before late in the afternoon. In the opinion of the emperor's advisers the Petropavlovsk disaster occurred yesterday morning about 7 o'clock. It is presumed that Vice Admiral Makaroff sailed out from Port Arthur on the previous day to locate the enemy and had been cruising all night when he sighted the enemy, giving pursuit until Japanese reinforcements appeared, and then putting back for the shelter of the guns of Port Arthur. This explains the second sentence in Rear Admiral Crigorovitch's telegram: "Our

squadron was under Golden Hill." From private advices it was learned that the Grand Duke Boris was standing on Golden Hill, watching his brother's ship when the catastrophe occurred. Not a single paper here has a special telegram from Port Arthur this

TELEGRAMS OF CONDOLENCE

PARIS, April 14.-President Loubet today telegraphed to Emperor Nicholas his profound condolences on the disaster to Petropavlovsk and the death of Vice Admiral Makaroff. This dispatch, together with those of Emperor William and the king of Italy, sent yesterday, are regarded here as significant of the acceptance of European governments that the sinking of the Petropavlovsk was due to an accident and did not occur during the battle with the Japanese ships. Officials say condolences over the result of the battle might involve questions of neutrality. Prior to sending M. Loubet's telegram the French embassy at St. Petersburg received official assurance that the aceldent to the Petropavlovsk was caused by striking a mine which had become loosened from its moorings during the recent storm. Some special dispatches received here assert that the Japanese torpedoed the Petropavlovsk, but they accept the Russian version of the sinking of the battleship.

MAKAROFF'S SUCCESSOR ST. PETERSBURG, April 14 .- The Associated Press is informed that Chairman Doubass of the technical board of the admiralty is more likely to succeed Vice Admiral Makaroff than to the harbor. Search Reveals No Trace of One Member of Gun Crew-Court of Inquiry Is in Session, But No Finding Has Yet Been Made

PENSACOLA, Fla., April 14.-Two more ordinary seamen who were injured in the terrible explosion on board the battleprospects for the Cornell university boat ship Missouri at target practice yesterday are dead as a result. One died about midnight and the other this morning, after terrible suffering. There is also one man of the turret crew missing from the ship. either blown overboard a else escaped from the turret and jumped overboard, being crazed with pain and with the excitement that prevailed on the ship. He

was not noticed. Expert turret officers of the vessels in port say the explosion was the result of the wind blowing the flames back from the muzzle of the gun and through the open breech, thus igniting the powder charge that was being hoisted. Captain Cowles and Lieutenant Hamner, the ordinance officer, had taken extra precautions against such accidents, realizing such could occur and for three days no firing with large pieces on account of the wind being from off the shore. Finally yesterday morning it shifted and it was deemed safe to commence firing. Lieutenant Hamner remained in the turret watching the firing until the first string of shots had been fired in rapid succession. He thought from observations it was safe to allow continuation at rapid

Only three shots of the second string had been fired when the explosion occurred. So rapid was the gun being fired, POISONED BY CHLORAL barrel and when the powder was hoiste

it ignited. The officers have different causes of the explosion, but probably the exact cause will never be known, as there are

The board of inquiry which convened vesterday afternoon is still in session and ducted over the graves of the twenty-six cemetery at the navy yard. The Missouri moved down the harbor this morning to a point near the yard and at noon the twenty-six bodies were brought ashore. At 2 o'clock the funeral procession moved to the cemetery, where hundreds of the officers and blue jackets were present and the remains were interred. The bodies of five dead officers are being held here awaiting advices as to burial or shipment

COURT OF INQUIRY TO CONVENE TODAY

WASHINGTON, April 14.-Upon arrival at the navy department today, Secretary Moody gave orders for arrangements to be made for free transportation of all the bodies of officers and men killed on the battleship Missouri yesterday. If it is found there is no fund available for this purpose a request will be made to congress for a special appropriation.



