NAPLES, Oct. 10 .- The corriere Del Matino today publishes an interview with Russo-Chinese Navigation Company, who escaped from Port Arthur on a junk and the statement that Port Arthur will never fall through hunger.

The stores of provisions accumulated to desire Russian troops to retire.' before the war are immense and practically not yet touched, while Chinese junks are continuing daily service, thus replenshing the supplies. The junks, M. Verblunsky added, escape the vigilance of the Japanese fleet by following the irregularities of the coast. ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 10, 1:15 p. m -Formal announcement that General Kuropatkin is at last strong enough to assume the offensive, together with the unefficial reports that offensive movements against the three armies of Field Marshal Oyama have been progressing since October 4. has sent a thrill of joy throughout Russia. The announcement, which has been awaited patiently through the long, weary months of discouragement and defeat, had an instantaneous effect. The public bulletin boards at the street corners, upon which were posted copies of Kuropatkin's order today, were surrounded by crowds, really cheerful for the first time since the war began,

Last night at the Russian club where General Velitchko, the engineer who fortifled Llao Yang, was delivering a lecture in defence of Kuropatkins' abandonment of that place, reading of the order created a scene of enthusiasm and a telegram was sent Kuropatkin, expressing the deepest satisfaction and unshaken confidence in his leadership, and praising the chivalrous acts. saying: "Like Russian warriors of old, you

warned the enemy, you are advancing against him.' Kurepatkin's order in part is as fol-



REPORT OF TRIALS BY COURTMARTIALS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 .- The annual report of General George Davis, judge advocate general, to the secretary of war shows total numebr of trials by general courtmartial during the year to have been 4,249, being 1,026 les than in the preceding year. The marked diminution in the number of trials by general courtmartial, which amounts to nearly 20 per cent of the number cases tried in the year ending June 20 1903, says the judge advocate general, is very gratifying as indicating the conditions of the military service are now such as require less frequent resort to courtmartial proceedure in order to maintain discipline in the military establishment. It is also noted only two persons were

tried by military commission, seventy less than in the preceeding year. Thirty commissioned officers were con victed by general court courtmartial the sentences being disapproved in two cases and four acquitted, 3,897 enlisted men convicted, and sentences disapproved in forty-six cases. The number of enlisted men acquitted after trial were 311. Nine officers were dis missed by sentence and in four cases the sentence of dismissal was commuted to a loss of numbers. The number of men sentenced to dishonorable discharge was 2,056. Appended to the report are extracts from the reports of judge advocates of the departments. There are almost as many qualifications demanded by the law for the exercise of the voting privilege as there are states in the union. There is a widespread but Ray, H. Poe, J. L. Dodson, L. D. There is another very widespread misapprehension to the effect that it is only in the south where property or educational tests are applied.

The most liberal of all states in granting the electoral privilege to its inhabitants are the three above mentioned. In these states women can vote for president. In Illinois, Kansas and several others of the eastern states women are allowed partial voting privileges, being allowed to vote for school trustees and other local officials. But it is only in the three states mentioned that the women are allowed a voice in choosing

a president. In Alabama the statute requires voters to be "citizens of good character and understanding" or aliens who have declared their intention to become such; but before being permitted to vote they must exhibit a receipt showing they have paid and persons dishonorably discharged from

Strangely enough, the only difference between the qualifications in Alabama and Arkansas is the omission of the requirement of "good character."

Connecticut has an educational condition. The citizen must be able to read and write English. In Mississippt voter must not only be able to read, but the statute requires that he must read "and understand" the constitution.
