

DISD begins budget process, hopes for no new local taxes

In a called session last Thursday, the Dimmitt school board began work on the 1992-93 budget, discussing teacher bonuses, school yearbooks, computer equipment, and the tax rate.

The local portion of the school tax rate will remain the same-at 30.24 cents per \$100 valuation, according to current estimates by school administrators.

However, the County Education District tax rate, set by the state, is scheduled to go up an estimated 8 to 10 cents.

Board president David Schaeffer explained that if the local district tries to lower its rate to make up for the increase in the CED rate, the district could lose substantial state funds.

He said for each penny of local effort, the state adds another \$20,-000 to \$40,000 in Tier II funding, which would be lost if the district cut its local tax effort.

Teacher salaries are always the biggest part of the district's budget, and basic pay levels and bonuses are set by the state. Longevity bonuses are added in an effort to retain experienced teachers.

A proposed increase in longevity

\$1,140 above the base salary for each year of employment, up to ten years.

Each school campus has requested an update of the intercom systems, and the elementary school also needs some clocks. Total cost of the intercom and clock update for all three campuses was estimated around \$16,000.

The board agreed to advertise for bids on the job. Schaeffer said if the process can be started soon, the expense might be listed on the current year's budget, rather than carrying over to next year's.

All three campuses also have need for carpeting, and the board voted to seek bids on the project. The high school office, the middle school library and office and at least one elementary classroom are in dire need of new carpet, according to Barrett.

Part of the suggested budget for the high school was \$1,500 for student travel, so that all of the yearbook staff could attend a workshop session. In the past, only the editor and assistant editor attended the workshop.

Schaeffer suggested that the district look into producing a com-

Hart residents to vote on changing government

The city of Hart has called a special election for Aug. 8 to allow voters to decide whether the city should change to an aldermanic form of government.

The city currently operates a city commission form of government, with two commissioners and a mayor.

Earlier this year residents of Hart petitioned the city to change to the aldermanic form of government, which features five aldermen and a mayor.

Voters will go to the polls Aug. 8 to select which type of representation they prefer, and at the same time, they will vote to fill three seats on the board of aldermen. If the aldermanic form of government is not approved, then the election for three aldermen is null and void.

Ismeal Carrasco and William Bell, current city commissioners; and Hart Mayor Joe Bailey do not have to be re-elected to their offices if the form of government is changed.

If the aldermanic form of government is selected, then voters will be represented by an additional three city officials.

Candidates who filed for the three vacant at-large seats are Ann Pevehouse, L.C. McLain, Roger Velasquez, Martha Gonzales, Elodia Rodriguez, Maria Flores, Patsy Warren, J.C. Miller, Tony Leibel and Todd Pebsworth.

Early voting for the election will begin July 20 and will continue through Aug. 4. Voters may cast absentee ballots from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday at Hart City Hall.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Hart Golden Group Building on Aug. 8. Glenn Reed will be the election judge.

Severe storms pound area farms

Tornadoes and hail ripped through the Panhandle-area Saturday night, and although one funnel cloud was spotted five miles westnorthwest of Dimmitt, no damage was reported and hail damage was spotty, but moderate in some areas.

Late Saturday evening a storm cell passed across Castro County. This cell, which had already dropped large hail and spawned several funnel clouds over Parmer County, was responsible for the twister which prompted the National Weather Service to issue a torna-

do warning for Castro County. Hail storms caused the most damage from the storm-especially south of Nazareth and south-southeast of Hart.

Pea - to marble - sized hail dropped straight from the sky Saturday night on corn crops south of Nazareth. This area suffered mild damage on corn and soybeans

while damage south-southeast of Hart was a little heavier. It was reported that this hail storm went as far south as Olton.

Several farmers south of Hart

reported moderate damage to corn and sugarbeets.

Jim Black, who farms six miles southeast of Hart, said the storm "stripped up" his corn, and although

the damage was "pretty bad," he's still got a "piece" of his crop left, and hopes to salvage it.

After that storm, forecasters said Panhandle residents would get a break from the rains for a few days, but Mother Nature fooled them.





Sheriff Lonny Rhynes

You could describe him as a "captivating" man or an "arresting" personality, but however you describe him, Castro County Sheriff Lonny Rhynes will be missed around here when he's gone.

He has resigned his position as sheriff to take a job in Sherman, where he will be a deputy for Grayson County's 15th District Court. His resignation will be effective Monday.