Lieutenant W. C. Davidson, in charge WASHINGTON, April 14 .- The house ommittee on appropriations today has ompleted the general deficiency approplation bill, carrying a total of \$10,388,-744. The largest item in the bill is \$4,000,000 for pensions. Of this sum, \$1,500,000 is an estimated deficiency which would be caused by the execution of the recent service pension order. The majority members of the committee made a fight on this item and ordered it by a party vote. As the item is included, a minority report accompanies that of the majority to the public. The minority views are signed by Representatives Underwood, Brundige, Benton, F. Rolands, electrician, second Livingston and Pierce, Representative Taylor of Alabama being absent.







AN APPEAL FOR MEAT PRODUCER

It Is a Pity to See Shorthorn Kings Go Down Beneath the Beef Trust

(New York Post.)

Springer, the cowboys' candidate for vice president, asked at a recent cattlemen's convention why "the producer of meat, who feeds the world," should be singled out for financial destruction. Men button-holed one another in the hope of making 'deals' in cattle, but there were few who cared to buy at any price. Offers of \$17 a head for two-year-old steers were the best to be had, though before the packers perfected their combination the same class stock sold readily for \$22. More enthusiastic detractors of the trust declared that the decline in prices paid to the grower had been as much as 50 per cent, involving a total loss to the country of considerably more than \$500,000,000. "Whenever charges like these are ut-

tered by the stock growers, denials are made by the packers. But it is diffi-cult to convince theman of the prairies and stock farms that it is simply the law of supply and demand which regulates prices of live stock. The experience of a ranchman in Indian Territory, who, besides owning some thousands of cattle, runs a general supply store, is, however, full of significance for the plainsman's reasoning. This man submitted figures to prove that the price of cattle had decreased to such an extent that he no longer found it profitable to raise them, and at the same time, as a storekeeper, he knew that the prices charged by the packers for canned meats and refrigerated roducts are higher than when steers were bringing better rates at the Chicago stock yards. The story of the ranchman who went to Chicago with a train load of fat steers is familiar through having been told before a congressional committee. This shipper found at the stock yards only one buyer to bid on his cattle, and the price offered seemed absurdly low. He waited a day, at considerable expense, in the hope of getting another offer, but none came, and he was compelled to accept the original bid. Watching the herd after the sale, the ranch owner saw it divided and partitioned among a number of Chicago packing houses. The ranchman, therefore, concluded that competition among the great packing houses had ceased, and that he is, literally, at the mercy of a trust.

The general public shares the quarrel, With the prices of Uve stock far below the normal level, why does the price of meat to the consumer remain at the high level of three years ago, when cattle brought nearly twice as much in which was out of the ordinary. the Chicago markets as they do now? Yet, never the consumers make this wicked retailer's. The retailers, other of New York or Chicago, point, turn, to the prices they are charged by the packers. And when the investigators again crowd the packers, and figures are produced to convict the latter, the fault is skillfully shifted to the farmers. It is asserted-as a member of the firm of Swift & Co. stated in a Chicago newspaper-that the farmers found corn too expensive to feed to cattle, and as a consequence an unusual number were sent to market. That is an old argument

-too old to convince the cattle owners. Driven from one argument to another, as they have been, the final stand of the packers has been made on a refreshingly novel contention. At the office of the consul general from Argentina, in the produce exchange building, it was said that contracts have been made for a site for a large refrigerating plant and wharves for ocean-going steamships to carry

beef and mutton to this port. According to the information which has reached the consul general, Senor R. Alvarez de Toledo, a line of refrigerator steamers is to be established between Buenos Ayres and New York, and beef equal to the best product of our western plains is to be shipped here. Lamb and mutton that will hold its own with Canada's best is included in the project.



Nearly Seventy Thousand Separations Were Granted Last Year

NEW YORK, April 14.-For the first made to gather divorce statistics in the United States, and the result shows that in that time the yearly average of divorce as grown from 16,436 to about 70,000, or increased more than 400 per cent.

Father Otten has prepared for the Ronan Catholic Messenger a table of statistics of divorce for recent years, which shows that the percentage of increase fince 1887 has been growing steadily.

In Massachusetts in 1886 there was one divorce to every thirty-one marriages; in 1901, there was one to every twenty. In Ohio there had been in the former year one to every fifteen; in the latter there was one to less than eleven.
