The big packers have by their agreements to refrain from bidding on stock at the stock yards beaten prices down almost to the breaking point, and at the same time have raised the prices n dressed meats to eastern consumers until the prices paid are far above what they were one year ago, when the meat rust is supposed to have been formed. The packing trust is paying today 40 per cent less for pork than one year ago, while the retailers are paying the packers 15 per cent more for dressed pork than one year ago, making the increased profits of the trust by gouging both consumer and producer 55 per cent on pork For beef steers the packers are paying 25 per cent less than last year, while the selling price is 10 per cent higher; increased profits of the trusts \$5 per cent. 


