
Editorial Comments

Subrogation has been defined in egal text books as the substitution of one person in the place of another, whether as creditor or as a possessor of some lawful claim, so that he who is substituted succeeds to the rights of the other in relation to the debt or claim.

One very frequent use of subroourness that constipation often brings. surance. An individual is involved in an accident, and his vehicle damaged. His insurance company pays for fixing up his vehicle, and takes a right of subrogation against the other party from the holder of the policy. Then the inurance company sues the negligent party in the name of their policy holder, and in case of recovery, in the name of their policy holder, they become entitled to receive so much of the judgment against the negligent party, as is necessary to pay off the money which the insurance company has advanced to the holder of the policy.






