





Fruit is ripe when spines in center of top will pull out readily.

Cut off the stem end and twist out the top. Place the pineapple on its side on a table and slice crosswise. Make slices from 1-2 to 1 inch in thickness. Peel each slice—it is not necessary to peel deeply enough to remove all of the eyes, because after the peeling is removed the eyes may be cut out of this outer meat and this tougher meat used to make juice. Cut out core and shape the slices with a sharp round cutter or cut in pieces


