Determined Raid Upon Bank's Stock on Pittsburg Exchange Responsible for Condition—Receiver Appointed

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The acting comptroller of the currency was advised today that the Federal National Bank of Pittsburg did not open for business this morning. He immediately by appointment Bank Examiner Cunningham receiver. The bank was chartered in 1901 with a capital stock of \$2,000,000. Joseph Langfitt is president and George Eisenbach the cashier.

GEO. P. ARTHUR IS AGAIN IN COURTS

He Is Widely Known in West Texas—Small Fire at Colorado City

COLORADO, Texas, Oct. 20.—The fall term of the district court of this county closed on the 17th at Big Springs and the district judge and the district attorney, J. L. Shepherd and Ben Randall, returned to their homes in this city to spend the Sabbath. During that court George P. Arthur, a man of wide reputation in West Texas, was arraigned on a charge of assault to murder. The man whom he was charged with assaulting was the mayor of Midland. The case resulted in a mistrial after the jury had been hung two days. It was dismissed. Mr. Arthur only a few weeks before, on a third trial at Abilene, on charge of killing the section foreman at Stanton, was convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary for five years. A few years ago he was tried in this city three times on a criminal assault charge and he was finally convicted, though the offense was reduced to simple aggravated assault. After he had served out his time for this offense he had a long and tedious time in court at Albany on two or three different charges, but finally he became a free man again.

WACO, Texas, Oct. 20.—Harry Hays, a non-union street car motorman who came here from Bridgeport, Conn., was shot and perhaps fatally wounded while on his car at North Sixth street and Austin avenue about 10:20 last night. Guards on the car immediately fired at the sound of the first shot, but their bullets only struck the brick buildings nearby and rattled off harmlessly.

'MR. DOOLEY'S' LUCK

Wasn't With Him When He Left This Gold Mine TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 20.—Finley P. Dunne, known to the reading world as 'Mr. Dooley,' spent several months in Southern Oregon a number of years ago looking for fortune in the form of a gold mine. A dispatch from Grant's Pass says that he located a claim in the gold quartz belt of Southern Oregon. Dunne and his partner made nothing by the venture and departed discouraged, so far as gold mining was concerned. Dunne declared, "There was gold there undoubtedly, because we couldn't find any." The claim is now being a rich proposition, having been adequately developed by a man coming into possession of it since Dunne abandoned that property.

COTTON SEED QUALITY

GILLESPIE TO RECOMMEND NEW BUILDING

Will Depart for Washington November 1 to Attend Extra Session—Local Postoffice Business on Boom

Congressman O. W. Gillespie will depart for Washington on November 1, to attend the special session of congress which was called by President Roosevelt yesterday. Congress will convene on November 2.

MEANWHILE THE POSTOFFICE BUSINESS and the business of the Eleventh division of the railway mail service has grown to such proportions that by the time another building can be put up space in it will be required for these departments of the government service.

POSTMASTER BURROUGHS and Congressman Gillespie inspected the federal building several days ago and came to the conclusion that the solution of the problem lay in putting up a separate building, connected with the present one by passageways, and Congressman Gillespie will recommend to the chief architect at Washington. It is understood that Judge Meek also favors a separate structure.

POSTMASTER BURROUGHS said today: "The business of the Fort Worth postoffice is growing at such a rate that a number of additional carriers and clerks will be required next year to handle it. At present we have just enough space for the present force, but by the time we get additional room it will be greatly needed."

AT THE TIME THE BILL to establish sessions of the United States circuit court of appeals in Fort Worth was enacted into law by congress, it was thought that the present federal building room enough could be provided, but the growth of business throughout the Southwest and especially in the district tributary to Fort Worth has been so rapid that this improvement, if made at once, would fall short of even temporarily filling the requirements. Indeed, by the time the additional floor was completed the postoffice department and other government forces in the building would be clamoring for more space.

THE ADDITION, if one is erect west of the present building, will cost between \$100,000 and \$150,000. The government already owns the site.

