

Head of Russian Admiralty Says Commander Has Sailed to Meet Admiral Togo

WILL FORCE ENGAGEMENT

No Chance for Repetition of Port Arthur to Be Offered Japanese

ST. PETERSBURG, May 25 .- Admiral Aveilan, head of the Russian ad. miralty department, confirms the Associated Press dispatches, saying Vice Admiral Rojestvensky is steaming north to give battle to Admiral Togo. He considers it possible news to the effect the two fleets have met may be received any day. An interview with Admiral Avellan reaffirms the official denial of the reports that Rojestvensky has broken down and asked to be relieved. Aveilan says Rojestvensky has sent detailed reports of the condition of his health and the health of the crews of his ships. The constant tenion and hard work of the past several months have been a great strain on the admiral's health.

"Even before he left," said Avellan, Rojestvensky was a sufferer from idney trouble, but his health is no His report breathes a spirit f strength, resoluteness and confidence and the other reports show he has inspired his crew with confidence in their commander. CHURCHES URGED

Commencement Exercises of Presbyterian Commissioners Advocate Co-operation Without Federation

African Missionary Describes Spread of Gospel Among Uncivilized Tribes

When the Presbyterian general assembly reconvened Wednesday afternoon, Dr. Hemphill continued his discussion of the report of the committee on federation or closer relations with other branches of the Presbyterian church. He detailed the proceedings of the Pittsburg conference on the question and referred to the pan which was framed as being most likely to meet the demands.

He said the committee representing the outhern Presbyterian church in the Pittsourg conference after digesting the plan, efused and continues to refuse to enlorse or recommend its adoption, for the cason that the committee did not believe that the best plan has yet been reached or bringing about the ends being sought. Dr. Hemphill thought it possible that a ccond conference on the question might result differently. He said he was not ready to vote for the plan in its present form, until time has been had to make the proposition acceptable.

URGES IMMEDIATE ACTION Dr. J. W. Walden, D. D., of Athens, Ga., said he was in hopes that the issue would be made. The issue, he said, has been going on since the Pittsburg conference. DISAVOWS SECTIONALISM He held it was right to declare the church's position on the question so that it might not be regarded as narrow nor be charged with sectionalism. He did not want it understood that the church continues to harbor the feelings which eparate the north and south. He said the members of the church should give an expression of their hearts, and said: "That we should not stand where we are be-

cause of political reasons."
Continuing, he said: "By opposing the movement we are put in a position of being misunderstood. The issue must be drawn. I am in favor of meeting the issue now. I feel that this issue for fraternity is the need of this assembly, and it must be satisfied. I am not in favor of organic union, but want something done which will give the real truth to

WANTS FURTHER TIME Dr. J. F. Cannon, D. D., of St. Louis, spoke in opposition, to federation in no uncertain terms. He said he had hoped that the general assembly would accept the report of the committee without the matter being discussed. He declared he opposed federation as advocated at the Pittsburg conference, but favored co-op eration. He advocated delay so that a final plan could be decided at the next general assembly. However, he opposed the amendment of Dr. Daniel, asserting that any committee the church would send to another conference might be shut out entirely. Dr. Cannon openly declared that it was his opinion that the church was against federation; that federation meant surrender of power in an official head. He said he believed in preserving the absolute sovereignty of the General Assembly. He said he had no fears that the church was ever going to forsake this bent on the church to co-operate; that in co-operation there is economy; that already the church is co-operating in many fereign countries, then why not in America, especially among the colored people? An earnest appeal for federation was

made by Dr. S. M. Neel, D. D., of Kansas City, former moderator. He said it was time Christian people were getting to-gether. He then referred to the fact that he fought four long years in the South-ern army and was several times wounded, yet he thought the time had come when there should be a clear relation between all denominations.

Dr. Reavis said that the Southern Pres-ovterian church located 200 foreign missions in seven different countries, where Christianity is being taught to 23,000,000 heathen people. There are 9,000 parishes, each with 25,000 people. He said there is need of 700 more missionaries. The church last year sent out twenty-six mis-

Rev. W. H. Sheppard, colored, co-ordinate secretary of foreign missionary work. who has spent fourteen years in the heart of Central Africa, told of his work among the savage and man-eating tribes of the Congo country. His description of the spread of Christianity, attended as it is with much difficulty and the hazard of the lives of missionaries, was interesting. Rev. Sheppard emphasized his lecture by the use of many peculiar articles brought from Africa. He said that the transition of the heathen there out of barbarism into the light of Christianity, while not rapid, was certain. Already many of the savage tribes have accepted Christianity and are growing in civilization.

He emphasized the importance of the assembly sending additional missionaries into that field, which, he said, was the darkest country on the face of the earth
