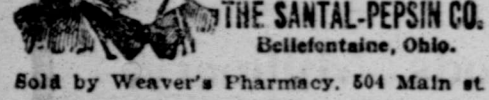

TRADE AND CITIES AS PAID UP ON WORLD FAIR FUND

Secretary Paddock of Board of Trade Announces the Full Amount Has Been Raised

"Fort Worth always comes to the front, no matter what it undertakes," said Secretary B. B. Paddock of the Board of Trade this morning, referring to the matter of raising the pro rata of Tarrant world's fair commission.

Secretary Paddock this morning received a check for \$1,000 from one Fort Worth corporation, which is naturally modest, as all corporations are, and does not care to be paraded before the public as being so "liberal."

The assessment against Tarrant county by the Texas World's Fair commission was \$4,807. The total collections already made by the local committee are \$1,501 leaving an uncollected amount of \$3,306, which Secretary Paddock says will be forthcoming.

Secretary Paddock stated today that the work of securing pictures of different business and residence buildings in Fort Worth which are to be given a conspicuous place in the Texas building at the fair is about to reach its end, and parties who desire to be represented in the group are earnestly asked to send in their photographs to the Board of Trade at as early a period as possible.

YOUTHFUL RABBI IS TO HOLD SERVICE IN THIS CITY

D. Haber Is Less Than Twenty Years of Age, But Is of Much Ability

One of the youngest cantors in this country, now aged only 18 years, will conduct the services of the Congregation Ahavath Shalom on Friday evening at 8 o'clock and Saturday morning at 8:30 o'clock, at the Jewish synagogue, 827 Taylor street.

The youthful rabbi, D. Haber, who comes from New York, is in this city at the request of Congregation Ahavath Shalom, and it is expected that all members of the faith will attend the services conducted by him.



His coming is an event of unusual interest to the Jewish people of this city, as he is one of the most noted men in their church. At the present time he is but 18 years of age, and is qualified to conduct all services of the church. His first preaching occurred when he was but 12 years of age, and since that time he has constantly been engaged in the work. CITIES CANNOT FIX LIMITS LOCATION OF SALOONS

Important Decision Is Handed Down by the Court of Criminal Appeals

AUSTIN, June 16.—Court of criminal appeals in remanding the case of ex-parte Levine from Navarro county, majority holds that the legislature has no authority to confer on cities power to prescribe limits for the location of saloons. The majority hold that the city council of Corsicana was not properly created under the Ellison bill. But the city court provisions can be disregarded and a charter upheld. The majority expresses no opinion as to the commission feature in regard to the city charter.

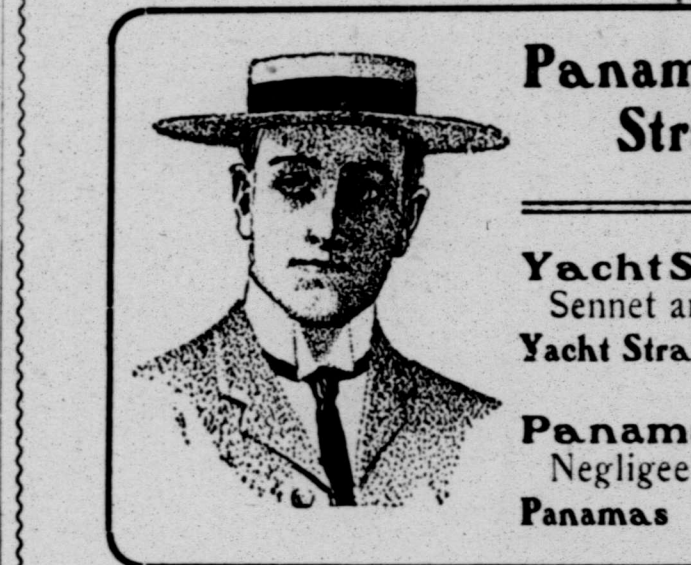

FURNACE OUTPUT ON THE DECREASE

Statement of the Condition of the Trade by the Iron Trade Review

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 16.—Discussing market conditions, the Iron Trade Review in its current issue says: Restriction in pig iron production is still under way and midsummer promises to show a marked falling off from the high point reached in April, when furnace output was at the rate of 19,000,000 tons a year. An accumulation of 100,000 tons of merchant furnace pig iron on May 1 and June 1, from what would produce 19,000,000 a year to what would produce 17,500,000, shows that the slowing down process is not only needed, but that a vigorous beginning has been made. In the past week one merchant furnace and four steel works blast furnaces in the central west (three at Mingo Junction and one at Cleveland) have been added to the list. In addition the closing of two Bessemer steel plants is announced and the open hearth plant at South Sharon, Pa.

is to go out. Decreasing consumption of iron and steel are plainly reflected in the June 1 statistics, as well as in the news of the week and the recent curtailment, with the exception of one furnace in the Chicago district, has had no relation to the restricted movement of ore on the lakes. The strike as a factor in the iron market is no longer to be considered. Its complete collapse has come and before the end of the week a large fleet will be under way. Against about 700,000 tons of iron as brought down at this time last year, the predictions that movement has been less than 100,000 tons.

With July 1 but two weeks ahead, labor questions are important to the iron trade, particularly as the bar iron conference has adjourned without an agreement, after the manufacturers had presented vigorously a request for a reduction of 15 per cent from last year's scale, with a \$4.50 base price for puddling instead of \$5 on 1 cent bar iron. The sheet and tin plate scales also present large obstacles to the agreement and the probability of several weeks' idleness after July 1 in the various rolling mills governed by the Amalgamated Association scale is not remote.

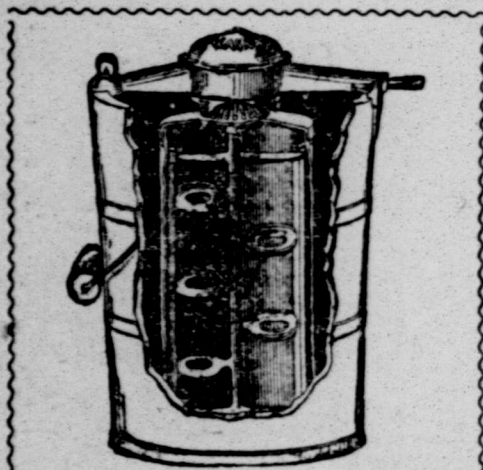

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GOVERNOR REFUSES TO INTERFERE IN THE SENTENCE

Executive Clemency Is Withheld From a Condemned Man of Live Oak County Who Must Hang

AUSTIN, Texas, June 16.—Governor Latham yesterday declined to commute the sentence of death imposed upon Vicente Lisano in the district court of Live Oak county and the condemned man will now hang at Oakville next Friday.

Lisano was convicted of the murder of C. Sol in November, 1903. The act was committed with an ax while the victim was asleep, who was robbed of \$18 and a part of his clothing. The murderer fled toward the Rio Grande and was apprehended several days later some miles above Rio Grande City by Sheriff Wash Shely of Starr county.

He was returned to Live Oak county, tried, convicted and condemned to be hung. While Lieutenant Governor Neal was acting as governor he granted Lisano a twenty days' respite, which has now expired.

Further details of the murder form a very remarkable story, in some respects one of the most remarkable in criminal annals.

Lisano is only 18 years old, his victim said to be only 18 also, and the booty was only \$18. He claimed that the murder was committed while he was asleep and having a most passionate dream that he was having a most desperate encounter, in which he was in danger of losing his life.

Immediately after the crime was committed Lisano attired himself in the murdered man's shoes, undershirt, hat and pants and had on these articles of wearing apparel when arrested 200 miles from the scene.