Things Heard In Hotel Lobbies

Hon. W. F. Ramsey of Cleburne, was in the city this morning for a short time, and left for a business trip to Dallas. In the palmy days of politics in this state Mr. Ramsey was one of the leaders. He was on the winning side so often that among the politicians he earned the sobriquet of "William Fixem Ramsey," and there was not one in the state but would take off his hat to the supreme abilities of the gentleman from Johnson. When Martin McNulty Crane was a power in Texas political affairs, and was one of the members of the state administration, Mr. Ramsey was prominent. He followed the fortunes of

the Crane household through campaign after campaign, and he won whatever fight he made—except one. In the famous campaign when Mr. Crane sought that he would stay through the fight, and that it was "war to the knife, and knife to the hilt," Mr. Ramsey was his campaign manager. In the 1888 campaign Mr. Crane was a candidate for governor, and was defeated because of the failure of the counties to hold uniform primaries. Since that time Mr. Crane has retired from politics and with his retirement was that of Mr. Ramsey. "I am out of politics," said Mr. Ramsey this morning when asked about the situation. "I am practicing law and am president of the best bank in the country. We have fine crops in Johnson county. There is prosperity among our people, and we are giving close attention to politics than we ever did before. Fort Worth appears to improve every day. The city is destined to be

a big place and its advance in the commercial world will benefit the whole state. We feel a neighborly interest in Fort Worth down our way, and we watch with interest the progress here." "What do you think of the uniform primary?" he was asked. "I think it is better politically for the state. It will not allow the playing of one county against the other, as we had in the 1888 campaign, and it will be a race to the finish by all candidates, with the expression of the whole people controlling, instead of the work of politicians winning the fight. I am very anxious to see the first operation of the law, and I believe that I will be gratified at its success, as will the entire state." "What does ex-governor Hogg want?" he was asked. "That I cannot tell. We all know of course that he hopes to see his amendments submitted to a vote of the

people, and if they are, he will make a campaign for them. As to what of- fice he might want, I cannot tell, but I am satisfied that if he does announce for any office, he will stir things up around with the 'head' in the lobby of the Worth. For four years he has been the representative of Taylor county in the legislature. He was the author of the land bill at the last session, the bill which caused so much argument, newspaper talk and lobby- ing." "The lands are drifting as they al- ways have," he said last night. "We are operating under the law of 1901, and first come first served. The actual settler is getting some of it, and the cow man is getting some. Our country is in fine shape, we have had a great fall and the people are in prosperous condition. The only trouble we are having is that the cow market is too low." Mr. Bryan will probably stand for re-election next year.

Rev. D. C. Limbaugh of Dallas, secretary of the American Unitarian so- ciety, and representative in Texas of that society, is in the city, seeking a house in which to locate his family, his intention being to locate in Fort Worth in his missionary work. Four years ago Mr. Limbaugh went to Dal- las to take up the work of the Unitarian church. In that time he has gathered quite a large congregation about him, and has recently completed a handsome church building. The money for building the church is procured from the East where the headquarters of the denomination are located. The church in Dallas is the only one in this state.

THE WORLD'S FAIR FUND

The Texas World's Fair Commission has assessed Tarrant county \$5,897, which amount is to go toward defraying the expenses incident to an exploitation of the resources of this state, and this week General Manager Louis J. Wortham will be here to co-operate with the citizens of Fort Worth in raising the amount. Already some has been subscribed. There should be more, and the full amount asked should be readily raised. The commission is asking very little of each county in the state, and the results will be manifold. To say that the World's Fair exhibit will not be beneficial to this state, is to talk in ignorance upon a question, and the people who have studied it know this to be a fact. Texas is a new country, a growing state, a commonwealth of untold resources to be developed. Capital is needed for this development, and this capital must come from the outside. Men of capital are to be at the exposition. They will be seeking new places in which to invest their surplus. They cannot visit each state, and by going to the great fair they will see the entire union presented in a panorama. Every state will be before them, the soils, the products and the natural advantages being shown. Texas must be there with her soils, with her products of those soils, with her natural advantages, with a story of her commerce by water and by rail, with a history of irrigation and with a statement of the vast areas which are ready for the actual settlers. Fort Worth and Tarrant county can well afford to raise the amount asked. This city has been one of the points of concentration for the exhibit which has been collected by the representatives of the commission, and that has been an advertisement to the city. Fort Worth is represented on the commission by such men as E. L. Hoffman, N. H. Lassiter, R. B. Padlock, Herbert Post, M. A. Spoons and Paul Waples. They will see that this city and this county are properly presented, and it will be money well spent to invest the amount asked in putting Texas before the world.

While many railroads, in order to produce net returns, are cutting off employees and materially lessening forces, the Southern Pacific management announces that no reduction of its shop forces is contemplated. Referring to this matter, Vice President Markham is quoted as follows:

"No reduction in shop forces at Houston or any other point along our lines is contemplated. This is our busy season, all of our equipment is needed to handle the business offering, and in order to carry on current repairs and keep the equipment in good order we need all the men we now have. If business drops off, however, it may be necessary to make some reduction in the forces, but the first consideration is that of keeping our rolling stock in condition for the best possible service."

