PARDONED BY PRESIDENT
Convicted Last April for Selling Whiskey Without a License
 WASHINGTON, June 16.—The president has granted a pardon to C. H. Morphew, who was convicted last April in the eastern district of Arkansas of retailing liquor without having paid the required special tax. Morphew was a druggist and sold for medicinal purpose the only preparation known to contain 88 per cent proof of spirits, claiming justification under the decision of the commissioner of the internal revenue. Morphew was held to have acted in good faith and for that reason the pardon was granted.

Conger Meets President Diaz
 CITY OF MEXICO, June 16.—American Ambassador Conger was presented officially to President Diaz in the Hall of Ambassadors in the national palace yesterday. The ceremony was marked by much splendor. A star-carriage took the ambassador from his hotel and with a mounted guard proceeded to the place, where a brilliant company, including many high army and naval officers in full uniform, were assembled in the reception hall. Many members of the American colony were also present. The addresses were very cordial.

SALE OF PUBLIC LANDS
Six Million Acres Will Be Placed Upon the Market
 AUSTIN, Texas, June 16.—Land Commissioner Terrell announced today that on Sept. 1 he will place upon the market six million acres of public lands for sale, ranging in price from \$1 up, one-fortieth to be cash and the balance on forty years' term. The list is now in the hands of the state printer.

Botts strangled his girl wife with a hair ribbon.

TO BUILD FIRE TUNNELS
Southern Pacific Lets Contracts Amounting to Over \$25,000,000
 RENO, Nev., June 16.—Announcement has been made that a contract for the construction of tunnels through the Sierra Madre mountains has been let by the Southern Pacific Company and that work on them will begin within a month. There are to be five tunnels in all, the main one to be five miles long. The first tunnel will start a short distance north of Donner lake and the series will end at the foot of Blue Canyon, on the American river. The contract calls for the expenditure of over \$25,000,000.

NORTH FORT WORTH AND ROSEN HEIGHTS

Decision as to the exact location of the North Fort Worth school building, a dispute as to which has arisen among members of the school board as announced exclusively in The Telegram, will be settled at a special meeting of the board to be held this afternoon on the school grounds. A partial canvass of the board indicates the building will be placed in the center of the school property occupying a position on Rusk street corresponding to that of the Tarrant county courthouse on Main street, Fort Worth.
At a meeting of the board held Friday night, school matters were discussed and a vaccination rule, requiring the vaccination of all pupils, adopted.
Permission to persons outside the corporate limits to attend the schools on payment of a fixed tuition was granted and plans for the conduct of the schools with eleven grades approved. Two additional teachers, making a staff of eleven, were authorized.
Members of the board declared it to be their intention to make the schools of that city second to none in the state.

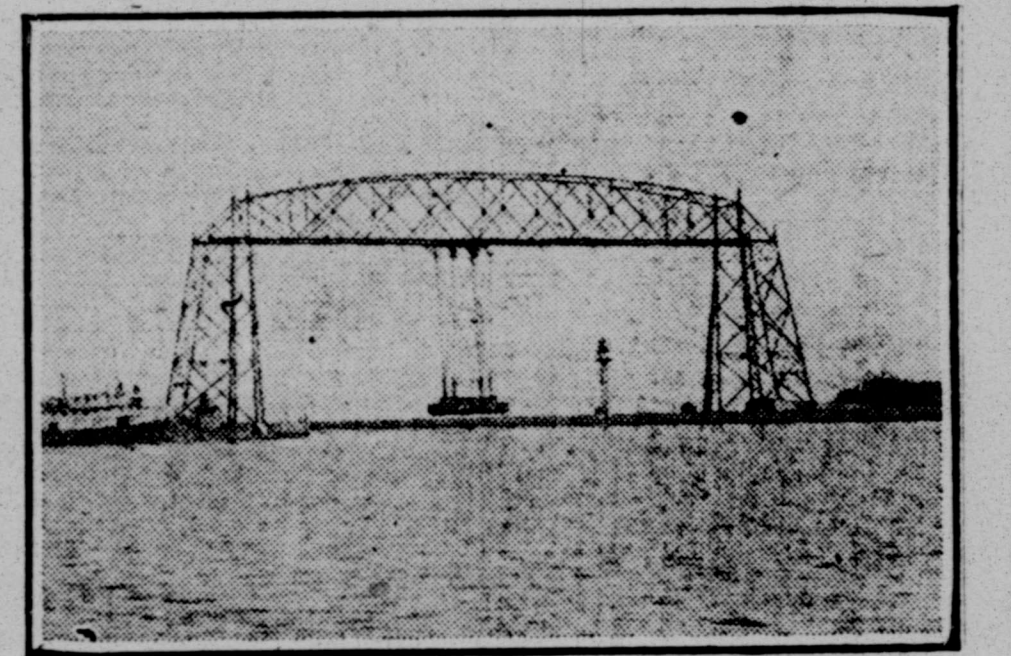

DULUTH'S UNIQUE AERIAL FERRY

DULUTH, Minn., June 15.—An aerial ferry, the only one in this country, is one of the interesting sights of Duluth. The bridge work from which the ferry is suspended is so high that the loftiest masts carried by the great ships of the lake may pass underneath.
This bridge ferry spans the waterway that connects Lake Superior with the Duluth harbor. It is 300 feet long. The clear space between the water and the lowest part of the bridge is 135 feet. From the water level to the top of the bridge is 185 feet.
The suspended ferry car is fifty feet long and thirty-four feet wide. There are two inclosed cabins. The car has capacity for 350 passengers and two loaded wagons. It travels at the rate of four miles per hour, which means that a trip requires about a minute. The bridge ferry cost \$100,000.

GRAND DUKE YIELDS TO POPULAR CLAMOR

Alexis, Together With Head of Russian Admiralty, Turn In Their Resignations

ST. PETERSBURG, June 16, 3:20 a. m.—The sensational announcement was made shortly before midnight that Grand Duke Alexis, the high admiral, who is an uncle of the emperor, and Admiral Avellan, head of the Russian admiralty department, had resigned. The announcement was followed a few minutes later by an imperial rescript relieving the grand dukes of the supreme direction of the navy which he had held since the days of the emperor's father, Alexander III, when Russia resolved to enter the lists as a first class sea power and to build up a great navy, the remnants of which were destroyed in the battle of the Sea of Japan.
The announcement of the grand

duke's resignation came like a bolt out of the blue sky. It was assumed that some sudden event caused it and ugly stories immediately came to the surface.

Among those sojourning late in the cafes and hotels, the editorial in the Nasha Shira yesterday morning demanding an accounting of the popular fund subscribed for the rebuilding of the navy and declaring that "great names are no longer guarantees," was instantly recalled.

The words of the rescript give no hint of the imperial anger and the real explanation will probably not leak out for several days, but the instant disposition was to regard the retirement of Grand Duke Alexis and Admiral Avellan as a concession to public opinion, following the growing tragedy of the Sea of Japan. Charges of mismanagement and inefficiency and tales of corruption and even worse against the marine department have been rife for years.

Grand Duke Alexis himself did not escape personal attacks, and scandal was so busy with his name that several times he was the subject of public demonstration. The name of the grand duke was high on the list of those condemned by the Terrorists.

The retirement of Admiral Avellan has not yet been published.
