekly discusses the question in this wise:

In many states legislators and state officers are prohibited from receiving passes from railroads. Is it not equally improper that the president should travel free? Perhaps it is, but if it is the matter should be regulated by something more than mere custom, and a provision for traveling expenses should be made for presidents. Just as provision is made for the maintenance of the White House and its grounds. Extended presidential journeys are commonly made more for political than administrative ends. But as a whole, it seems a good thing for the country that the president, from time to time, should visit the states remote from the seaboard. Washington is close to the Atlantic capital. The disadvantages of its one-sided situation are modified when the head of the government goes on his travels and visits citizens too far away to come to him. But practically, the president cannot travel as a private citizen may. It is neither safe nor convenient for him to do so. Not on his own account, but on ours he must be guarded and looked after, and special care should be taken to keep him from harm. He has to travel by special train, and take many persons with him. It is not proper that his salary should be charged with the heavy expenses of such journeys, nor should considerations of thrift avail to keep him at home. The railroads seem to be more than willing to put their facilities at his disposal. If it is proper that he should travel at their cost, then by all means let the government provide at fund out of which such expenses should be defrayed. It is not expedient that the president should stay at home merely to save money.

The people should surely not pay for "extended presidential journeys" like the one taken by Mr. Roosevelt. He was on a campaign tour and The Telegram has more than once pointed out that every expression shows he was bidding for support in the next national convention of his party. No provision should be made to pay the expenses of presidential trips, for several reasons.

First, no president will visit every section of the country, and if he visits a portion officially, he should visit all.

Second, no president should be absent from Washington during the time necessary to take junketing trips to every section of the country, during his four years in office.

Third, it is not necessary for the people to "see" the president, as such "seeing" is but the satisfying of morbid curiosity, and they should do that at individual expense by a trip to the capital.

Fourth, sufficient expenditures are allowed the departments for the investigation of the needs of the people in every section of the country, and through official reports the president can become better informed than by taking a flying trip through states and territories.

Mr. Roosevelt should have paid his own expenses on that journey, accepting no courtesies from great corporations which are opposing the anti-trust fight and the interoceanic canal, thus placing himself under obligations to them, and jeopardizing the interests of the whole people. The Dallas News suggests:

Under the circumstances there are only two legitimate methods of meeting the expenses incurred on such tours. One is for the president to pay the bills, the other is for the campaign committee of the party to which he belongs to pay them out of the party campaign fund. Unfortunately for Mr. Roosevelt, he is not yet the party nominee and the campaign committee could not pay his expenses on a stumping tour seeking the nomination. Therefore, there is but one legitimate way—the president should have paid his own expenses.

A FIGHT IS ON

Will the Tyler Courier please state whether it proposes to join The Telegram in a fight for the reform in the Legislature of Texas? The Telegram wants help in this reform matter.—Fort Worth Telegram.

Certainly, but does The Telegram know that the Texas senate during its last ses-

sion was purchased by the lobby for two years to come? In drawing for the long term the senators who represented corporations drew the long term, while the fifteen senators who were there representing the people drew the short term. Of course, the people can go ahead and elect the membership of the lower house, but there are the hold-over senators to prevent the passing of reform laws for the next two years. At the time this fraudulent drawing for the long term was being made the Courier was not silent about it. Will The Telegram please explain itself on that drawing? In advocating reform, let us begin at the beginning.—Tyler Courier.

The Telegram made an effort to investigate that drawing at the time and the writer looked it up on the ground. If there was collusion those who made the protest failed to prove a case. The Telegram, however, does not believe in post mortem examinations. That is in the past and it is too late to do any good with it. The Telegram proposes, however, to get on one watch tower and invites the Courier and the Waco Times-Herald to counter and the Waco Times-Herald to work. Legislators who will not be guilty of extravagance must be elected. These "courtesies" must be prohibited:

Free passes.

Free telegrams and telephone messages.

Free express franks.

Free Pullman berths.

Newspapers for members of the legislature at state expense.

These privileges should be withdrawn.

Payment of political obligations with clerkships at maximum pay.

Postage at state expense for private correspondence.

Idle days during a session for junketing trips.

The legislature should be composed of men who will work longer hours and get through as soon as possible.

