### ORIENT WILL BUILD SAN ANTONIO LINE

General Attorney Hord Announces Survey for Additional Construction

H. C. Hord, general attorney for the Kansas City, Orient and Mexico Railroad Company, headquarters at Sweetwater, is in the city today, returning home from San Angelo, where he has been looking after the legal end of the San Angelo bonus and reports an additional line may reach San Antonio.  
 He says work of construction is progressing all along the line, both in the United States and Mexico. In fact, he says that not to exceed 150 miles are yet to be built in the republic, and that work of construction is under way on three different divisions. He says President Stilwell has devoted most of his energies in pushing the construction in Mexico in order to hold the several valuable concessions granted the company by the government of that country.  
 The grade is completed from Red River to Wichita, Kan., except about thirty miles, and of this distance 100 miles of the road are in operation. The right of way, Mr. Hord says, from the north boundary line of Texas to the Mexican gulf has all been provided for and that active construction characterizes the work at every point of the route from Kansas City to Fort Stillwell. The main line has been located by Sweetwater, San Angelo, thence west to Fort Stockton and Alpaite, thence to Presidio across the Mexican border.  
 Mr. Hord also says that there is a surveying party now in the field running a second line south from San Angelo, through the counties of Schleicher, Sutton, Edwards and Finley to Spofford on the Southern Pacific, from which point it will cross the border at either Del Rio or Eagle Pass. Mr. Hord says that if the route is found to be feasible President Stilwell will probably build it on into San Antonio, but on this point he is not able to say definitely.  
 Mr. Hord says that twenty-one miles of the line north from Sweetwater are completed and will soon be operated through to Sylvester, a town named after W. W. Sylvester, vice president of the company.  
 The road south from Sweetwater toward San Angelo has been graded thirty miles and the work will be pushed on through to San Angelo, a distance of seventy-five miles, the citizens of that place having complied with the demands of the Orient road in the way of bonuses.  
 The construction of the line in this state will be continued uninterrupted, according to Mr. Hord, all arrangements for completing the line within the next few years, possibly less time, having been made by President Stilwell.

MANY AWNINGS FOUND UNSAFE  
 Police Finish Inspection and Buildings Will Be Reported to City Engineer  
 As an aftermath of the recent wind storms in the city Chief of Police J. H. Maddox reports that his officers, according to instructions, had inspected awnings in the business district, reporting to him thirty awnings which are in danger of collapsing and a menace to public safety.  
 Chief Maddox said this morning that following the regular procedure the places reported will be referred to the city engineer. Upon his investigation and condemnation, if found unsafe, they will be ordered fixed or removed.  
 "I am one of those people who believe that the business district awnings should come down altogether," said a prominent business man this morning to a Telegram representative. "I would like to see an ordinance passed requiring the removal of every awning on Main and Houston streets. Until we get rid of these unsightly front door decorations (?) we shall never have a real city. Fort Worth's business streets remind me of a country village. All this talk of 'awnings' and 'necessity on account of the sun' is rot. There are other southern cities just as hot as Fort Worth and a great many of them do not allow the downtown awnings. If our merchants only realized how much good, God-giving sunlight they were really cutting out of their stores they would get in line and tear 'em out. I would like to see the Telegram make a fight in favor of removing the awnings entirely."

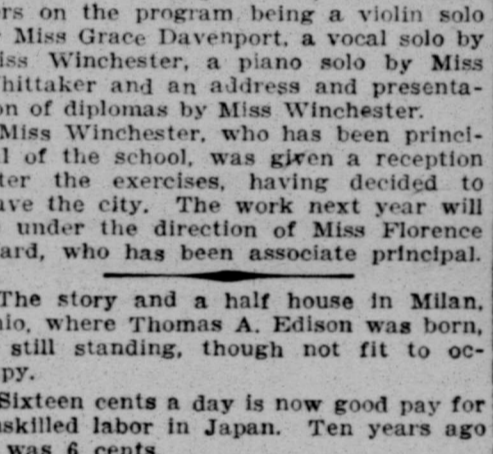

The method of preparation. Dr. Martin said, "is very simple. Place the petals on a sheet of paper on the top of a hot oven, and when thoroughly dry they are ready for use.  
 "Rolled in the long direction they can be smoked as cigarettes in the ordinary way. If used in a pipe, they should be crushed in the hands."  
 Dr. Martin says that he was influenced in making his experiments by the number of patients who consulted him and whose condition was due to the effects of tobacco.  
 Such smokers were miserable when deprived of their customary pipe. Indeed, it was rarely the case that the patient did not ask if some substitute for tobacco might not be used.

