

No one would credit a man with wisdom if, while his barn was burning instead of running to the reservoir, filling his bucket and running to throw it on the fire, he ran into the woods and threw the water in the creek that flows away from his home.

Dimmitt is not exactly on fire but its very economic life depends upon the money that is stored within it. Wise citizens see that their coin stays home. Foolish citizens. very often without thinking, send their money into the surrounding woods, where big city timber men use it to build up their city.
