Post Office dedication set for Friday

The Post Office in Dimmitt, located at 217 SE 2nd St., will be renamed the Jacob Dones Post Office Building in a ceremony starting at 10 a.m. on Friday, Oct. 20.

while serving his country in Iraq. The ceremony will include remarks from Rep. Randy Neugebauer, R-Texas; Dimmitt city officials, U.S. Postal Service The ceremony will kick off at District Manager Linda Welch and other local officials as well as the unveiling of the plaque renamed

one year ago on Oct. 20, 2005, the local Post Office.

The event will honor the military service of Sgt. Dones, who was awarded the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, CID Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service medal and the National Defense Service Medal, according to Neugebauer. "He was truly a beloved, respected member of the Dimmitt Community," Neugebauer said. "It is important that we never forget the contributions Sgt. Dones made, not only to America, but to Dimmitt and the State of Texas.

"By naming this Post Office after Sgt. Dones, Congress has honored his heroics and dedication to his fellow veterans by ensuring that his name will live on for future generations."

But for Will Sanders the family, ties that everyone hopes to enjoy truly did lead to a life-saving time when his uncle Brent Sanders donated his kidney.

"We started talking to the transplant people in March 2006," Diane Sanders said. "Just about everyone in the family except his father, Joe Bob who has diabetes, was tested.

"After they diagnosed the shutdown, they said dialysis could keep me alive for a long time, but being this young, if I could find someone who would give a kidney, it would make life a lot easier."

His Uncle Bill was the best match and he and Will went into the hospital May 9, 2006.

"But at the last minute a cyst was found on Bill and the surgery was canceled," Diane said.

But Will wasn't worried. He'd been a match for several members of his family.

to do this," Diane said. "He didn't want his younger nephews to donate a kidney so young in their lives."

Just how do you thank a person for saving your life. "I've told him thanks and I'm trying to live my life and take care of myself in a way that shows I appreciate what he's done for me," Will said. "I had to spend about 10 days in the hospital and then went back for a week after that with an infection. Since then, everything's been going pretty well. I'm trying to control by blood pressure and watch my diet. Of course I'll be on anti-rejection drugs

all my life" Will, an accountant, works in Lubbock and is working toward becoming a CPA.

He said that now he appreciates life more.

"I don't let the little things bug me like they

2. The City of Dimmitt has an on-going economic development program to recruit and retain businesses in Dimmitt.

3. Adam and Jennifer moved to Dimmitt and started their Veterinary practice without being recruited.

4. Adam and Jennifer bought property in a our hospital? residential area without first checking to determine whether livestock could be kept on that property. How man should the c

5. The city worked to see if the zoning could be livestock changed or if a variance could be granted to accommodate and every their livestock. When it was determined that most of the residents adjacent to the property were opposed to livestock when the property, Adam and Jennifer were moved notified that the cattle must be moved. Several other locations were offered to the Jackanicz's where livestock would not have been a problem. They indicated that these locations were not acceptable.

6. The City of Dimmitt did not learn until after the fact that the long-term plans of Adam and Jennifer were to move their veterinary practice out of town to a 320-acre tract of land and to use this land for their home, their veterinary practice and lab and a 1,500 cow dairy.

7. The goal of the city is to be fair to everyone and to make sure that everyone has an opportunity for a fair hearing. We feel that these goals of fairness and equity were met.

I believe that the City of Dimmitt, Bill Potts and Linda Rasor all acted in good faith in trying to work through a difficult situation and to be fair to everyone concerned.

We regret that the Jackanicz's are leaving, but we wish them success wherever they locate.

This is a reply to Adam Jackanicz's open letter:

Why is such a fuss being made over this issue? The soluation is simple, move your livestock operation outside the city limits.

Why would the Mayor take sides in a neighborhood where city codes apply, and support a feedlot (that benefits one couple) next to our hospital?

How many exceptions should the city allow for livestock? Isn't everyone and every part of the city equal?

