

Reminiscences of an old-time

Many years ago, I went to West Texas town to cover a high school football game for a big city daily and the man on the gate refused to honor my pass because it was signed by only one school. The cost of a ticket was 75 cents and so I paid 38 cents as the monreceipts. (That item was included in my expense account but it wasn't listed by itself!)


