## What's the Law?

Q. I went into a nail saloon that I have been to many times in the past. After the services were performed, went to pay what I had been paying. They told me the price had been raised and I owed twice as much. Is this legal?
A. It is not illegal to raise the price for something, even if you double the amount. In your case, however, the question is not whether the price increase is legal; the
question is whether the new price is part of your contract with the salon.
Whenever you have a service performed, you enter into a contract with the service provider. The price is the price you agree to, or if no price is stated, a "reasonable price." My opinion is that in your case, a reasonable price is the price you had been charged in the past. Unless you were told of the price increase before the service was performed, the new price does not apply to this transaction. Of course, from this point on you are aware of the new price and will be subject to it.

my entry door. My door has only one lock. I am concerned that someone could easily break into my apartment, so I requested the landlord install an additional lock on the door. He refused to install an additional lock and told me that one lock was sufficient. I don't want to stay with only one lock on the door. Can I get out of my lease?
A. Generally, your landlord is required to install a door viewer and both a keyed and keyless deadbolt lock on your exterior door. After receiving notice from a tenant, the landlord will generally have 3 days to install the required viewer and locks or the tenant may terminate the lease. If, however, your lease contains a provision underlined or in boldface print notifying you of your rights regarding the required security devices, your landlord will have 7 days to install the devices before you to install the locks, you can terminate your lease

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative (DSEC) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), seeking approval to build a $115-\mathrm{kV}$ transmission line extending approximately 18.3 miles. The new transmission line will begin the existing Castro County Interchange in Castro County (owned by Southwestern Public Service Company [SPS]). From the Castro County Interchange the line will go north approximately 1.0 mile, paralleling the east side of an existing SPS transmission line to the south side of Sate Highway (SH) 86, Just soum of 17.2 miles along the south side of SH 86 to the east side of SH 241 . The new transmission line will then parallel the east side of SH 241 continuing north to existing Substation 18 (approximately 0.1 mile). Along the route of the proposed transmission line DSEC plans to construct a new substation, Substation 22. The majority of the new transmission line as well as the proposed Substation 22 will be located in Parmer County, Texas. Approximately one-third of the line will be located in

Preferred Route (Route 1) consisting of line segments A, B, and D. The preferred transmission line route, wills start one mile west and one mile south of the intersection of State Highway (SH) 86 and FM 1055, in Castro County at an électrical interchange facility owned by Southwestern Public Service Company, (Castro County Interchange). From the Castro County Interchange the transmission line will proceed north approximately one mile to the south side of SH 86 ; then the line turns west and continues along the south side of the SH 86 right of way for approximately 17.2 miles,
crossing over County Road (CR) 505 FM 1524 , an SPS 69 kV transmission line, the Castro-Parmer crossing over County Road (CR) $505, \mathrm{FM} 1524$, an SPS 69 kV transmission line, the Castro-Parmer