Mr. Markham stated that he was inclined to the opinion that the general public had failed to appreciate the limitations to the announcement that the Southern Pacific proposes to cut down expenses and produce, if possible, net results on money already invested. During the past three years over \$100,000,000 had been expended on improvements and betterments for the Harriman lines. Of this amount a sum in excess of \$40,000,000 was spent for the improvement of Southern Pacific lines. On a proportional basis of actual mileage in operation, about \$10,000,000 was consumed in the improvement of Texas lines under the control of the Southern Pacific.

SOUTH PORTLAND ONCE SEIZED IN PORT

Boat Which Sunk Off Oregon Coast Monday Evening Had a Bad Reputation a Number of Years Ago in New York

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Known as the Caroline Miller, the steamer South Portland just wrecked on the Pacific coast was seized eleven years ago by the Federal authorities in this port on suspicion of being a filibuster. She was boarded on the strength of a statement that the cargo she carried was contraband consisting of munitions of war for insurgents in Venezuela, headed by General Joaquin Crespo. The minister from Venezuela insisted that Francisco Gonzales was agent for Crespo, shipped the war materials but the government had to recede from its position and in April, 1914, a verdict of \$500 was rendered against the United States for illegally retaining the ship.
Captain John O'Brien, known as "Dynamite," who achieved considerable fame as blockade runner in Cuban waters, commanded the Miller.

FEW BANKRUPTS IN THIS DISTRICT

Nearly Twice as Many in Dallas Since New Law Went Into Effect
"The growth of business in this court and the character of the litigation both go to show the wonderful expansion and development of the country industry, to Fort Worth," said J. B. Finks, deputy clerk of the United States district and circuit courts in this city, today.
"The best feature of the business in this district is that it is growing rapidly in what is known as good litigation, that is in the sort of suits known as trespass to real estate, patent and equity cases. In bankruptcy cases since the law went into effect on July 1, 1898, the showing of Fort Worth has been far ahead of Dallas so far as these cases may be used to show the condition of business in general. In Dallas over 200 cases have been filed in Fort Worth the total number is 319. Fewer cases by a hundred as threatened."

CRESCENT CITY FAVORED BY GORDON

Head of Confederate Veterans Believes It Should Be Permanent Reunion City—Not Going to St. Louis

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 20.—General John B. Gordon says he is in favor of making New Orleans the permanent reunion city of the Confederate veterans, provided that the people of New Orleans desire to have it so. He thinks that the adoption of New Orleans as the veterans' permanent meeting place would be a distinct financial benefit to this city.
In speaking about veterans' affairs the general said:
"There has not yet been any discussion as to where the next reunion will be held. All over the South there is a disposition on the part of Confederate veterans to return to New Orleans and make it the permanent meeting place. The next meeting, however, will not be held in New Orleans. The executive committee will meet some time in November and after that the place for the next reunion will be announced. The committee is exceedingly anxious to make some arrangement, if possible, to arrange for the veterans to visit at small personal cost. Mr. Hayward's death was one of those which occurred here yesterday. The report of new cases were reported for the first time, looking one, on any day since the outbreak. The total number of cases to date is 41, with 37 deaths.

No bulletin was issued yesterday from Laredo, but it is learned that Constable Garrett is improving and is now considered out of danger. The report of cases in San Antonio caused the establishment of a strict quarantine by the officials of Frio county, who declare they will not permit the running of trains through their county to the harbor. It is hardly considered, however, that the officials will allow the county officials to maintain so strict a quarantine as threatened.

SAN ANTONIO DENIES STORY
SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 21.—After a conference lasting till after 11 o'clock last night, Health Officer Taber, who came here with Dr. Murray of the United States marine service, announced:
"There is absolutely nothing alarming in the situation in San Antonio and no state quarantine will be declared against the city."
Dr. Burg, city physician, and Dr. Berry, county physician, both of whom attended the conference, emphatically deny that there is a case of yellow fever in the city, and so far as the investigation developed, they could not find anyone who had even been exposed to the disease.

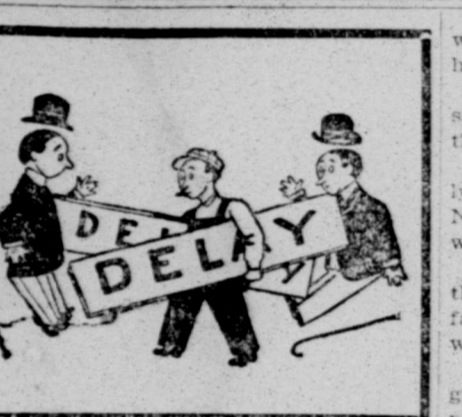
