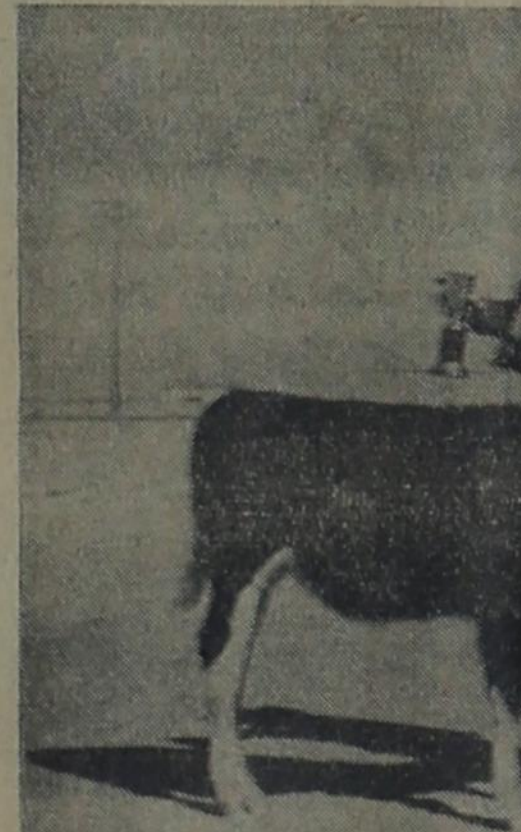

## Cancer Educational Meeting Held Here

Under the direction of Dr. R. E. Cogswell, chairman of the Cancer Research Organization of Castro County, an educational meeting was held Friday evening in the high school auditorium. Speakers for the program, Dr. William Clingensmith and Dr. W. E. Laur from Amarillo, were introduced by Dr. Jerry Culwell.

Dr. Clingensmith spoke on cancer of the lung showing slides picturing differing stages of the disease. He stressed the fact that the stage of easy detection of internal cancer is one where the disease has reached the point of difficult treatment. He stated that the doctor must depend much on what the patient tells him. Symptoms of cancer of the lung are pain, coughing, repeated attacks of pneumonia and bringing up blood. Indications are, Dr. Clingensmith said, that cancer of the lung may result from heavy and prolonged smoking as it occurs most frequently in men who have smoked as much as a pack of more of cigarettes daily for twenty years. Doctors feel that if this is so, cancer of the lung will begin to show up more and more in women as the twenty year period of heavy smoking by women has been reached.

Dr. Laur spoke on cancer of the skin stating that this section of the country is one of the worst (Continued on back page)

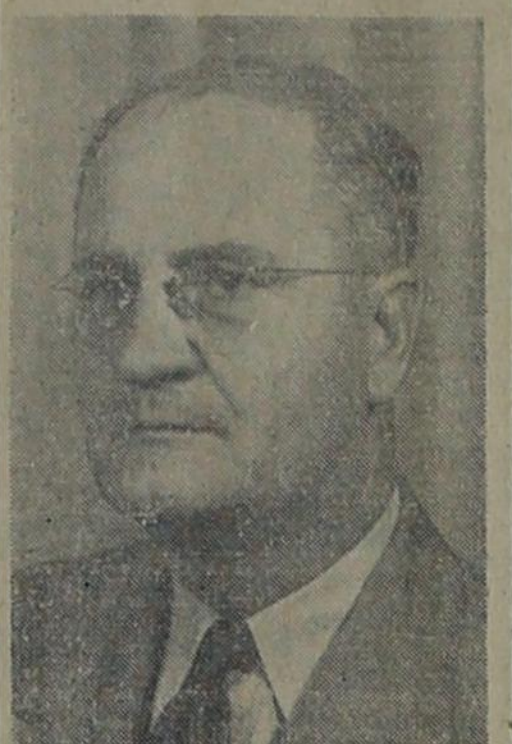
Every dairyman in the county is urged to participate in the show at all possible, and now is the time to be fitting animals that are to be exhibited at the Dairy Show.

Mr. Archie Meekma, Associate Dairy Husbandman, from College Station will be on hand to classify and judge the show, McLeroy stated.

## Jesse M. Osborn Is Candidate For State Legislature

In keeping with the nationwide trend to put government back into the hands of qualified businessmen came the announcement this week that Jesse M. Osborn of Muleshoe will be a candidate for State Representative, 96th district of Texas.

