Vote Reported to Have Stood Seven to Five in Favor of Acquittal

PRISONER NEAR COLLAPSE

Crowds Remained About Court Room All Night, Waiting for the Verdict

NEW YORK, May 4.—Having failed to reach a verdict and declaring that they were hopelessly disagreed, the jury in the Nan Patterson case was formally discharged at 2:20 o'clock

Various rumors gained currency as to how the jury stood. Information received by the Associated Press is that the poll was seven to five in favor of acquittal. It is quite certain that the former show girl will be given her liberty on nominal bail and that the indictment will be quashed. She has faced trial three times-twice the jury disagreed and once there was a mise trial owing to the collapse of a juror.

STREETS WERE CROWDED In the court annals of this city nothng has yet approached the tensity of the climax in the Patterson case. When Recorder Goff was summoned to court soon after 1 o'clock, the room was filled with spectators, two of whom were women. Only those possessing permits were allowed to enter, but in the streets surrounding the Tombs and the court house were thousands await. ing the outcome. With their eyes riveted on the bridge leading from the prison they watched for a possible glimpse of the prisoner who, they hoped, might pause at a window momentarily should she be called to court. Mounted police forming the traffic squad kept the people in order and

Fresident McKinley had requested him to return to Venezuela, but also promised to appoint him to the first vacancy in Europe. While Mr. Loomis was in Switzerland he learned of his nomination to be minister to Portugal. His service there from June 17, 1901, till Jan. 7, 1903, was quiet and uneventful.

d clare its partiality for a doctrine which condemns as criminal any attack on the new all subject to a popular form of gov-But it is not our opinion that the United States alone, in spite of the immensity of its resources, belongs the obligation of assisting the other republics of this hemisphere against the attacks of Europe or Asia; if such attacks are still considered to be possible; but for the attainment of the end to which we all aspire, each one of the republics ought, by means of a declaration like that of President Monroe, to proclaim that every attack on the part of a foreign power, with the view of curtailing the territory or the independence or of altering the institutions of ony one of the republics of America, would be considered by the nation making such a declaration as an attack upon itself, provided that the nation directly attacked or threatened in such manner bespoke the aid of the other nations opportunely. In this manner the doctrine now called by the name of Monroe would become the doctrine of America in the fullest sense of the word, and although originating in the Un'ted States, would belong to the international law of the American continent. As to the means to reduce this idea to practice, this is not the time or place to discuss them.'

When he saw the cattle they appeared to be suffering very much from cold, and he believes that was the cause of their death. April 15, when these cattle reached there, was 28 degrees. This was 4 degrees below the freezing point. The altitude of Amorting is about 3,500 feet. Running them up in the air half a mile higher than the country they had been raised in, and they found not only a very cold temperature, but a climate greatly unlike that they were habited to. Dr. Wallace is of opinion that this sudden change of climatic conditions, in connection with the cold weather, caused the death of the cattle.

"The Amarillo convention was the best cattlemen's convention I have ever attended in the Panhandle country," said M. B. Irwin, traffic manager of the Stock Yards company, who was at his desk this morning after a two week's trip. After the close of the Amarillo meeting Mr. Irwin went on down into the south Texas country. "Range conditions all over Texas are better than they have been for years," said he, "and in south Texas they are especially fine. In fact, so good is the range down there that the bulk of cattle are going direct from pastures to the beef markets. Practically the only cattle to go from that country to the territory and other more northern pastures villages I anly showed today the marks are a comparatively small number from the coast country. Cattle are certainly fatter than I ever saw them at this time tion. The break in the market of the last two weeks has checked the movement considerably, as there are none too many cattle in that country, owners are not forced to sell and on the rich pasturage