Lonny chose not to run for re-election as sheriff back before the March primaries, but still had five months to go on his term of service.

He said the new job will give him more of an open door toward his future ambition of becoming a US Marshal.

Lonny said he has always loved law enforcement, and intends to stay in that career field.

He became a deputy in Castro County in 1977. He had served as Hart City Marshal in 1974, then obtained his law enforcement certification from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission Law Enforcement Academy at Amarillo College in 1975. In 1976 he worked for the Hale Center police department.

After four years as a deputy here, he became sheriff in 1981 by appointment after Sheriff-elect Joe Ben Mitchell died before he could take office. Lonny won election to the office in 1982, in 1984 and in 1988.

Changes he has seen through the years include an increase in the number of deputies. He said there were two field deputies when he first became sheriff and now there are five. The jailer duties had been performed by the dispatcher, but now the department has three divisions: jailers, dispatchers and field deputies.

A participant in many facets of community life, Lonny's interests are still centered around law enforcement. He served as president of the Castro County Peace Officers' Association for three years, and has taken part in that group's many projects of community service. He served three years on the Criminal Justice Advisory Borad of the PRPC. He also is a member of the board of directors of the Panhandle 9-1-1 advisory committee.

The Castro County Commissioners voted unanimously in favor of a resolution commending Lonny for his efforts during his years of service and expressing appreciation for all he has done for Castro County. We join in expressing that commendation and appreciation!

In the Junior II division, Margie Durbin garnered a blue ribbon in casual.



Quilting techniques to be taught at camp

will sponsor a quilt camp Saturday, July 11, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Expo Building in Dimmitt.

The camp will teach individuals how to quilt the "Nine Patch" pattern (with plain setting squares), also called the "Single Irish Chain" pattern.

Anyone over the age of 12 may attend the camp, and those who wish to pre-register should contact the Extension office at 647-4115.

Supplies needed for the 60" x 84" quilt comforter are 1-1/2 yards of dark fabric (print or solid), 3-1/2 yards of light fabric (print or solid) and 5-1.2 yards of fabric for backing (choose a muslin, or if you want to make the quilt reversible, select one of the fabrics used for the top or another different fabric). For an optional border, 1-1/4 yards of medium-shaded fabric or a companion fabric of one of the fabrics used on the top will be needed. You should select a cotton or cotton-polyester blend fabric which looks good with the other fabrics. It should not be "obviously directional" (i.e. stripes or plaids). Fabrics should be washed in warm or hot water to preshrink and fade so that the quilt will be washable in the future. Press and fold the fabric and bring it to the workshop in a protective container so it will stay clean. You also will need extra-loft bonded polyester batting that is 64" x 90" or 72" x 96" if you are adding optional borders. Other supplies needed include two large spools of polyester spun thread in the same shade as your lightest color of fabric; a sewing machine and three filled bobbins in the thread of choice; a rotary cutter; a clean cutting ruler; cutting mat and a basic sewing kit including





Insects, disease beginning to emerge in county fields


Corn is more sensitive to plant water stess than most other field crops and therefore it must be adequately irrigated in order to produce optimum yields.

Currently, a majority of the water management program fields are showing a full profile of moisture; however, there are a few fields in which the two-foot moisture content is declining.

The one-foot level is still wet from the recent rains and the three-foot level is not fully being utilized by the plant like the two-foot is.

should begin irrigating.

The following graph indicates typical water use for corn on the Texas High Plains.



Mites discovered

Banks grass mite infestations still are confined to outside rows. However, there are a few fields in which mites are found throughout the field. There hasn't been much damage noted to date, but this can change in just a few days.

Most of the mites discovered have been found on the bottom one to three leaves where no hail damage is present. Mite numbers are higher in plants with hail damage.



Clearance for Capture

A Section 18 crisis exemption for the use of Capture 2EC had not been signed as of Monday, but we are confident that it will be signed. We should know soon.

Should Comite be used?

Some questions have been asked about using Comite at this time. Do not let the appearance or feel of the soil surface indicate when you The use of Comite represents a significant cost before it is known that spider mite infestations will threaten the field. Yet fields with a heavy history of mite infestations are good candidates for Comite. Also, if you have the option of using a high clearance sprayer, Comite application directed to the lower portion of the plant has provided good protection. Comite does not destroy beneficial insects which will be very important later in the season.

Corn borer activity

surprisingly low considering all previous indicators.

