Soil Conservation Plans Field Trip The annual soil conservation district field tour will be held on August 29, in the Running Water Soil Conservation District which covers Castro County. The tour will begin at 10:00 a.m. with a meeting at the American Legion Hall in Hart, Texas. The morning program will be devoted to speakers who will speak on the practices to be observed during the afternoon tour. The noon meal will be served to all those attending through the courtesy of The Farmers State Bank of Hart and The First State Bank of Dimmitt. The afternoon tour will begin immediately after lunch and will be devoted to touring farms in the area of the county that lies to the west of Hart. Some of the practices to be observed will be the latest water conservation measures and recent pastures that have been established. Also on the agenda will be a visit to the farm of H. B. Hayden, who was selected as the outstanding conservation farmer of the soil conservation district in 1960. Wade Mills, chairman of the Running Water Soil Conservation District, has said, "This is the best tour we have had. Walter Rogers' WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

Many speeches have been made and many articles written about the erosion of the rights of the individual American. Most of these comments are in general terms and in broad, abstract references. They usually arouse the emotions of the audience or the readers at first blush, because no one likes to lose a fundamental right. Yet as soon as the individual listener or reader cools down from the immediate emotional stimulation, he relaxes into the usual state of complacency because he cannot, at the moment, call to mind the loss of any specific right that has affected him primarily or directly. This creates an atmosphere that is most helpful to the advocates of centralized government. They realize that by the time many of the people of this country feel the full impact of the loss of most significant basic rights over a period of time, it will be too late for them to do anything about it. Realizing the jealousy with which most Americans try to guard their basic rights, I felt constrained to call to your attention a situation which occurred in the Congress last week where another right was just to be lost. The bill was H. R. 8033 and had to do with the reorganization of the Interstate Commerce Commission. It was short and had a most innocuous appearance. It was advertised as being for the purpose of expediting the business and increasing the efficiency of the Interstate Commerce Commission. If this purpose is accomplished, and there is doubt it will be, it appears that there will be paid a basic right heretofore enjoyed by persons having business before that bureau. The Interstate Commerce Commission is constituted for the purpose of handling transportation matters. The final decision in all controversial matters was the responsibility of the Commission, the members of which had to be appointed by the President

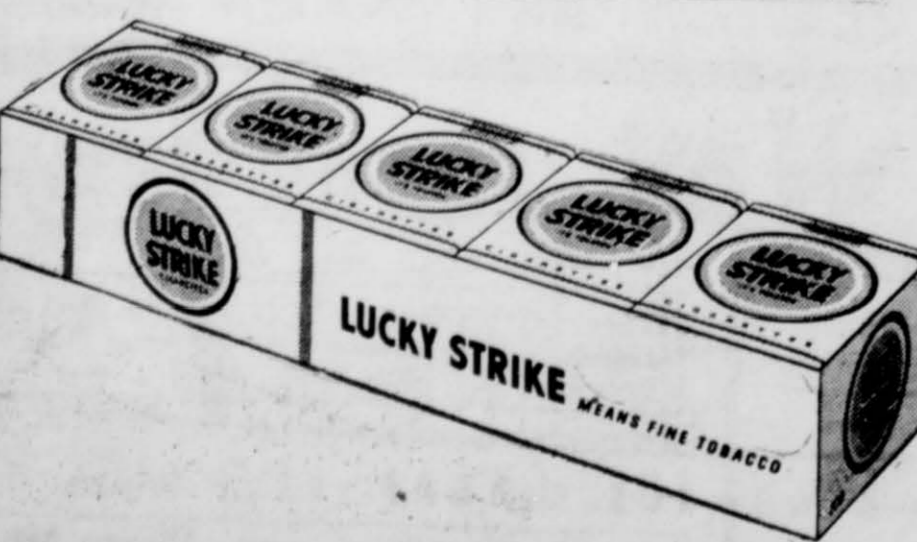

of the United States and confirmed by the Senate. The members are not elected by the people. The ICC is the oldest regulatory agency or bureau in our government. It has a tremendous amount of work to perform and must delegate many of the activities of gathering together facts and information, to Civil Service employees working for the Commission. In the past these employees in many instances worked together to present a recommendation to the Commission. The new law provides a procedure whereby the adjudicatory powers formerly vested solely in the Commission may now be exercised by Civil Service employees with the right of review or the right of appeal being confined to an employee board made up of Civil Service employees who have all of the rights and job protection afforded Civil Service employees. If a party is dissatisfied with the findings of the employee board, he may then ask the Commission, or the privilege of being heard by the Commission. Heretofore he had the right to demand that his case be heard by the Commission. Now he must go, hat in hand, and beg for an audience. In other words, the right that he formerly enjoyed has been destroyed. For if, instead of the whim or discretion of the Commission, or by whom you prefer, in my opinion a very poor substitute. Although this may seem highly technical to many of you, I thought that you should know one of the specific instances to which the loss of a right occurred. It appears to me that it will enable what is meant by the erosion of our rights. What happened with relation to the I. C. C. can and probably will be extended to other bureaus. Several of us fought bitterly and vigorously on the floor of the House to prevent passage of the bill, as we had done previously with regard to a similar bill concerning the Federal Communications Commission. Our efforts were in vain, although we gained many recruits. The fight will continue.

