

YAZOO CITY IS PROTECTED BY MILITARY

Two Companies Now Patrol Burned City Which Is Under Martial Law

FEW BUILDINGS ESCAPE

Four Banks Were Destroyed But Money in Them Had Been Removed

YAZOO CITY, Miss., May 26.—This town is under martial law as a result of a disastrous conflagration yesterday. Several negroes caught attempting to steal salvage have been arrested. Two military companies now patrol the burned district.

The loss is variously estimated between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000 and insurance probably will approximate 50 per cent of the loss.

GENERAL TYNER FOUND NOT GUILTY

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Within twenty-two minutes of the retirement of the jury in the case of James N. Tyner and Harrison J. Barrett, tried on charges of conspiracy in connection with their activities as law officers of the postoffice department, a verdict of not guilty was returned.

General Tyner, expecting a longer wait, had been wheeled from the room, and his nephew and co-defendant hastened to give an order which caused him to return.

ELECTRICITY CLAIMS VICTIM IN SUBWAY

NEW YORK, May 26.—Electricity in the subway has claimed its first victim. While the light currents were being tested Foreman John Southward received a current of 30,000 volts. He was thrown from a ladder up which he had ventured to examine the duct carrying the cable and died instantly.

He is said to have gone away disguised as an invalid.

NORTH FORT WORTH, May 26.—Moderate receipts of cattle, outside competition and higher markets at Chicago and Kansas City bulled values here for an advance of 10 to 15 cents on best heavy cattle with the ordinary and average grades strong and active at present quotations.

One small bunch of prime fed steers sold at \$4.10, with several loads to an outside buyer at \$4.00 and the bulk to the packers at \$3.30@3.90.

All grades of the stuff sold in line with steer trading. Although the general quality was hardly as good as usual. Good fat butcher cows sold at \$2.50@2.75, medium butcher stock \$2.00@2.40 and the ordinary killing kinds at \$1.50@2.00.

Calves and bulls were in good demand and the yards were cleared early at satisfactory prices by the salesmen.

Hogs were in light supply today and stimulated by higher markets in the north the run sold early at strong prices, as compared with Wednesday's best time.

Should the summer movement of medium weight hogs pick up a little between this time and the 1st of August values as a whole might show a slight improvement over current quotations.

The Clarendon Barber-Stockman prints the following interesting story of cattle conditions today and four years ago, in which it points out the effect of prices under the sway of the republican party.

At that time yearlings were worth \$17 to \$20 and 2-year-old steers would bring \$25. We were told: "Keep the republican party in power; it is responsible for the high price of cattle."

EXPENSES MAY BE BAR TO FENCIBLES

The state may yet be persuaded to make an appropriation sufficient to pay the expenses other than transportation to the fair.