The situation probaby can be attributed to the amount of rain received.

The corn borers that have been found in fields range in age from moths laying eggs to larvae tunnelling in the stalk. The borers will be moving into the pupal stage within the next week and this stage will last 10 to 14 days. We could look for the second generation to emerge around July 10.

Corn disease

Rust fungus and northern corn leaf blight have been found in Castro County corn fields.

The rust is not very important at this time; but the blight has the potential to become severe.

Last year several fields were greatly affected. The organism causes long, elliptical, grayish-green or tan lesions which develop first on lower leaves. The disease progresses upward, causing premature death resembling frost or drought injury.

In damp weather, large numbers of grayish-black spores are produced on the lesions of susceptible varieties.

If the desease is established before silking, losses will be higher. If diameter become gray as the fungus produces spores. infection is delayed until six weeks after silking, yield losses will be minimal.

The trigger for justifying chemical treatment is finding 10% infested plants with lesions approximately one inch in length.

A Section 18 clearance for the use of Tilt fungicide has been issued for preventative control.

Soybeans

Soybeans are poor competitors against weeds.

In row-planted soybeans, both chemcial and mechanical weed control Comite is a preventative miticide that must be applied to pre-tassel corn. can be utilized. But in narrow-planted soybeans, you are limited to chemical control.

A few weeds cause a lot of problems when rows are too narrow to cultivate (generally below 15 inches). Tests have shown that as few as two cockleburs growing in 20 feet of soybean rows will reduce yields by 14%. Despite the potential problems, narrow-row soybeans are not helpless in their own defense against weeds. Since narrow rows shade, it is only necessary to hold weeds at bay for a short length of time.

The soil may be a physical barrier for soybeans when weather conditions favor crusting of its surface. Crusting may delay emergence, or in some situations, prevent the seedling from reaching the surface. Broken necks on plants often are the result of a heavy crust on the soil; however, broken Pheromone trap catches of Southwestern Corn Borers have been necks also may be found when soybeans have been planted too deep or the soil has been compacted by heavy rains or equipment.

> Soybeans are considered poor responders to direct fertilizer application; however, the best soybean yields are frequently obtained on highly fertilized fields.

> High yielding soybeans remove a considerable amount of nutrients from the soil. Nutrient uptake by soybeans will vary depending on season, variety and fertility status of the soil.

> Although soybeans will fix nitrogen by nodule bacteria when inoculated correctly, the soybean plant is dependent on soluble nitrogen for growth until nodulation occurs. About 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre will serve as a starter.

Leafspot found in beets

We have heard some reports of leafspots occurring in sugar beets. The first symptoms are small, whitish spots which are scattered over the surface of older leaves. The spots increase in size, becoming brown or purple in color. Individual spots are usually circular, but several may coalesce into larger areas of dead tissue. Mature spots, about 1/4-inch in

Inquiries are through a 900 number or an 800 number referring the caller to a 900 number "for more detailed -Uncle Scams-You receive a information." Both calls are answered by recorded messages about job opportunities or employment agencies, or a live operator who agrees to work on getting the victim a job for an advance fee. You pay for the 900 phone calls and still have no job or job leads.

-Fund-Raisers-Some fraudulent telemarketing firms get permission to use a legitimate non-profit organization's name to solicit donations in its name. It guarantees to generate a certain level of contributions for the organization. It generates substantially higher sums, but only pays the guaranteed amount to the charity. Avoid charitable solicitations asking that funds be sent to an address other than the intended organization.

This year's show will host two new events, a photography contest and a sweepstakes competition. The sweepstakes will reward state junior groups for outstanding participation and performance at the junior show.



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News finishes second with Centennial entry

The Aug. 1, 1991 Centennial edition of the Castro County News was honored Friday at the Texas Press Association's convention as being the second-best special edition in the state among weekly newspapers with circulation under 3,000; and it, along with the News' annual stock show issue, received second-place honors in advertising.

News Publisher Don Nelson accepted the awards at the Texas Press Association's awards breakfast Friday.

The News' Centennial edition was "edged" out of the first-place spot by an entry produced by the Ozona Stockman.

"You wouldn't believe how close first and second were," said the judges. "Not to diminish your (Stockman) victory, but your runner-up almost got it with one of their stories and their front page."

