CREEKS TURN IT DOWN

Budget of Chief Is Not Ratified and no Provision Is Made

MUSKOGEE, I. T., Dec. 1.-A peculiar complication has arisen in Creek affairs and as a result the salary of the chief and office expenses, amounting to about \$7,000, have been cut out of the appropriations. The chief is entitled to \$1,009 per year and office expenses. He asked for a raise of salary to \$1,500; \$4,000 office expenses and \$1,500 contingent expenses. The Creek council turned the whole thing down and did not even appropriate the regular salary. A. P. The railroad company's contention was that the railroad company owned the land upon which the well was dug, and that its property rights included not only the surface of the earth, but all under the surface; therefore all the water developed by the well upon its own property was the legal property of the company, and that the plaintiff should not recover. This decrease in receipts and increase in expenditures, for the current year leaves the treasury, compared with the same period of 1902, with a net loss of \$16,367,300.

The loss in revenue this year was entirely in customs, the tigures showing from that source of \$12,000,000, while the receipts from internal revenue increased \$3,000,000, and from miscellaneous sources \$1,000,000.
