The Texas Highway Patrol is cooperating in a nationwide "Know and Obey Traffic Laws" program, and Captain Polk Ivy of the Amarillo District listed the following facts to remember about right-ofway at intersections:

1. A car already in the intersection has the right-of-way over eral Election Laws of the State of cars approaching. You must Texas affecting elections as may give way to any car already there as you come up to the intersection.

2. If two cars arrive at an intersection at about the same time, the one on the right has the rightof-way, and the other driver must give way to him.

3. Slow down before you reach the intersection in order to be ready for a car on the cross street. Don't wait to slow down after you reach the corner-it may be too

4. Despite the rule, don't insist on your right-of-way at the risk of an acident. Humility is a small price to pay for safety.

5. If there are stop signs at the intersection, or if one vehicle is turning left, special rules are






