

Vegetable Meet Monday Evening At High School

A vegetable growers association may be formed Monday night when farmers and businessmen from over the county gather at a mass meeting in the Dimmitt High School auditorium.

The meeting was called Monday by the Castro County Chamber of Commerce Agricultural Committee, composed of Joe Cowen, Sam Gilbreath, and Edd McLeroy.

Time for the meeting is 8 p.m. Monday night. Every farmer and businessman in the county is urged to attend.

Chamber officials said this week that the meeting is a result of "very encouraging response" on the part of local farmers, vegetable marketing firms, and a railway company to initiate a vegetable program in this county. Interested persons in the county have traveled to the Rio Grande Valley, Dallas, Fort Worth, and other parts of the state during the last month to arouse interest in the prospects of such a program here.

In addition to local persons, the Monday night program will include Wallace Mahoney of LaFeria, manager of the Southwestern Division of the Pacific Fruit and Produce Company; Professor George Ellis, assistant dean of agriculture at Texas Tech; Joe Cole, Extension horticulturist of Lubbock; and representatives of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company.

These men will discuss aspects and possibilities of a vegetable program in this county, including planting, growing, marketing, economic importance, and shipping. Also on the program will be Bob McLean of the First State Bank in Dimmitt, and B. M. Nelson, manager of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce. These men will report on their recent conference with railway officials in Dallas and of the results of this conference.

Joe Cowen and Sam Gilbreath, members of the C-C agricultural committee, will tell of a recent tour of the Rio Grande Valley which was made by Cowen, Gilbreath, Nelson, and H. H. Carville of Dimmitt. While in the Valley, these men consulted with numerous vegetable marketing and canner representatives. They will tell of their progress in these areas at the Monday night meeting.

Boosters Report Band's Enid Fund Still Short by \$750

The Dimmitt Bobcat Band still needs \$750 before it can attend the Southwestern Band Festival in Enid, Okla., May 1-6.

The Band Boosters and Ralph Smith, band director, this week appealed to the public for voluntary donations to help complete the \$3,200 needed to finance the trip.

"The kids have worked hard for fund money all year," Smith said. "They have held candy and cake sales, presented a band concert, and performed a womanless wedding to raise money for the trip—and they have almost made it without asking for any donations."

"But now," Smith continued, "the band's only alternative is to ask for contributions from private citizens and businesses to help them complete their fund."

The Bobcat Band was one of the few Texas high school bands invited to the Southwestern Band Festival. The top bands in 18 Southwestern states are invited to the educational event each year to study college-level band performance.

Purpose of the Festival is to prepare members of outstanding bands of the Southwest for college band participation and to help prospective future band instructors in conducting, performance, and direction of band music.

"Every handmaster in the nation watches the Southwestern Band Festival for prospective scholarship students," Smith continued. "Representation by the Bobcat Band at the Festival would be invaluable as publicity for Dimmitt, Castro County, and this entire area."

"We hope to place some of our band members on the all-Festival band," Smith said. "This is the highest honor than can be awarded a high school band member."

The fund is completed before May 1, the 83-member band will be gone five days. Two chartered buses will be required for transportation. Other expenses include reservations, accommodations, and meals for the five days.

The band fund presently stands at \$2,450, all of which has been raised through band projects and pledges.

Especially urged to attend the meeting are all farmers in the county who are interested in any way in a vegetable marketing program in this county. Response to recent questionnaires sent farmers by the Chamber of Commerce, Nelson said, indicated that many of this county's agriculturists are willing to try vegetables as a different type of crop. Through a vegetable program, Nelson said, county farmers could become at least partially independent of government subsidies and allotments.

Those making the Valley tour reported recently that vegetable marketers in the Valley are favorable to branching into other areas of Texas due to a shortage of water in the Rio Grande area. Although the Valley is presently the center of the vegetable industry in Texas, vegetable growers are looking to the irrigated High Plains as a possible future producing area for their product.

In a letter sent Monday to farmers over the county, the Chamber of Commerce said, "Every effort is being made to establish a vegetable marketing program here that will assure every farmer in the county a market for his produce, regardless of the number of acres or types of vegetables he plants."

"We had wonderful response to the questionnaires pertaining to vegetables, which were mailed to county farmers recently," the letter continued, "and indications are that a wide variety of vegetable crops and considerable acreage will be planted in the county provided we can secure processing and marketing facilities."

"In all probability," the letter concluded, "the farmers who attend the meeting Monday night will decide to form a vegetable raisers association in order to create an organization to look after the interests of the individual members. An organized effort will be necessary to secure an open market and promote the interest of our farmers. It is very necessary that as large a representation as possible be present Monday night for the meeting."

New Class Needed In Spanish Course

Ben Vera, instructor of the public Spanish course being held in Dimmitt, announced this week that response to the course has been so great that separate classes have been made necessary.

Thirty-eight persons attended the Monday night class.