Senator YARBOROUGH'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Texans: The U. S. Senate, on August 9th passed my amendment calling for a maximum death penalty for plane hijackers. The Senate action was hijacked by a Puerto Rican, armed with a gun and knife. Under terms of the amendment the jury would have a choice of the death penalty, life imprisonment or a term of not less than 20 years.

On August 3, a Continental Airlines B-707 was hijacked by two men while enroute from Phoenix to El Paso. The hijackers, an American father-son team, ordered the crew to fly to Havana. The pilot persuaded them to let him land for fuel and the plane was held on the ground at El Paso by Border Patrol, FBI and local police who punctured the tires with sub-machine gun fire. The hijackers said they wanted to take the airplane to Havana to sell to Castro. The elder of the two hijackers had an arrest history dating back to August, 1941. This is the day I introduced the amendment providing a death penalty for hijackers. At first the sentiment in the Senate was divided, with some favoring an amendment for life imprisonment. Support for provision seemed to be gaining favor because nearly everyone wanted some stringent action that could be agreed on quickly. Then on August 9th, a Pan American World Airways DC-8, enroute from Mexico City to Guatemala City, was hijacked by

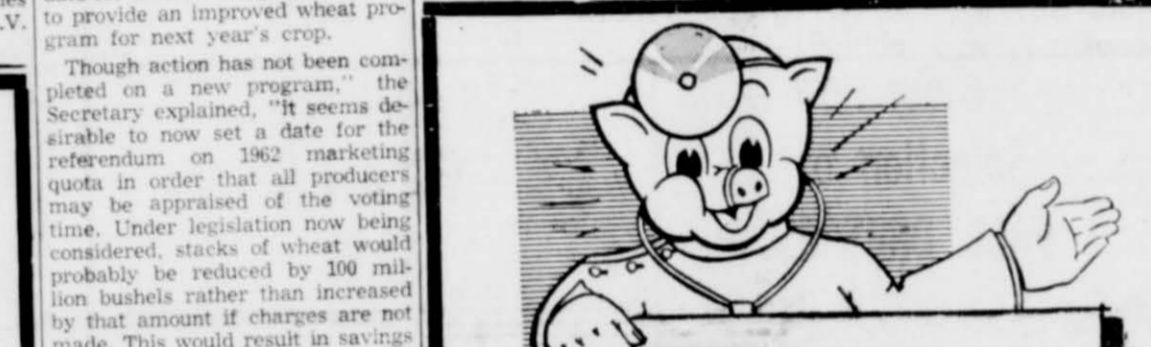

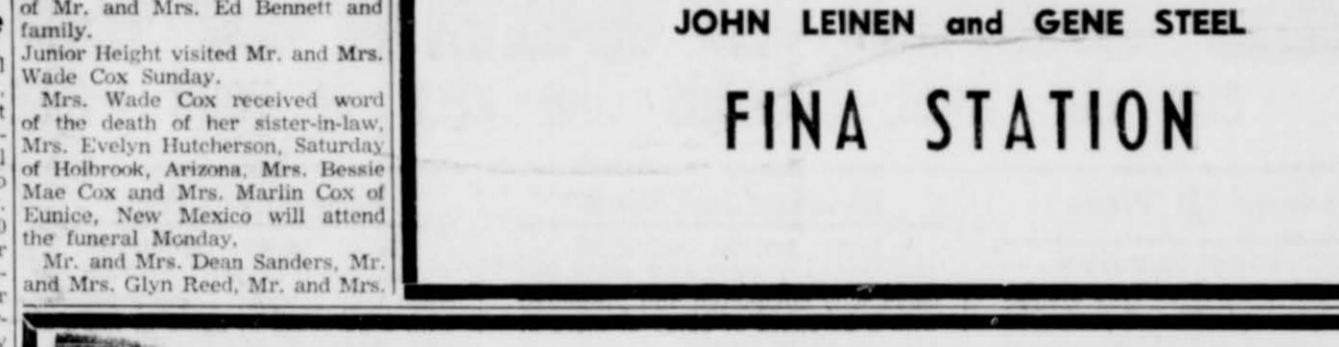
