Elmendorf Field, Anchorage, Alaska, June 20:

Hello Buddie: I received your copy of the Castro County News today. It sure makes a fellow feel at home when he stretches out on his bunk to read, even if he is thousands of miles away.

Well. I have been in the Army almost a year now and I can't say I have regretted a day of it. I have found it very educational and interesting.

I enlisted August 2, 1940, at Lubbock. From there I was sent to Lowery Field at Denver, Colorado, where I joined the 36th Bombardment Squadron (heavy). While I was at Lowry Field I was ucky enough to go through the Air Corps technical school there.

The squadron was there eight months training Bombardiers. We were then sent to Alaska. I like Alaska very much and I

An appeal to rural people to contribute aluminum, in a drive announced recently by the Office of Civilian Defense, has been made by Director H. H. Williamson of the Texas Extension Service. Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel has called upon county judges to assume leadership of the

County Extension agents have been asked to assist with this work as it relates to rural areas. Gothering of the aluminum is to begin the week of July 21, and according to the plan, local committees of 4-H Club members, home demonstration clubs, land use planning committees and other groups will call on farm homes in the cornmunity to collect the aluminum

Anything which is made of aluminum will do. Among the items suggested for donation are pots and pans, radio parts, toys, shakpoints on the Dimmitt Circuit ers, screening, old washing machine parts, picture frames, book ends, ice trays, measuring cups, camera equipment, kettles and double boilers, bottle and jar caps, refrigerator plates and electric appliances of all sorts.

Earlier the Office of Production Management had asked the citizens to defer collecting scrap sluminum until the week of July 14 and warned against "sharpsters" posing as legitimate government purchasers buying up scrap. It is estimated that the campaign to collect secondary aluminum will result in obtaining 20 million pounds throughout the nation. This would result in the release of 20 million pounds of first-class metal for use in 2,000 fighter planes.





Army

In his bi-annual report to the Secretary of War, Army Cheif of Staff Marshall urged that Congress pass legislation permitting use of armed forces outside the Western Hemisphere and permitting holding selectees, National Guardsmen for more than one year. Gen. Mar-Mrs. Ray Sheffy and girls and shall said that conditions have "grave national emergency" exis's of more severe character than the public realizes.

More than 750,000 men who reached 21 since Selective Service for service this week throughout the nation. President Roosevelt ordered 900,000 men induced into the Army as selectees now in service finish their year of training.

Pending final action by Congress on legislation deferring men who were 28 on July 1 or before, Selective Service Director Hershey ordered temporary deferment of this age group. He also advised local boards to defer registrants with one or more dependents to whose support they make "any substantial contribution." The only exception to this, he said, would be men who married in the hope of evading service.

The National Youth Administration announced allocation of \$4,-040,000 to finance July operations of a new program to train 368,000 cut-of-school youths for defense jobs in the next year. The program is operated in cooperation with US Employment Service and the US office of Education and local pubic educational officials.

The Office of Education reported hat 1,500,000 persons were trained for defense work by existing educational facilities in the past

Pan-American Relations

The Assistant Coordinator of Commercial and Cultural Relations between the American Republics, speaking in Pennsylvania, said that in April Latin America sold \$101,-600,000 worth of goods to the US - a rate of trade sufficient to aborb the wartime loss to the other Americas of the continental European markets.

Sift flour once, measure, add bak-ing powder and salt, and sift again.

Cut in ten 1-inch slices. Finch each slice at sealed edge into ounding point. Place a 3-inch ooky cutter in center of greased baking sheet. Arrange slices in circle around cutter, having points touch cutter. Pat lightly to shape. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 25 minutes, or until done.
