WESTERN JOCKEY CLUB **RIVAL IS ORGANIZED**

Formation of American Turf Association Completed at New Orleans.

Matt Winn President

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 7 .- The delegates of the racing organization in opposition to the Western Jockey Club met here yesterday and organized the American Turf Association,

The only business transacted was the election of officers. Matt Winn of the Louisville Jockey Club was elected president; Edward Corrigan, representing the Chicago Jockey Club (Hawthorne) and the Kansas City Jockey Club, was elected vice president, and W. J. O'Brien of the Worth Jockey Club of Chicago was elected treasurer. The position of secretary was left open. Thomas O. Cromwell, a Chicago newspaper man, will, it is understood, be tendered the secretary-

Dates were not allotted to any tracks, as the election of officers took up all of the time. After four hours of work the meeting adjourned.

Before adjourning it was agreed that the organization should be known as the American Turf Association and not the American Jockey Club, as at first announced. Ten race tracks of jockey clubs were represented at the meeting, the names of the representatives and the track that thy represented being: Ed-ward Corrigan, Chicago Jockey Club (Hawthorne), Union Park, St. Louis and Kansas City Jockey Club; S. F. Hazlin, New Orleans Jockey Club; W. O. Palmer, Fore Erie, Highland Park and Windsor; Max Samuelson and Campbell Scott, representing the Lexington Jockey Club; Matt Winn, Louisville Jockey Club; Rome Respess and H. P. Devereaux, representing the Essex Park Jockey Club of Hot Springs, and George A. Gibbs, represent-ing the Worth Jockey Club of Chicago.

Otto Bitner Fails to Rally From Operation Following Crushing of Limbs Under Train

Otto Bitner, aged 10 years, son of E. H. Bitner of 1306 Arizona avenue, lied at St. Joseph's infirmary Monday vening as a result of injuries received by being crushed under a moving freight train on the Missouri, Kan-sas and Texas railroad near the Mag-

nolia avenue crossing, Monday after-noon, as told in Monday's Telegram. The funeral will be held from the resilence on Arizona avenue at 4 o'clock his afternoon.

The boy received his injuries shortly fter 3 o'clock Monday afternoon, havng both legs crushed and mangled under the wheels of a moving freight, which he attempted to board. Immediately after the accident he was taken to St. Joseph's infirmary, where both legs were amputated. The child never rallied from the operation, dying shortly after 7 o'clock last even-

Otto Bitner was a pupil of the Seventh ward school. He had been dismissed from school, returned home, put up his books and again left the nouse when the accident occurred.
