Jack Gregory Visits Purina Research Farms



The measuring device consists in the main of a seamless aluminum tube, 8 inches in outside diameter, equipped with a 6-inch All members and associate circular outlet. In installing it for test, one end of the tube is slipped into the end of the discharge and clamps. .The tube, a little less than 8 feet in length, is equipped about two-thirds of the way toward the outlet end with a small pipe, about one-half inch in size and a few inches long. A few feet of rubber hose (flexible) is attached to the small pipe and the hose is secured to a brace pipe so it will be elevated, something like

three feet above the outlet tube. Height of water in the small side tube is used for computation of quantity of water from the well. Actually, it is a velocity test, Lewis will explain, and rise of the water in the tube is sometimes influenced by turbulence or lack of turbulence of the stream coming from the pump. However, the test will average within two percent of actual flow.
