THE SUNKEN CRUISERS LONDON, Feb. 10.-The cruiser Variag which was built at the Cramp ship yard, Philadelphia, in 1893, was steel and unsheathed. 

In the current number of "The World Today" a correspondent tells something of the work of Mayor Maybury of Detroit in ridding his city of the idle class of people, the unemployed who are making a pretence at work, and who are not to be classed as vagrants. 

The Wyoming cattlemen have taken the and year out thousands of families initiative in what promises to become a general demand upon railroads, by the live stock growers of the country, to reconsider their action and issue return transportation to shippers and assistants of cattle en route, or accept live stock is perishable freight.

The movement was first communicated by a prominent Wyoming stockman to Vice President and General Manager Herbert of the Colorado and Southern Railroad Company at Denver, who will give the matter early attention.

The request is in the nature of a test backed by all the prominent cattlemen in road persists in its agreement mutual will prove every point claimed and will with other western roads to not issue return transportation for shippers and assistants, it must accept stock as perishable freight and provide men for its care during the trip from shipping point to destination. In the latter case an ordinary guarantee as regards perishable freight will be demanded. Should the Colorado and Southern re

fuse to make either concession, a similar request will be made of the Burlington, which is almost as accessible to that part of Wyoming as is reached by the Colorado and Southern. The ranchmen of Wyoming declare that

they cannot afford to pay return fare for themselves and their assistants, and that they will combine efforts in forcing the demand upon the railroads.

It is under the Elkins' law that the railroads declare they are prohibited from issuing return transportation for shippers and assistants. On the other hand, to receive cattle as perishable freight would be a heavy and expensive undertaking for the roads. First, they would be compelled to hire men to accompany shipments, and in the end furnish transportation for their own men. Besides, they would be compelled to pay wages to the caretakers, and thus create a big expense. The stockmen believe that the railroads can easily devise a plan by which they can get around the provisions of the Elk ins' law if they are so inclined. If the stockmen make a concerted charge in pushing their demand and the roads find themselves up against it, so to spea't, they will doubtless adopt that method out of the difficulty. That is, the agreement entered into by all western roads at the first of the new year, that none would ssue return transportation to stockmen, will be abrogated. If that is done, the cattlemen will have gained a big victory. There has been much dissatisfaction

over this matter among the cattlemen in Texas, but the Wyoming plan as yet. It is probable that it will be in the near future, as the stockmen of that country propose to make the demand a universal one all over the cattle-growing sections of the country.
