



> Rev. J. P. Joplin of Virginia, commissioner to the Presbyterian general assembly, speaking of the divorce evil. said.

> "Facts and figures can tell the awful story of the divorce evil in the United States better than any words from me. Here are some of the figures:

"From the year 1867 to 1901, inclusive, there were 700,000 divorces granted in the United States, Carroll D. Wright, commissioner of labor for the United States, estimates upon a safe, reliable and conservative basis that 50,000 divorces are annually granted in the United States. From 1867 to 1901, inclusive, in the whole of the Dominion of Canada there were less than three hundred divorces granted The United States, with a population of about fifteen times that of Canada, has two thousand times as many divorces as Canada, in the same period of time. England grants annually about 725 divorces Germany 8,000, France 7,000, the United States 50,000. The United States grants annually nearly seventy-five times as many divorces as England, more than six times as many as Germany and more than seven times as many as France. In 1886 eleven of the largest countries in Europe all combined granted 23,735 divorces; during the same year the United States granted 25,535. In 1901 all Europe and Canada combined granted 32,124 divorces, the same year the United States granted

"As compared with England, notice this, every state in this union, except Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina, with two o fthe less populous western states, aunually grants more divorces than Michigan grants an times as many divorces as England, Ohio eight times as many, Indiana ten times as many, Illinois twelve times as many SEVEN MARIAGES IN TEN A FAILURE

"Notice also the ratio of divorce to narriages in some of the states. A few vears ago there was one divorce to every six marriages in the states of California and Maine. It is but little better now. At present there is one divorce to every 7.6 in Indiana, one divorce to every eight marriages in Ohio and Rhode Island, one divorce to every ten marriages in Illinois and Connecticut, while in many other states it is almost as bad.

"The Scriptures allow divorce for bu one cause, and separation in peculia cases for one other cause. By the statutes of the various states of the union, divorce is granted for twenty-five different causes. About two years ago the world witnessed this spectacle. SAYS ANCIENT ROMANS CAME FROM IRELAND

Cicero Got His Eloquence and Caesar His Warlike Ardor From Celtic Ancestry, According to New Theory

Italians are of Irish origin is the claim made by Miss Amy A. Bernardy, professor of Italian at aristocratic Smith College, Northampton, Mass. She claims to have given the question a great deal of research and advances many proofs in support of her claims. She points to recent archeological discoveries in Ireland, which disclosed architecture very much like that found in ancient Rome, as one proof. Then she shows how the burial and funeral customs of the ancient Romans and Irish were the same. Continuing her argument, she says:


