PEOPLE PROTEST AGAINST MOVE PROPOSED

Chambers Hill Property Owners Want Fire Station to Remain in That Section of the City for Protection

There is much opposition to the proposition which has been made to move the Chambers Hill fire station to another part of the city, and Alderman Parker of the Third ward showed by his speech at the last meeting of the council that he will make a warm protest before it is accomplished.

The sentiment on Chambers Hill is against the removal of the station. A reporter for The Telegram yesterday called on some of the residents out here to ascertain just what they think of it, and all who were talked to made earnest protest.

James Pinto "The removal of the fire station from the district comprising Chambers Hill would be a very foolish thing for the city to do, and I am surprised that Chief Maddox would recommend such action to the city council," said James Pinto, a heavily interested property holder of the East side and one of the oldest inhabitants of that part of the city.

It would indeed be a foolish move and would take away from this part of town the only thing the city has ever done for us in the way of public improvements or conveniences. Just now this section of the city is on a good substantial growth occasioned by the erection of the Northern Texas Traction Company's new car barns, which have been instrumental in bringing at least fifty additional families to the East side.

best part of our section of the city. DR. S. G. BITTICK Dr. S. G. Bittick, who conducts a drug store at 900 East Front street, said: "When I decided to locate a drug store in Fort Worth I was told by friends that this section of the city was the ragged end of nowhere, but after looking the ground over I found that we had fire protection in the immediate neighborhood and with the gradually increasing population I decided that a location here would be a profitable one and with these things in mind I opened my business here, as you see, with a block of the fire station. Now that the city wishes to remove the station we will be left entirely without any conveniences or improvements whatever. I have been here only for a short time but long enough to see that this east part of Fort Worth is destined to become more popular and judging from the amount of new building going on it will be a matter of only a short time until we will be as thickly populated as any other part of Fort Worth. If the South Side is to have a new station, let the city build them one, but by no means injure this part of town for the betterment of some other part."

THOMAS J. MABEN Thomas J. Maben lives on East Twentieth street. He is opposed to the station being removed and believes it would be dangerous to the property interests. "The people who are paid to have that station established," said Mr. Maben, "and I think the city should improve the building rather than think of moving it. We need it there, we have a well settled community and some of the nicest frame houses in town are in that part of the city. That part of the Third ward has very little from the city, and the removal of this station would take all we have."

D. A. CROMER D. A. Cromer, who lives on East Twentieth street, is a property owner who is protesting against the station being moved. He wants the property owners to get active and secure signatures to a petition which will make a strong protest to the council against the proposed removal.

HIGHER EDUCATION FOR THE MINISTRY

Rev. Chas. Briggs Says It Is Absurd for Theologians to Be Afraid of Truth

NEW YORK, May 10.—Rev. Charles Briggs, of the faculty of Union Theological Seminary, in an address on "The Higher Theological Education" before the seminary has said among other things: "Ecclesiastical domination is the greatest foe of theology. The peril of ecclesiastical domination is not dangerous in this country to any extent except through the organized ministers and theological schools. The Christian ministry is no longer what it ought to be, where the best educated man in the community is not the minister. The public estimate of the ministry and the church declines when the congregation is better educated than the minister. We must have enough higher education than is given in the theological seminaries to make it impossible to believe that the greater numbers of the world, the heathens, are doomed to eternal damnation. We have an enlarged view of our world, and if it is true that the other worlds are inhabited we must adopt our theory to them. The religious value of the Bible is greater when it is stripped of impossibilities. How much greater is God if He did not live in indefinite lideness before creating the world in six days. There is nothing more absurd than for the theologian to be afraid of the truth. There is no schism in the real truth. The systematic theology of the future will not be denominational, but constructed by the inductive and generic methods of organized theology."

TAKEN FROM BARN 60 HOURS AFTER FIRE NEW YORK, May 10.—Two horses—one a blooded roadster, the other a big truck animal—have been taken alive from beneath the ruins of the Universal Storage house which was burned last Friday night. They were in the basement which was filled with nearly six feet of water and apparently had saved themselves from death by holding their heads above the flood and near a small window.

CELEBRATE 60 YEARS OF MARRIED LIFE AUSTIN, Texas, May 10.—Last night Mr. and Mrs. Fitz Hostian, two of Austin's oldest citizens, celebrated their sixtieth anniversary of their marriage at their home, 916 Congress avenue. In addition to numerous children, grand children and thirteen great-grand children, scores of other relatives and friends called to pay their respects and offer congratulations. A party was given from Germany to Austin in 1846 and opened a book bindery in which for many years he did all the binding for the state. Later he sold this business and accepted a position of expert book binder in the technical school at the deaf and dumb institute, which he filled acceptably until advancing age compelled him to retire. He has been a patron of music and other arts, and was one of the founders of the Maennerchor, a society that never missed a Singschmest until its ranks were decimated by death that but few were left.

The announcement in the morning papers of the death at Beaumont of Joe Lee Jameson was a shock to his many friends in North Texas, and although it has been known that he was ill, it was not believed that the illness would be fatal.