A successful banker, rancher and farmer, Mr. Osborn entered the race at the request of many



friends over the newly formed, five-county district. Backers of Mr. Osborn say that although his interests are still extensive, he will have sufficient time to devote to the office. His election, friends feel, will be in keeping with the trend toward closer supervision of spending of state money, and the replacement of professional politicians and college students in Austin by the kind of men who made Texas a great state.

Born at Okalona, Ark., Aug. 14, 1894, Mr. Osborn came to this area in 1924, when he became associated with the Friona State Bank. He remained in Parmer County until 1931, when he went to Muleshoe with the Muleshoe State Bank. He is still president of the Muleshoe Bank, but is assisted by an active vice-president. In addition to the banking business, Mr. Osborn has also engaged in farming and now has a small herd of Registered cattle.

"I do not plan to make an active or extensive campaign," he said. "Many of my friends have come to me and asked me to make this race. If the people see fit to elect me to this office, I will do my best to represent these five counties honestly, to their best interests, and to the welfare of the State of Texas. If I could not go to Austin without obligation to any person or group of persons, I would not go at all. The campaigning will have to be done by my friends—and that's the way it should be. Like many of you, I feel that we must have some changes in our government, especially in regards to wild spending. If the people of the district want me to try this job, I am willing to do the best and only way I know, the way I have always tried to live and conduct my own business."

Mr. Osborn has never before sought or held a public office, but has taken an interest in community and regional affairs.

Friends of Mr. Osborn say: "We got Jess into this race, because we think it's time the people who pay the bill take more interest. It will be a financial sacrifice on his part to accept, but he is willing on the basis of service. He is a successful business man, and we feel that more men of this type are needed in our government. If you want more information regarding Jess Osborn, just ask some of the folks who have known or been associated with him."

## Candidates File For City Office

Three petitions were filed with the City Secretary this week petitioning the City Commission to place the names of E. B. Wright on the city ballot for the office of Mayor and the names of Harold Stephens and Charlie Hays on the ballot as candidates for the offices of commissioner. The petitions were filed by friends, and with the consent of the candidates. The retiring commission, composed of L. G. Manning, Mayor, and Clarence Bearden and Ernest Jones, refused to permit their names to be placed on the ballot. The city election will be held on Tuesday, April 1.

## E. I. McLain Is Candidate For Commissioner

## Pan Tech Farms to Hold Field Day

The second annual Pan Tech Farms field day will be held April 11, on the experiment farm near Panhandle, according to J. P. Smith, manager of the farm. A very interesting and informative program has been planned.

The interest being shown by the breeders, feeders and commercial cattlemen in the bull progeny test is of the best and the wheat grazing studies, sheep cross-breeding and greenbug research project are proving very effective at the Pan Tech Farms according to County Agent Edd C. McLeroy.

The program will start at 9:00 a. m., Friday morning, April 11, and will continue throughout the day. The noon meal will be in the form of a barbecue and will be \$1.00 per plate.

L. A. Maddox, Jr., animal husbandman for Pan Tech Farms, and project leader for the bull progeny test will lead the discussion of this years feeding results. One hundred and thirty-one bulls representing thirty-six sire groups have been fed uniformly since last November.

Dr. H. R. Crookshank, research chemist for the Bureau of Animal Industry at Pan Tech Farms, will lead the discussion on the development and results of the wheat pasture grazing studies that have been conducted.

All Castro County beef cattle feeders and breeders should attend this meeting if they are interested in bull progeny testing, McLeroy declared. The inherited ability of cattle to put on weight should be of interest to all cattle feeders and breeders and this is an excellent opportunity to learn more about those inherited abilities of different types of cattle, McLeroy said.

## Geo. J. Dieter Dies As Result of Fall

Injuries he received while falling from a garage roof Saturday, March 14 proved fatal Monday night Tuesday, March 18, to George J. Dieter, 79, until recently a resident of Plainview.

Dieter received a skull fracture in the accident which occurred at the farm home of his son-in-law, O. W. Schmidt, north of Lockney. He had never regained consciousness. He was being treated by his son-in-law repair the garage roof when he fell.

Dieter, a retired farmer, lived at Plainview and in Castro County for forty years. A native of Nebraska, he moved to Young County, Texas, in 1890 and to Hale County in 1912. He lived in Hale County until 1930 when he and his family moved near Dimmitt. In 1947 Mr. and Mrs. Dieter returned to Plainview.

