

GOSSIP FROM STATE CAPITAL

Judge Simmons Pushing His Candidacy for Attorney Generalship

AUSTIN, Texas, April 30.—Judge D. M. Simmons, formerly assistant attorney general, now candidate for chief of that department, was here yesterday.