"This is one of the largest groups I've had at any of my classes in this area," Mr. Vera said. "The response has been very gratifying."

Vera added that more personal instruction could be made possible if the course were divided into two classes.

Meeting days for the course will continue to be Monday and Thursday nights, but rather than having one class at 8 p.m. on these nights, one class will meet from 7 to 8:30 p.m. and a second class will meet from 8:30 to 10 p.m. Monday and Thursday.

Mr. Vera urged all enrollees who could to attend the early class so enrollment in the two classes could be balanced.

The course, inaugurated by the Castro County News, is conducted at Dimmitt High School.

According to The Experts:

Good fertilizers for this area, he said, are nitrogen-compound mixtures such as 16-20-0, 10-10-0, 10-5-5, and 6-10-4 (your fertilizer dealer will know what the numbers symbolize).

The time to fertilize is now, Dr. Longnecker said. With proper fertilization (12 to 30 pounds per

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Election to Pick School Trustees On Saturday

Ten school trustees will be elected Saturday to fill expiring terms on the Dimmitt, Hart, Nazareth, and county school boards.

Three trustees will be elected to the Nazareth board; two positions are to be filled in the Dimmitt election; Hart voters will select two trustees; and three members will be chosen for the county school board.

Election sites will be the Nazareth School building, Dimmitt High School, and the Hart American Legion Building. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday.

Any resident of a Castro County precinct or school district 21 or older, who has paid his poll tax, is eligible to vote in the election. Poll tax exemptions for 21-year-olds or for those over 65 aren't necessary, since this will be a within-the-county election.

To be elected to the county school board are trustees from precincts 3 and 4, and a trustee at large. Incumbents on the board, all seeking re-election, are Elmer Youts of precinct 3, Andrew Acker of precinct 4, and Roy Pyeatt of Hart, trustee at large. Lester Dowell, Dimmitt farmer, will oppose Pyeatt for the at-large position.

Incumbents to the Dimmitt school board, both of whom are seeking re-election, are Homer Herring and Norris Wesson. Their positions will also be sought by M. E. "Buck" Cleavinger and James Bradford.

Two candidates have announced for the three positions open on the Nazareth school board. They are Jim Schwaller and incumbent R. E. Stephens. Other incumbents on the board are Paul Acker and L. J. Conrad; neither is seeking re-election. One other petitioner filed for the third place open, but his petition was postmarked too late for the five-day pre-election deadline.

Charles B. Martin Jr. and R. G. Henderson have announced candidacy for the two positions being vacated at Hart. Incumbents to these positions are J. D. Murry and Paul Brooks.

Cowen, Hawkins, Shepard, and Cox Favored for Dimmitt, Hart Offices

Joe Cowen, Dimmitt real-estate and insurance agency owner, was elected mayor of Dimmitt Tuesday during the special mayoral election.

Hart voters returned Willis Hawkins Sr. to the mayor position and elected Roland Shepard and T. B. Cox to the Hart City commission.

Cowen's name was placed on the ballot after Bob McLean, the only announced candidate, sent a letter to the Dimmitt city commission Friday withdrawing from the race.

By law, when a candidate for city office withdraws leaving the office without a candidate, the city commission may then select a candidate for the position. Cowen's name was agreed upon Saturday morning by the commission.

Only 147 persons voted at the city hall polling box; Cowen received 121 of these votes. Others receiving votes for the mayorship were McLean 11, D. Neumayer 5, retiring mayor E. B. Wright 3, Buddy Birdwell 3, Bob Jackson 2, Earl Harrison 1, and Glen Youts 1.

Seventy-one persons voted in the Hart mayoral election with Hawkins receiving 49 votes and Joe Newman getting 22 write-in votes. The commission election drew 133 votes with candidates Shepard and Cox receiving 57 and 49, respectively. Others garnering votes in the commission election were O. C. Kitzell 20, Rodney Smith 3, L. J. Rice 1, Ed Harris 1, Walt Hanson 1, and Bob Dennis 1.

County Goes For Yarborough In Special Election

New Senator Garner More Votes Than All Others Combined

Castro County voters gave Ralph Yarborough a clear majority over all other candidates in the special senatorial election Tuesday. Yarborough gained a plurality in the rest of the state to become Texas' new junior senator and assure Democratic control of the US Senate.

The loyalist Democratic standard-bearer had lost three races for the Texas governorship before winning the more respected Senate position.

Yarborough, who polled a three-to-one advantage over Gov. Price Daniel in Castro County during the last general election, remained a solid favorite of voters here as he polled 521 of the 885 votes cast in the senatorial election.

Yarborough also led in statewide voting with 310,842 votes. His closest opponent was well-known Congressman Martin Dies, who received 255,016 votes. Thad Hutcheson, GOP hopeful, was Yarborough's only other close opponent. He polled 202,721 votes over the state.

Voting was light in Castro County; only 885 of the 1,600 poll-tax holders marked ballots. The November general election brought out more than 2,000 Castro County voters.
