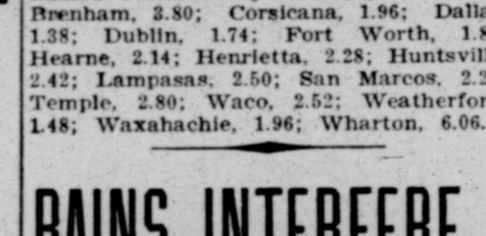

SAM HOUSTON THE NAME

FOURTH WARD SCHOOL

Another of the city school houses was named by the pupils at this morning's session, a vote for the purpose being taken in the Fourth ward school and the name of Sam Houston chosen.

A large percentage of the pupils were present at the session and a close vote was polled, 147 casting their ballots for Houston and 132 wishing the name of the school San Jacinto, after the famous battle.

Trustee William Capps, who introduced the letter asking for the choosing of patriotic names for the schools, stated this afternoon that the resolution called for the names of heroes only, and not for the battles or events in which they took a part, so that even if San Jacinto had been chosen it would probably have been found necessary to change it in order to conform with the action of the school board.

Well-Known Texas Ball Player Nearly Asphyxiated at Cincinnati—Saved by Presence of Mind of 15-Year-Old Girl

CINCINNATI, May 4.—A 15-year-old girl, Miss Mabel Biedebach, saved the life of Harry Steinfeldt, the Reds' crack third baseman, last night. Steinfeldt, who arrived home yesterday morning from St. Louis, suffering from a severe attack of lumbago, was about to retire last evening in his room in the aristocratic Biedebach hotel, on Walnut Hills, when he accidentally pulled down a chandelier, causing the gas to escape. Owing to his crippled condition "Steiny" failed in his effort to properly turn off the flow. He did not discover this, however, until he had gone to bed, and then, in a semi-conscious state he crawled to the door and cried for help. It was then that Mabel, the young daughter of Mrs. Biedebach, who conducts the hotel, proved herself a heroine. She heard Steinfeldt's cries and ran to his room, where she found him on his hands and knees trying to force himself out of the door. With rare presence of mind the young lady raised the ball player's head and with one mighty effort dragged his body to the hallway, a few feet away. Fortunately the ball player was conscious enough to assist Miss Biedebach in her heroic task, or he might have fallen unconscious before assistance reached him. The commotion aroused other guests of the hotel and in a short time a dozen friends were at the side of the unfortunate man. Gene Lutz, who resides at the hotel, with several others, assisted in getting Steinfeldt into another room. At a late hour last night he was pronounced out of danger. Dr. Ed Walker is attending him.