Mrs. Dieter died two months ago. She was the victim of a heart attack that occurred a few minutes after she stood in her front yard while several ambulances passed nearby on their way to the scene of a highway accident.

Mr. Dieter had made his home with the Schmidts since Mrs. Dieter's death.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon at the St. Paul's Lutheran Church. Rev. Donald V. Hafemann, the pastor, officiated. Interment was in the Plainview Park.

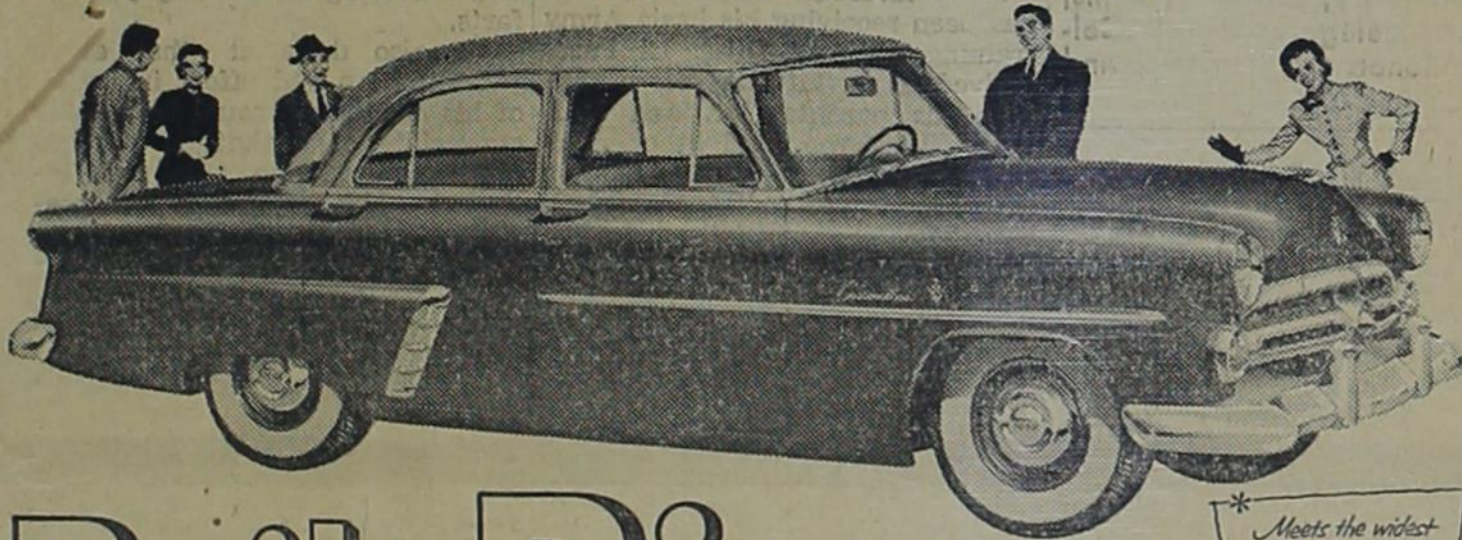

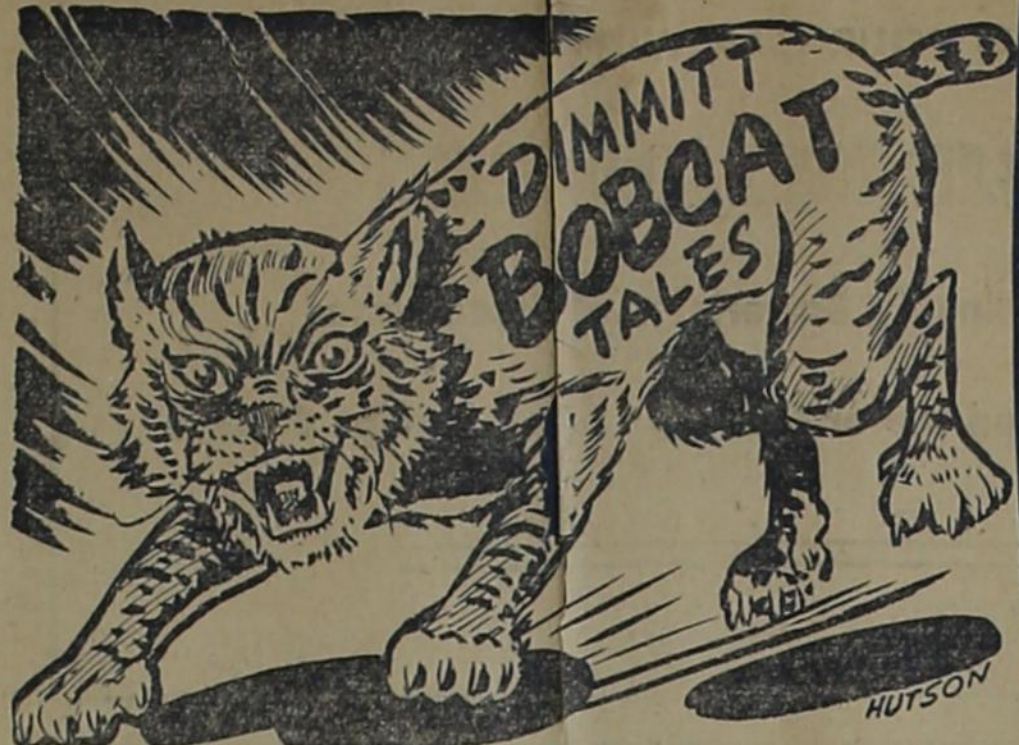

for the development of this type of cancer due to direct exposure to the rays of the sun. People dwelling in places of lower elevation and in those over which there is a layer of smog and dust develop skin cancer at a much later age than those of us living on the plains. Dr. Lauer cautioned those who do outdoor work to protect the face and hands from direct sunlight. He stated that any thickening or growth of spots on the skin and birthmarks or moles blue or black in color should be reported to the doctor.