When the Jackaniczes into our neighborhood we welcomed them. Mr Jackanicz informed me that he was at the edge of the city limits at which time I informed him that we own 9 lots (including our home) inside the city limits and that Wheat street is also inside the city limits. He told me (erroneously) that Wheat Street would soon be closed. My front door is about 100 feet from his cattle.

The calves draw huge amounts of flies and mosquitoes. We have constantly fought this problem due to health problems, and the hospital must experience the same problem. The chickens they brought in have wondered all over the neighborhood. "Jerks" are those that think they are so important that the rules don't apply to THEM, and they should be exempt from the rules that all other "narrowminded" residents have to practice.

Dimmitt has been here a long time, and I don't think it will "dry up and blow away" when the Jackaniczs leave our town.

Mr and Mrs Potts have been wonderful neighbors

and Bill has done an exceptional job as a city council member. He has worked hard at doing that job, but still has the same



Yes, I signed the petition (as did every neighbor) Raising calves belongs out of the city!



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



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

An open letter to the teachers of my children

It is written in the Prophets: "They will all be taught by God.' Everyone who listens to the Father and learns from him comes to me." John 6:45

Two or three times a week I trust you with my most prized jewels, and those two or three times a week, you live up to that trust and return them to me - though not quite the same.

Somehow you manage to take them and gradually, week by week, polish them to make them shine a little more than I sometimes think possible.

You are patient and wise always there if she needs enough to see the potential for riches in what others may see as only rough ore.

I know you spend much expectations and the supunnoticed time in preparation to teach my children about Jesus.

I've seen the literally hundreds of objects they bring home to remind time of you object lessons.

You always win when I prematurely suggest discarding certain Bible class memorabilia. Much of it has a lot of your TLC, not to mention time and creativity, behind it. I saw a note one of you wrote to one of my children, challenging her to be the great Christian leader and example you expect her to be.

You even promised to pray for my daughter and reminded her that you are to talk.

Thank you for the time. the love, the prayers, the port you devote to my children. And thank you for being a constant reflection of Jesus. They notice.

And when they do, so do I. Please resist the

temptation to feel unappreciated.


You're not only appreciated by needed and not just by my children but by me.

And please don't underestimate your influence or your teaching role on them or me as a parent.

My children echo much of what you teach them, probably more than you think they hear. In fact, they remember some of your stories and illustrations long after they are promoted to another class.

"They'll be tough and ready to play," he said. "We have to be ready for an emotional gall game and try to continue to get better while showing the same intensity as last week."



This is the kind of swarming defense that Sprinklake-Earth faced all night from the Swifts, who are still unbeaten.



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Cotton Report

Despite the release of a bearish USDA October supply/demand report, cotton futures at the New York Board of Trade rebounded Thursday from the recent contract lows on shortcovering sparked by technicals that pushed the spot-month December contract to a week-high close.

"Coming into USDA's supply/demand report, the market had been down ten days out of eleven," one trader commented. "That should have been enough to discount any bearish news, and it was."

In its supply/demand report, USDA said it now expects U.S. cotton production to increase to 20.66 million bales from last month's estimate of 20.35 million bales due to higher than expected yields from irrigated acres in the Delta. The estimate for U.S. exports was lowered to 16.0 million bales from last month's 16.2 million. The decrease in projected exports, coupled with a 200,000-bale decrease in domestic mill use, left U.S. ending stocks at 5.4 million bales.

As for world figures, USDA increased world production to 116.19 million bales from last month's 114.94 million and lowered world consumption to 120.98 million bales from 122.24 million in September.

Numerous cotton analysts and traders said the report was considered bearish. In

particular, China's production estimate was increased to 29.0 million bales from last month's 28.0 million while ending stocks were increased to 15.14 million bales from last month's 11.29 million, the department said. Chinese consumption was lowered to 50.0 million bales from the last report's 51.0 million bales.

"The market will wrestle with the idea that U.S. exports are not reasonable right now and either sales have to pick up dramatically or export figures are going to be cut in future reports," one analyst said.

Meanwhile, USDA reported net export sales for the week ended Oct. 5 reached a marketing year high at 337,800 bales. The figure was 33 percent more than the previous week and 51 percent more than the four-week average. Major buyers were Mexico, China, Turkey, and Thailand.

