





750 Feet to the Bot-

tom of Shaft

WILKESBARRE, Pa., April 26 .- While en miners were being lowered into the Convinham mine today, the rope broke and the carriage fell to the bottom, a disance of 750 feet. All the men were instantly killed.

The bodies of the men were buried uner a mass of wreckage at the bottom of he shaft.

There were several hundred men in the nine at the time of the accident, but they scaped from the shaft through other penings.

A rescuing party was at once organized. The bodies of the men were terribly mangled. Most of the victims lived in the icinity of the mine, and when the resuers brought the bodies to the surface a

arge crowd was in waiting. Superintendent Foote says he is at loss o account for the accident. An examination of the rope was made today before the first cage was lowered into the mine, and it was found to be all right.

Eight of the dead men were Poles, and the two others were English speaking miners.
