Tonkin, the millionaire manufacturer here, this afternoon withdrew his offer of \$50,000 reward for the discovery of the identity of the author of the letters threatening to kidnap or kill his daughter Rosamond, 12 years old. "I suspect I know the person who sent the letters and who made an attempt to take my daughter from our apartments in New York," he said, in withdrawing his offer, "and I am prepared to meet and treat with that per-

son in my own way.

"The publicity that my family and myself have been subjected to is almost as annoying as the threatening letters. While I am william the subject of the letters. While I am willing to pay any sum within reason to bring the blackmailer into the hands of the authorities, I never dreamed that my family affairs would be paraded in such a manner. It even has been intimated that the author of the letters may have been an inmate in my own house-

It was learned today that little, Rosamond was kidnapped two years ago, and the family, fearing the threats of death against her would be carried out, she was ransomed. Since then the family has received dozens of threaten-

ing letters. Harold Tonkin, the elder brother of Rosamond, said today:

"We are convinced the writer is some person living here and is near us. The sketches of Rosamond were so accurate that they could have been drawn only by some one familiar with her features."

WILL KEEP UP FIGHT

This bill is wanted by the druggists because of certain alleged district boards, which, it is said, have given certificates to men grossly incompetent to practice pharmacy and not possessing even common school education. During the discussion, one member told the story of an examining board having awarded a certificate to a man whose only experience in a drug store had consisted of packing boxes and labeling them, selling chewing gum, cigars, etc. This negligence on the part of the boards was said by the members to be unfair to men who had studied for years in order to qualify for the profession, and criminal, in that it turned loose upon the public men who were incapable of properly compounding prescriptions.

R. R. D. Cline of Galveston, professor of pharmacy in Texas University, was one of the most persistent advocates of the campaign for the abolution of such practices among examining boards and made an eloquent talk relative to the upbuilding of the profession of pharmacy, profit-seeking fraternity. 


THREATENS PEACH CROP

Waco Section Troubled With New Insect That Destroys Peaches

WACO, Texas, June 15 .- The peach erop in this section is quite good, though a kind of blight has struck some peaches. It looks as though an insect lays eggs on the outside of the peach, and little round punctures soon appear, the peach deteriorating rapidly and soon becoming unfit for use. This happens just a short time before the peach is ripe. Not a large per cent are this way, but the blight ruins he peach absolutely.
