

"The life of a Hungarian workman seems to be of very little consideration in this country." said Mr. Merle, "so small, in fact, that the death of one of more of them daily is given scarcely passing notice. The outside world can hardly realize the number of men who are killed each year in the mills about Pittsburg.'