"It was a difficult decision which would place first in this edition," the judges said, adding that the News' "gunfight story almost did it." (The "gunfight story" the judges referred to was an account of a shootout which occurred on Jones Street in Dimmitt in the late 1800s between Ira Aten, a former Texas Ranger who moved to Castro County to homestead a place near the XIT ranch; and Andrew Mc-Clelland, a lawyer from Tennessee.)

"I looked at the top entries-ours and Ozona's - and I'm satisfied that there was no better special edition published last year than our Centennial," said Nelson. "It was a judge's call, but I don't agree with him. I felt like our Centennial edition was notable better than any of the other entries I saw."

In the advertising contest, the judge remarked on the News' "good design, use of type and variety of ads. Good use of headlines. Nice work."

advertising design and effectiveness is always a judgement call."

Judges commented on several other News entries, which follow:

Sports Coverage: Solid coverage. Photos need work. Some creative angles to stories.

Best Use of Photography: Excellent front page picture. Good local and school pictures.

News Writing: Nice story on Ramey. Ryan resignation story is long, but that's understandable since he was superintendent for so long.

"A community newspaper should always feel proud to place high in a state competition, especially in a state as large as Texas. But I still feel there was no better special edition last year than ours," Nelson said.





Cotton Talks

Officials at the Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) said an effort to maintain funding for the Market Promotion Program is now in full swing.

While the House of Representatives has been getting ready to consider legislation that authorizes funding for the program, cotton industry officials have been contacting key Congressmen to solidify support for the program. Consideration of legislation could begin before Congress' July 4 break.

Opponents of the program portray the MPP as a "waste" of taxpayer money and at the least would greatly limit funding for the program, others want the program completely abolished.

PCG officials are currently working with the National Cotton Council (NCC) and other industry groups to drum up support for the program which has helped increase export sales of US cotton by an average of \$437 million each year since MPP began.

PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson said, "The current effort to do away with the Market Promotion Program threatens to reduce vital export markets that serve cotton producers Beltwide."

Opponents of the MPP said the \$200 million designated for the program in 1992 would be better spent in other areas. Increases in cotton exports and the expansion of overseas markets for US cotton effectively refute these claims.

Since the program started in 1985 cotton export sales have averaged \$437 million per year more than they were before 1985. Cotton exports topped the seven million bale mark in 1991 and are expected to stay near the same level in 1992.

Cotton producers on the High Plains of Texas could be severly affected if funding for the program motion Program will have many unfavorable effects," notes Johnson. "Two of the most serious will be the loss of vital export markets and the negative effect of reduced export market will have on the balance of trade between the US and other countries."

In 1986, US cotton producers exported 5.3 million bales of cotton. By 1991 exports had climbed to more than seven million bales with the help of the aggressive overseas promotion program conducted by Cotton Council International under the MPP. Beltwide the marketing of over seven million bales overseas in 1991 provided more than \$2 billion in annual sales to the US cotton producers.

"The MPP is an important vehicle for increasing the global marketshare of US and High Plains cotton," added Johnson. "PCG, the NCC and other industry segments will continue to fight for the continuation of this highly effective program.""



and middle school, and perhaps even include class pictures of the elementary grades. He said it would decrease production costs and allow for a better quality product, rather than the current system of having two books-one for high school and one for the middle school. The elementary does not currently have a yearbook.

The middle school yearbook was produced with a soft cover for the current school year in an effort to cut costs. It was mentioned that some people had expressed dissatisfaction with its durability.

In the proposed budget, \$40,000 is allowed for buying computer hardware and software through a technology grant. Purchases through the grant would be placed at all three campuses.

It was suggested to allow money for the purchases even if the grant funding is not approved, so that the district can keep up with the plan to continually update and improve the computer systems at all levels.

Enrollment projections for the coming school year show a slight decrease, which would mean a decrease in state funding based on student population. However, Barrett said the district has plans to increase the average daily attendance - another yardstick for funding.

The average daily attendance can be increased by cutting down on absences. The district plans to hire a person at the secondary level to work with students and parents in reducing the level of absences.

"The position will be like a parent liason/truant officer," Schaeffer said.

Barrett said the job would focus on attendance problems in grades 6 to 12, "since sixth grade seems to be the turning point for at-risk

population.

A very rough estimate for build- 000. ing a 24 x 32-foot structure was placed at \$21,500.

Another item discussed for next year's budget that would represent an increase over this year's expenses was construction of a discus cage, now required by UIL safety rules. Other improvements at the track also are included in the budget proposal, since Dimmitt will be hosting the district track meet this coming school year.