Mr. Jameson was one of the best known young men in Texas. He was reared in McLennan county and after several years in clerical work, for a time being in the office of the county clerk, he became a representative in Waco for the Dallas News. Later he was appointed bookkeeper at the Southwestern asylum for the insane, at San Antonio, during the Hogg administration.

Dr. W. L. Barker of Waco being at that time the superintendent. He took quite an active part in politics and was for a long time state revenue agent. He was appointed secretary of the campaign committee during the year Governor Sayers made the race for governor, and had his headquarters in this city at the Delaware hotel.

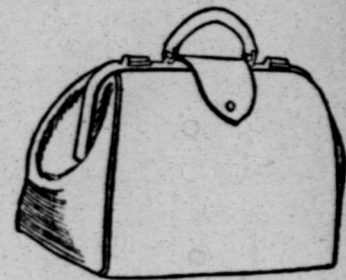
Mr. Jameson was married in 1891 at Moody, Texas, to Miss Ammie Routh. His wife and two children survive him, and there is one child dead. The deceased was a prince of good fellows, a generous man, and one with energy. He maintained a most excellent standing with all who knew him, and his friends were state wide.

He was always ready to come to the assistance of a friend, and he has traveled across the state to do the bidding of one to whom he could be of benefit. The funeral is to take place tomorrow afternoon in Austin. When the news of the death of Mr. Jameson reached George Diehl, state president of the Travelers' Protective Association, he immediately sent a telegram of condolence to the widow.

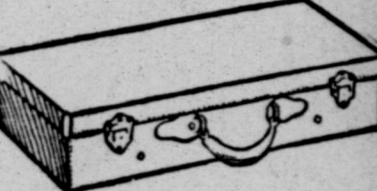

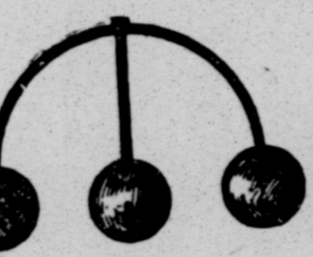

In 1896 he announced himself as a candidate for treasurer of Burleson county, was elected by a large majority, has been re-elected to same position since that year, and was still holding it when killed last Saturday night.

He was tall, quick in movement, quick in speech and nervous in disposition, very talented and a man of deep-seated convictions.

CAPTAIN TUCKER HAS FAITH IN THE WICHITAS

Captain E. W. Tucker, who is interested in mining properties in the Wichita mountains, is in the city having arrived here a few days ago from Roosevelt, where headquarters are maintained by all those who have claims in the mountains. He was seen last night at his hotel and was in a joyous mood over the prospects of eventually seeing the Wichitas develop into a second "Leadville," and he actually believes that the day is not far distant when this will be the case. There is a great amount of development work being done by miners and

each day rich findings are reported. One mill or reduction works is already ready for actual operations and the mill with which the captain is connected is about ready to be put up. Most of the machinery being on the ground. This mill will cost about \$35,000, and will be the means of testing the worth of the ores that are now being brought to the surface.

Captain Tucker has interested with him in the mines several well known men of Fort Worth business men, and he believes that the future of the Wichitas as a mining district is assured.

There has been much trouble caused during the past year on account of derogatory publications on the strength of reports supposed to be made by government experts, but the truths have never been made public through these sources, and despite the efforts to damage the district as a mining proposition, practical mining men have continued to invest and make development of claims which are now proving to the world that gold, and in paying quantities, exists. Assays have been made by acknowledged assayers in different parts of the United States and all of them report paying ores.

DOCTORS ARE TO MAKE A FIGHT ON QUACKS

Medical Society Will Take Up the Medical Laws and Make an Effort to Have Violators Prosecuted

At the next meeting of the Fort Worth Medical Association the question of the enforcement of the state medical laws will be discussed and it is the general impression that some action will be taken looking to a prosecution of those who are violating them.

The state laws regarding the practice of medicine are very rigid, and the local physicians believe that it is the duty of the Medical Association to take the matter up and advise the officers where they know violations of the law are being followed. Just who the alleged "quacks" are does not develop in the discussion which is being had on the subject, but the physicians appear to be in earnest in the matter.

COOPER WANTS PAY FOR HIS CORN CROP

At a recent meeting of the city council Charles Hall was elected superintendent of the dumping ground. Ike Cooper has held the place a long time, the compensation being the fees charged for the burial of carcasses and offal which is required by ordinance to be so disposed of, and the use of the dumping ground property for farming purposes. When the new superintendent went to take charge, Cooper wanted pay for his crop. He has in seven acres of corn and a crop of wheat. The wheat he can gather himself, but the corn is not so far along. He disagreed with Hall on the price, and this morning the council held a special meeting to consider the matter. All the aldermen were present except Mr. Lehane and Mr. Lydon. After a discussion of the matter, it was decided to leave it to a committee composed of Mr. Moreland and Mr. Ward and the city attorney, with instructions to agree on a price.
