Some of the stores are again open for business Two of the grocery stores have made announcement that as quickly as stocks can be received they will reopen with full lines, and this information has had a very cheering effect on the peo-

The first news of the death of young Croker was received in Kansas City at 4 clock, when the police were requested to hunt for a negro who is said to have placed Croker on the train at Kansas City. According to a telephone message from Newton, Croker was found dead on a car Wednesday night's tornado in and seat, just before the train reached Newthe train at Newton. The first clew to Croker's identity was a letter found in the dead man's pocket, addressed by Zach Mulhall, formerly of Oklahoma, who is now holding a Wild West show in New York City, to Joseph Shiller, manager of the famous 101 ranch, at Bliss, Okla. Inquiry by telephon elicited the information that Croker was not known at the Bliss ranch. Evidently he was on the way to the ranch for an outing. A message of inquiry was sent to New York and the coroner took charge of the body and impaneled a jury. An inquest was begun this evening.