Export shipments of 113,100 bales were eight percent more than the week before and 41 percent more than the four-week average. Primary destinations included China, Mexico, Turkey, and Indonesia.

On the spot cotton scene, online trading by producers in Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas in the week ended October 12 totaled 5,101 bales compared to the previous week when 151 bales were traded. Average by prices received producers in the most recent week ranged from 39.93 to 42.68 cents per pound compared to 43.30 cents per pound the

Q. I have read that some Texas businesses are over-charging people displaced by hurricane Katrina. Isn't this illegal?

A. Yes. The Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act prohibits anyone from taking advantage of a natural disaster by charging an exorbitant or excessive price for necessities, such as food, fuel, or housing. The attorney general or any

private citizen may enforce this law. If an individual sues, he or she is entitled to up to three times the damages incurred, as well as court costs and attorney's fees.

Q. Is it legal for an apartment to rent to only "seniors" and prohibit children? Isn't this discrimination?

A. As a general rule, an apartment may not refuse to rent to a family with children because doing so would be unlawful discrimination. But there is an exception in the law for "seniors only" apartments. If 80% or more of the residents are over age 55, the apartment does not have to allow children.

Q. What is the difference between a Partnership and a Limited Liability Partnership?

A. In a partnership, every partner is personally liable for all the partnership debts. For example, if there are three partners, any one can be sued for all the debts of the partnership. That partner would then have to get reimbursed by the other two. With a limited liability partnership, a partner is liable only for what he has invested in the partnership and has no personal liability beyond his investment.

Q. I sent a certified letter to a creditor to stop calling me at home and work, but he continues to do so. What can I do? He gets me very upset.

A. Getting you upset is just what he is trying to do. He hopes if you get upset enough, you will pay him money you may not otherwise be able to afford. If it is a creditor calling, not a third party debt collector, the law does not prohibit him from calling even after the letter. The best way to stop him is to talk to him when he calls. Stay calm, take a long time, and keep him on the line as long as possible. The more he yells, the calmer you stay. Tell him you want to pay, and ask if he has any suggestions about what you can do. Ask him to hold a few minutes while you feed the dog, cook dinner, or go jogging. As soon as he realizes calling isn't getting you upset or mad, my guess is he will stop.

Q. My husband told me he wants a divorce. I was shocked. I do not think we should get divorced. I believe we can work out any of our problems. What can I do to contest the divorce? He won't even talk to me.

A. If you mean what you can do to stop the divorce, the answer is nothing. Texas is known as a "no fault" divorce state. This means that you do not have to prove one or the other parties was at fault in causing the marriage to fail. If one party wants a divorce, there will be a divorce. You may be able to delay or postpone a divorce, but you cannot prevent it. All that is required to obtain a divorce is proof that "the marriage has become insupportable due to discord or conflict of personalities" that has destroyed the "legitimate ends of a marriage relationship," and that there is "no reasonable expectation of reconciliation." If one party, for example your husband, testifies with respect to this test, there are adequate grounds for the judge to grant the divorce. I suggest you hire an attorney, and explain your position. Your attorney may be able to arrange a mediation, where you and your husband can discuss his desire for a divorce. Perhaps if you get a chance to talk with your husband, he may change his mind.

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



4-H health programs take a pro-active approach to these issues and focus on prevention education rather than treatment and intervention. Cooperative programs teach teens how to make healthy choices about eating and exercising, and offer "real life" simulation, one-on-one coaching, large and small group meetings with guest speakers and health fairs that focus on teen wellness.

In addition to these programs, 4-H provides teens with opportunities to become effective peer leaders, mentors and positive role models.

In 4-H, being healthy means feeling good both inside and out, and being in harmony with friends, family, school and community. For more information contact your County Extension Office at 647-4115.




KYLE BIRKENFELD competes in the working cow horse event at the State Meet in Abilene. In addition, Kyle placed fourth in the team penning event.












Adam Reinart and Carter Hill in Method Demonstration at the District Roundup