Since early treatment of cancerous condition is the only way to defeat the killer, the public must join hands with the medical profession through education and prompt action to make progress in this direction.

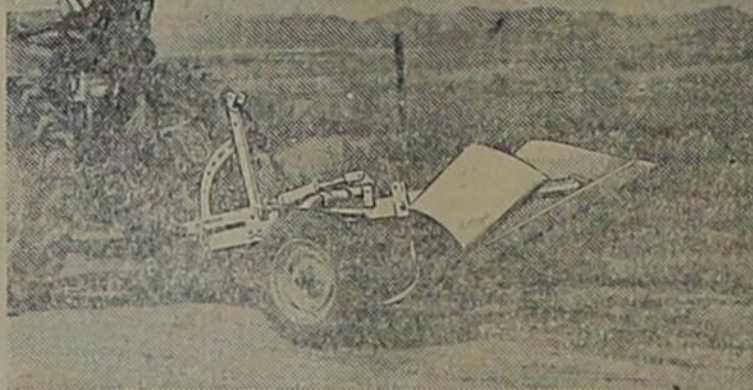
**THE LAW AND YOU**

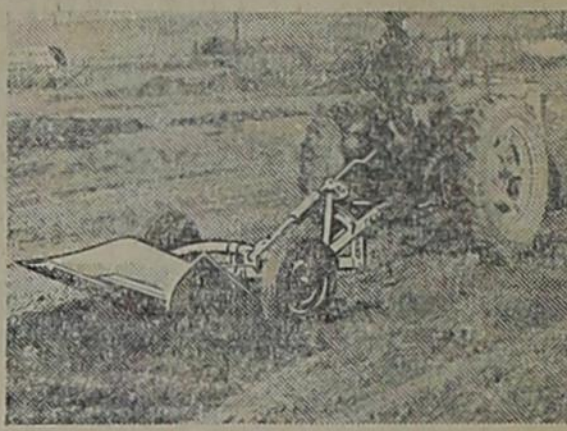
Subrogation has been defined in legal text books as the substitution of one person in the place of another, whether as creditor or as a possessor of some lawful claim, so that he who is substituted succeeds to the rights of the other in relation to the debt or claim.

One very frequent use of subrogation is in connection with insurance. An individual is involved in an accident, and his vehicle damaged. His insurance company pays for fixing up his vehicle, and takes a right of subrogation against the other party from the holder of the policy. Then the insurance company sues the negligent party in the name of their policy holder, and in case of recovery, in the name of their policy holder, they become entitled to receive so much of the judgment against the negligent party, as is necessary to pay off the money which the insurance company has advanced to the holder of the policy.