Efforts to control appointments should not be attempted in the appropriation bill.

More attention should be given to bills enrolled to the end that clerical errors will not creep into the laws.

The Telegram believes this is a serious question. The interests of the people are at stake when the legislature assembles and these interests should be guarded.

There is a man in every district worthy of the place who will look to such reforms. Let the press take it up and insist that such men be asked by the people to sacrifice some time to the position.

Manage Texas affairs as they would be managed for individuals and Texas law makers will then be blessed by the people. The corporations would prefer to oppose legislation with argument before such men.

As it is today the corporations are afraid to do this. Railroads fear results if they do not issue transportation freely and the Pullman company, which does not give free berths except during the legislature, stations a man there with a pass book so as to keep off unfriendly bills.

Texas can stop such practices with Texas. Let them to the issue and fight it hard.

THE HOGG SPEECH

Governor Hogg has made his speech, and advises the farmers to organize for political purposes. He goes into detail in a discussion of his amendments of two years ago, and has something plain to say of those who declined to support a platform demand. His address is very much like those of his campaign when he was presenting the amendments to the people. There is nothing new in the argument, unless it be that words presented in one are differently chosen than those used on other occasions. He is very confident on the corporations which issue fictitious bonds and stocks, and the lobbyist comes in for a big share of criticism. The man with the free pass is whipped about the shoulders through a long length of the speech, and it is upon this subject the ex-governor is very plain. His objection to the issuance of free passes to officers of the state is well laid, and it will find weight with the people. The Telegram has recently pointed out objections to the use of free passes by corporations to secure benefits from the people's representatives, and the argument of the former governor on the subject is an excellent one. The day is coming when such legislation will have the question to deal with. The address of Mr. Hogg will have strong supporters, and when the next election is held there will be legislative campaigns pitched on those lines.

As soon as the Parker-Washington people show a bill of lading for the asphalt plant shipped, City Engineer Hawley will allow excavation along Houston street.

He does not propose to close the street to travel for months waiting for the delayed plant. It ought to have been here long ago, and the street should have been partially finished.

The Telegram would like to have the name of the first man to put in a new sidewalk. That name will be put at the top of the honor roll. If he is too modest to send it in, let his neighbor do so.

A cement sidewalk in front of your home will enhance the value of your property. Build it before the muddy weather of winter.

Don't forget to look after that sidewalk in front of your home. It is badly needed.

While discussing the effects of the recent rain, please ask your neighbor why some one doesn't pave Houston street.

CREEK NATION SALES ARE HIGH

Land Is Being Disposed of at Nearly Its Actual Value to Settlers

(Special Correspondence to The Telegram)

TULSA, I. T., Oct. 1.—The first sale of lands in the Creek Nation has been held. The parcels sold lie along the Arkansas river and are of extraordinary fertility. The soil here will produce large crops of corn, cotton, wheat, oats, apples, peaches, pears and almost all of the standard fruits and grains of the Central and Southern states do well on it.

As directed by law, the pieces sold were appraised and then sold to the highest bidder, if they required in every case that the sum offered by such highest bidder equal or exceed the appraised value. One piece, appraised at \$50 an acre, sold at \$22.50; the other sold at less than \$5 an acre above the appraised.

Two facts stand out—the Indian lands are being sold, and the prices are running near to the real market value of the land. Both of these facts are calling forth a good deal of discussion.

As soon as persons not citizens of an Indian nation get title to land in the Indian Territory they have more interests here, and consequently more rights, which may mean to the national government a desperate protection. This may hasten the establishment of some sort of local self-government, either territorial or state.

There are many to whom this seems the more important fact.

Others are more concerned because the prices are starting so high. Many have been waiting for years to get in here, when the Indians were allowed to sell, and buy up some farm land cheap. It would seem that they are to be disappointed.

These high prices are apt to make the change from Indian ownership of land to ownership by actual occupants and workers of the soil rather slow. It is not probable that there will be a sudden rush of investors to a country where the investments are not especially attractive.

This beginning of the sale of Creek land is the beginning of a new era in the industrial and political history of the Indian Territory, to which non-citizens and would-be immigrants in the neighboring states have been looking forward for a long time.
