Texas Unemployment Rate Edges Down Again: Callahan County Shows Slight Increase

Austin - Texas employers added jobs for the eighth consecutive month. Total Nonagricultural Employment in Texas gained 12,900 jobs from April to May and 102,100 jobs since September 2003. The Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped by one-tenth of a percentage point to 5.9 percent from April to May. Initial claims for unemployment compensation continued to fall for the week ending June 5, 2004, declining more than 30 percent over Texans back to work remains the last 12 months.

Since the beginning of the year, 60,700 jobs have been added. The annual growth rate climbed from 0.6 percent in April to 0.8 percent in May, the highest job growth level since July 2001. Six major industries in Texas have shown sustained job growth over the year. Education & Health Services has led all industries showing a gain of 36, 000 jobs over the last 12 months.

"I am pleased to see continued expansion of business activities over the last several months," said Commissioner Representing Employers Ron Lehman. "Job growth is one of the strongest signs of economic expansion, and Texas employers continue to add jobs in economy."

Metropolitan Statistical Area reports show unemployment of 2.1 thousand in Abilene, TX for May 2004 from a work force of 62.1 thousand.

Sixty thousand were employed, giving a total unemployment rate of 3.4.

Abilene was only slightly over Amarillo, which had an unemployment rate of 3.1, and San Angelo with 3.2.

Bryan-College Station had the lowest May 2004 rate in Texas - 1.8.

Data for the State of Texas (in thousands) was C. L. F. -10,919.0, Employment 10,296.9, Unemployment -622.1. The unemployment rate for May 2004 was 5.7.

According to Texas labor market data, the May 2004 unemployment rate for Callahan County showed a marginal increase. A rate of 3.5 compared to 3.4 in April 2004 was listed.



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

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

Voluntary Country of Origin Labeling **Proposal Unveiled** This week I partnered with my colleague on the House Agriculture Committee, Chairman Bob Goodlatte of Virginia, to unveil legislation to establish a voluntary country of origin labeling bill. Our voluntary labeling bill

would apply to meat, seafood, fruit and vegetables produced here in the U.S.

The Food Promotion Actwhich is the name of our billis supported by 325 different groups, including the National Cattlemen's Beef Association.

The Food Promotion Act would allow producers to work with processors and retailers to provide labeling information in the marketplace in such a way that it informs consumers while at the same time benefiting producers.

The bottom line is that this is a marketing issue, not a food safety issue.

As you may recall, I worked closely with Larry Combest of Lubbock, the former Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, to pass the 2002 Farm Bill.

The bill Larry and I produced provided two years to review the mandatory country of origin labeling provisions in order to fine-tune them as necessary. Although the time period has slipped a bit, we now begin the legislative process of making the country-of-origin labeling provisions work, and I am confident we will end up with a better product as a result. To those who still believe mandatory country-of-origin labeling is the best answer, it's not if it costs the producer, and it will cost the producer tremendous amounts of money. By working with the retailers and the wholesalers, I truly believe we are going to have most products labeled by country-of-origin within a year or two. But it will be done in an efficient way, meaning with the most benefit to the consumer and the least cost to the producer. ard G. Young said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss. ,
