'After Weeks of Weary Trench Digging, the Attacking Party Flings Heavy Forces Against the Defenses-Two More Assaults Necessary

The result of the early fighting is unknown. The Japanese have been preparing for this assault for a month. The bombardment continued furlously until after noon of October 26, when the Russian guns on Etz untain, Rints mountain and Rihylung mountain became briefly silent at o'clock. That afternoon a regiment o Japs swept out from behind a recently eaptured hill adjacent to Rihylung moun-tain and advanced on the Russian trenches lying between Rihylung mountain and the railroad, occupying them after hours of fighting. The Russians stuck to the positions until the Japanese were within a few yards, both sides hurling and grenades at each other. The Japanese infantry is now using mechanical devices which enable them to throw enades with great accuracy and rapidity. In the meanwhile another body of Japs assaulted the trenches on the slope of Rihylung mountain.

Eighty Per Cent of Those Who Exercise Right of Suffrage in the State of Utah Are of the Fair Sex

Newspaper Enterprise Asso.) SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Oct. .- To he women of Utah politics is a game, a dissipation, an amusement-but never a Wyoming and Idaho.

After having been granted a voice in the affairs of the nation, the women of Utah became so self-satisfied that they decided they would simply do their part on election day, and keep out of the political campaigns.

This lofty view of woman and the balot worked fairly well until recently Wemen virtually rule the state of Utah, easting almost 80 per cent of the total vote. They quietly informed their servints-the men in office-as to their wishes, and the same were speedily carried

This year came an awakening-an awful hock to the women of Utah, regardless of party. The men-who had obeyed so willingly-turned them down. They were not consulted or the personnel of the tickets put in the field-an unpardonable

Since that time, not only the churches at Travis and Plum Grove have passed from the face of the earth, but the towns in which they were located are as completely blotted from the map of Texas as if they had never existed, and the fertile ground upon which they stood is now cultivated in

corn and cotton. The Independence church is, there fore, the only survivor of the churches organizing the Union Baptist Association, and may justly be styled its

But more, out of the union association grew the Texas Baptist Education Society, in 1843, and out of this society grew Baylor University and Baylor Female College, originally located at Independence, now having their habitat at Belton and Waco.
