Dimmitt Ethanol takes charge of former Cargill plant

The Dimmitt City Council at a Tuesday night meeting recently approved the transfer of the former Cargill plant to the City of Dimmitt Development Corporation, which then transferred the plant to Dimmitt Ethanol. The funds went from Dimmitt Ethanol to an escrow account and then to Cargill, according to Mayor Wayne Collins, who works for Dimmitt Ethanol.

"What this means is Dimmitt

Ethanol is owner of the plant and is moving ahead to convert it to an ethanol plant," Collins said. "We have entered into a contract with the engineering company, CJ Schneider Engineering Co. of Omaha, Neb., to provide Phase I and Phase II engineering services. They will have three representatives in Dimmitt on Monday evening to do their evaluations on the plant. They'll take that data back to Omaha and come back with price figures and preliminary







Had a great time but always glad to be back home!




What's the Law?

Q. I went into a nail saloon that I have been to many times in the past. After the services were performed, I went to pay what I had been paying. They told me the price had been raised and I owed twice as much. Is this legal?

A. It is not illegal to raise the price for something, even if you double the amount. In your case, however, the question is not whether the price increase is legal; the question is whether the new price is part of your contract with the salon.

Whenever you have a service performed, you enter into a contract with the service provider. The price is the price you agree to, or if no price is stated, a "reasonable price." My opinion is that in your case, a reasonable price is the price you had been charged in the past. Unless you were told of the price increase before the service was performed, the new price does not apply to this transaction. Of course, from this point on you are aware of the new price and will be subject to it.

I've been chatting with a few of my good friends and classmates about the DHS Class of 1996 reunion.


Cada vez que pienso que ya pasaron diez anos, me siento muy vieja.


my entry door. My door has only one lock. I am concerned that someone could easily break into my apartment, so I requested the landlord install an additional lock on the door. He refused to install an additional lock and told me that one lock was sufficient. I don't want to stay with only one lock on the door. Can I get out of my lease?

A. Generally, your landlord is required to install a door viewer and both a keyed and keyless deadbolt lock on your exterior door. After receiving notice from a tenant, the landlord will generally have 3 days to install the required viewer and locks or the tenant may terminate the lease. If, however, your lease contains a provision underlined or in boldface print notifying you of your rights regarding the required security devices, your landlord will have 7 days to install the devices before you can terminate your lease. The bottom line is if he refuses to install the locks, you can terminate your lease.

Alternate Route (Route 2) consisting of line segments A, F, and D. The alternate transmission line route (Route 2) will start one mile west and one mile south of the intersection of State Highway (SH) 86 and FM 1055, in Castro County at an electrical interchange facility owned by Southwestern Public Service Company (Castro County Interchange). From the Castro County Interchange the transmission line will proceed north approximately one mile to the north side of the SH 86; then the line turns west and continues along the north side of the SH 86 right of way for approximately 17.2 miles crossing over County Road (CR) 505, FM 1057, a DSEC 69kV transmission line, the Castro-Parmer county line and continues west along the north side of SH 86 past CR 23, FM 1172, CR 23, CR 21 and CR 20 to the intersection of SH 86 and SH 214; then the line turns north and continues along the east side of SH 214 approximately 1/8 mile and terminates at an existing electrical substation (Existing Substation 18) owned by Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative.