#### QUARANTINES ORDERED

Western States Enjoyed on Account of Sheep and Cattle Scab

Acting under this authority the secretary of agriculture has promulgated an order quarantining sixteen western and northwestern states on account of the prevalence of sheep scab therein, the quarantine to go into effect tomorrow. The order says:

The fact has been determined by the secretary of agriculture, and notice is hereby given, that a contagious, communicable disease known as scabies exists among sheep in the following named states and territories: Washington, Oregon, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, California, Nevada, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, Nebraska, Kansas, Texas, Arizona and New Mexico.

Now, therefore, I, James Wilson, secretary of agriculture, under authority conferred by section 1 of the act of congress approved March 3, 1905, do hereby quarantine all territory situated within the boundaries of those states.

It is ordered by this rule, under the authority and discretion conferred upon the secretary of agriculture, that sheep quarantined to any point not located in the said quarantined area only in accordance with the regulations of the secretary of agriculture.

Another order has also been issued quarantining the states of Washington, Oregon, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Wyoming and Texas, and the terri-

**REGULATIONS.**  
 The regulations governing the sheep quarantine provides that no scab-infested sheep can be shipped or trailed. They can be shipped for immediate slaughter after one dipping to any recognized slaughtering center, but when shipped they can not be diverted en route. To be shipped for stocker purposes they must be dipped twice, and can not be unloaded until dry. When exposed sheep are shipped for immediate slaughter without dipping, the railroad companies are required to fix placards on each side of the car bearing the inscription, "Exposed Sheep for Slaughter."

Scabby cattle can not be shipped or trailed. Cattle from infected areas must be shipped for slaughter if inspected and found free. Scabby cattle can be shipped for immediate slaughter after one dipping, but can not be shipped for feeders except after two dippings. Cattle not visibly diseased may be shipped for immediate slaughter without inspection where it is impossible to secure services of Inspector, but in such cases they must be shipped in cars bearing placards, "Uninspected Cattle." They must be slaughtered within two weeks after arrival at the stock yards.

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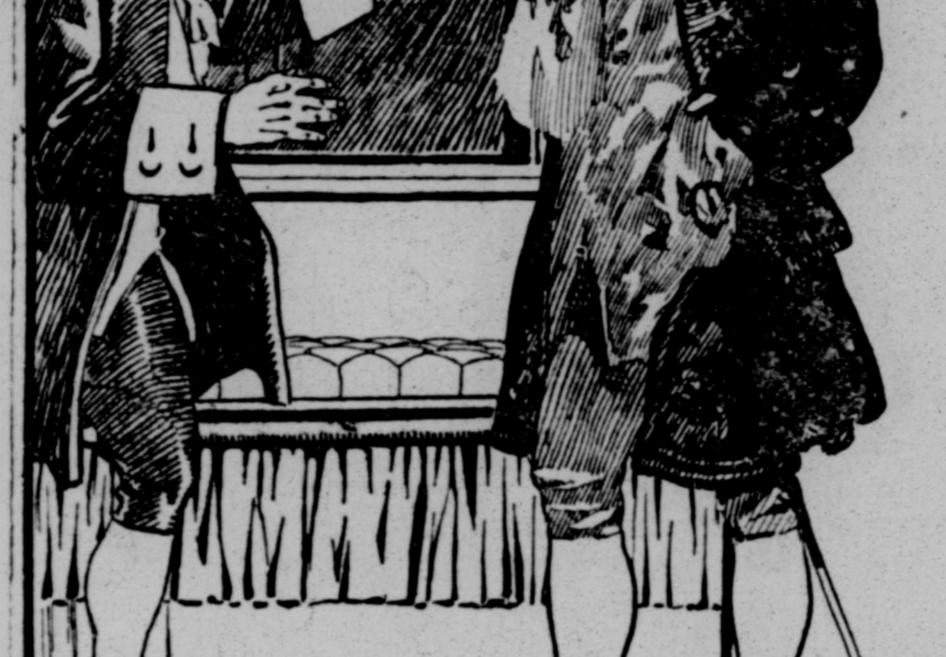

