THE WEST INDIES Report From Porto Rico Says Another

Effort Will Be Made

WASHINGTON, June 23 .- Official adrices from Porto Rico are to the effect that another effort will be made to consummate the purchase of the Danish West Indies by the United States. The price mentioned is the same which was considered three years ago, when the Danish upper house refused to sanction the sale to this government for \$7,000,

"CHILD SLAVERY"

Persons Who "Farm Out" Chil-

CHICAGO, June 23.—A system of virtual child slavery in which children under 14 years of age are "farmed out" into der 14 years of age are "larmed out" into households in an attempt to solve the "servant girl problem," is a state of affairs that has been brought to the attention of the department of compulsory education, following startling revelations in various justice courts of Chicago in the last three weks. That such a system exists to any alarming degree is the declaraists to any alarming degree is the declara-tion of Superintendent W. L. Bodine, who has secured the conviction of Mrs. Ottilie Krosncke in Justice Prindeville's court on the charge of violating the compulsory education law.
"This is the tenth case of its kind that

of children from institutions who are drudging as servants in many households of the city without being sent to school." Mrs. Krosncke was fined \$20 and costs, the limit in such cases. She could hardly read or write.