## WILL USE FORCE TO COLLECT THE TAX

Indian Agent Will Forcibly Close All Business Houses Refusing to Pay

MUSKOGEE, I. T., June 2.—Pursuant to orders from Secretary Hitchcock, received by Indian Inspector Wright this morning, the Indian police began closing the places of business which refused to pay the Creek tribal tax. The Indian police force, numbering thirty men, were ordered to report to the Indian agent for duty. Twenty men are paid, and Captain John West has instructions to report to Acting Agent Wisdom at 1 o'clock for orders. At that hour orders will be issued for the closing of all places of business delinquent on the tax. Captain West proceeded to execute the order to have the places closed. J. Pentress Wisdom, acting Indian Agent, refuses to sign the orders as directed by the secretary of the interior for the collection of the tribal tax. Agent Shumfelt is absent from the city and will not return for a day or two and the matter is held up pending his return. The orders were prepared by the Indian inspector and sent to Mr. Wisdom for his signature, but he refused on the ground that he considered it unjust and rather than submit his fellow townsmen to such an indignity he would leave the service immediately. The operation of the Indian police are to be confined to this city for the time being. The business men of other cities have pledged support and will aid the local merchants in the fight. Hitchcock today by Indian Inspector Wright's secretary, says it is needless for further delay as case has been fought through the court for three years and each time the decision sustaining the position of the interior department affirmed, and that the collection of the tax must not be longer delayed. The Indian agent is directed to proceed with the collection of the tax under the previous orders from the department, directing to close all business houses who refuse to pay. There is talk of a mass meeting this evening to determine some plan of action, as the policy to be pursued by the agency is to station guards at each place closed until the tax is paid. A great deal of excitement exists over the situation, as every line of business in the nation is jeopardized by the arbitrary action of the secretary. The amount of the tax is about \$500,000, half of that amount due from the local merchants. Many are unable to pay it. It is said several will be practically bankrupted if forced to do so.

## ARE SWARMING IN FROM OLD MEXICO

Chinese Smuggle Way Into United States Along the Rio Grande River

EL PASO, Texas, June 2.—Chinese fresh from their native country are flocking by the hundreds to the Mexican border, awaiting opportunity to smuggle themselves into the United States. Mexico places no restrictions upon the landing of Chinamen, and after they reach the southern republic they are at liberty to go where they please without inspection or interruption so long as they remain within its boundary lines. This laxity has resulted in a congestion of the Chinese population of Ciudad Juarez, across the Rio Grande river from El Paso. It has also at last resulted in extra vigilance on the part of United States inspectors stationed along the Texas and Arizona border. Chief Schumcker of the local inspection corps has heard from information which he recently sent to Washington advising the department of commerce and labor and the United States authorities have appealed to the Mexican government to cooperate in an effort to suppress the indiscriminate landing of Chinese. Following this appeal to Mexico sent out from Washington a few days ago, Chief Schumcker has been instructed to add to his force of inspectors so that the entire boundary in this district may be more carefully watched. At the present time mounted sentinels ride up and down the Rio Grande river miles and miles on either side of El Paso.

WILY CHINAMEN Of course the several bridges connecting Ciudad Juarez and El Paso are watched as usual by the regular inspectors permanently stationed there, but the wily Chinese rarely grow bold enough to try to cross the bridges. It is more to their liking to slip stealthily up or down the river to some isolated spot and there obtain transit across the river in one of the numerous skiffs that engage in the smuggling trade. Before the recent spring rise of the Rio Grande it was a common occurrence for the Chinese to attempt to swim across and in several instances they succeeded. Now the river is higher than it has been for several years and even if the inspectors were not unusually vigilant, the swimming process would be attended with numerous difficulties. One of the peculiar traits of the average Chinaman is the fact that he generally has money. Anxious to get into the United States, he is willing to pay for the privilege, and this has led to an industry in Ciudad Juarez locally known as "the Chinik marine." At least a dozen smuggler skiffs are in operation, and it is said that they are companies in Ciudad Juarez secretly organized to induce Chinese to come there from the Mexican seaports further south, at which places they land direct from China on Pacific vessels. On the Canadian border this practice is not so general for the reason that the Canadian authorities exact a bounty of \$500 for every illegal landing in that country. The United States officers hope to induce the Mexican government to at least exercise some kind of supervision over Chinese in border towns.

HAVE BOGUS CERTIFICATES Chinamen who leave this country for a visit to their old home and who remain away longer than their prescribed time and who are refused admission on their return to San Francisco, are also flocking to the Mexican border and slipping over along with the newcomers who have never before been away from China. Once they are on this side of the river with their certificates, they cannot be deported unless the immigration authorities can positively prove that they have come via Mexico. This is another difficulty in the paths of the officers, for bogus certificates are easily obtained. The smuggling companies are equipped for the manufacture of counterfeit certificates, and only a short while ago one of these illicit printing plants was discovered and confiscated at Nogales, Ariz., a border town to the west of El Paso.

THE IDOL OF EMPLOYEES HANDLEY, Texas, June 2.—The death of Mr. F. M. Haines, general manager of the Northern Texas Traction Company, at Fort Worth has caused intense sorrow here, not only among the employees in the various departments, but among our citizens generally. The power house and shops being located here, Mr. Haines, up to the time of contracting his last illness, had been a daily visitor, looking after and keeping in close touch with the large interests which he represented. He was idolized by all of his employees, who regarded him fair and just at all times, and one that would do everything for them that could possibly be done consistent with the interests of the company. Our citizens at all times found him a business man of unsuering integrity, and while not given to loquaciousness, when a decision was rendered by him they had learned to depend upon it absolutely. If "an honest man is the noblest work of God," F. M. Haines was a credit to his Maker.

RENEWAL OF RIOTING LODZ, June 2.—A renewal of rioting occurred here this morning. A crowd of people stoned a detachment of Cossacks and the latter fired, killing two persons and wounding others.

DR. FLORENCE IS ACTING AUSTIN, Texas, June 2.—Dr. J. H. Florence, quarantine inspector at Brownsville, has been designated to act as assistant state health officer during the absence of State Health Officer George R. Tabor, who is on his bridal tour.

## MANY ACCESSIONS AT TENT MEETING

Rev. Hamlin Preaches on "Influence" Last Night to a Large Audience

There were five more accessions to the church last night at the tent meeting in the depot addition. A splendid crowd assembled under the tent and there was a gentle breeze from the southeast that made it very comfortable. The seats have all been provided with rests for the back, which adds greatly to the comfort of the people. Rev. Mr. Hamlin, who is conducting the meetings, is considerate for his audience and arranges every comfort possible and never goes beyond a reasonable limit with his sermons. The service each night begins with an illustrated song at 8 o'clock and is dismissed by 9:30 o'clock. Mr. Hamlin preached a practical sermon on "Influence" last night. The sermon abounded in forceful illustrations. His text was I Tim. 5:24-25, "Some men's sins are open before-hand, going before to judgment; and some men they follow after. Likewise also the good works of some are manifest, and they that are otherwise cannot be hid." He began by saying that a drop of water falling on a little church building in Ravenna, Ohio, if falling on one side of the roof, will mingle with the waters that make up the great Ohio and Mississippi rivers and eventually flow into the Gulf of Mexico. Other drops may fall on the other side of the roof and flow into the Atlantic ocean. It would have taken very little to have directed a drop one way or the other, but if neglected at first it would be impossible to change the course of the water after it had started on its journey. "A man's influence goes before him." The public has intuition as to what a man will say before he says it, and as to what he will do before he does it. A man exerts an influence long before he commits the deed that sends him to a penal institution or to the gallows. Some think they have no influence; but in fact that is about all some people do have is their influence, and that is bad. Again some think they are not very bad sinners and they will be saved for the good they have done, but continued Mr. Hamlin, a bad case of smallpox may result from exposure to a very mild form of the disease. A father who is only neglecting his church and is not a great sinner may sow the seeds of the direct sins in his little boy's heart that will bring sorrow and misery to many lives. Let every one cultivate a disposition to do right whenever they find what is right and it will not be necessary to guard the influence of our lives, for it will be good and fruitful of good. Several persons were baptized at the First Christian church. Services will be held under the tent at the corner of Illinois and East Leuda streets as usual to-night and everybody is invited to attend these services. Mr. Hamlin will preach on "Phillip and the Eunuch." Mr. Kendall will sing "The Palm," illustrated with scenes representing "The Triumphant Entry into Jerusalem."

There was a fall of 40 points in the highest of the day and of 60 from the highest of the week. The bulls were completely routed. The government report of reduction was 2.05 below the average of private estimates and 7.03 under the estimate of the Southern Cotton Association.

## BULLOCK BROS. & BANNISTER

Corsicana Firm is Declared a Bankrupt by United States Court

DALLAS, Texas, June 2.—Bullock Bros. & Bannister, a dry goods firm of Corsicana, Texas, have been declared bankrupt by a jury in the United States court. The creditors attempted to place them in bankruptcy, but the firm appealed to the court and the jury decided against them. Liabilities \$50,000.
