Castro County Endorses Running Water Project

Completion of first stage in the creation of Running Water Draw Water Shed was assured recently when Lamb and Castro Counties signed co-sponsorship agreements with the Running Water Draw Water Shed authority. This action brings all counties and cities involved into joint agreement as the first step toward creation of a chain of dams and lakes up and down the water shed from Curry Co. New Mexico, through Parmer, Castro, Lamb, Swisher, and Hale Counties in Texas.

F. F. Calhoun, Chairman of Hale County Soil Conservation Board, and Chairman of Running Water Draw Water Shed Project Steering Committee, stated Saturday that the forward thinking responsible action of all officials and interested citizens in the various counties was a big jump in the right direction for control of flood waters, soil erosion, conservation of water, and for creation in the future of recreational areas from all of which unborn generations will benefit.

Calhoun also stated that costs of such a project is a complex matter related to the various benefits involved from the creation of such a project spread out over a very long period of years—possibly as long as a hundred years—and would involve Federal, State, and Conservation aid as well as other interested and benefited organizations such as Wild Life Refuge areas and recreational areas.

The Steering Committee of the Project is composed of one member from each county Soil Conservation District, one representative from each commissioner's Court, and one representative from each city signing co-sponsorship agreements. From the Soil Conservation Districts representatives are Leon Marks, Clovis, New Mexico; A. L. Black, Friona; Wade Mills, Nazareth; H. A. Hysinger, Olton; Woody Boston, Kress; and F. F. Calhoun, Plainview. Other members of the Steering Committee will be named by the counties and cities this week preparatory to a committee meeting to be held in the near future to continue work on the project.

Members of the committee expressed their appreciation for the efforts on the part of all county and city officials and interested citizens spread out over the 480,000 acres of the Water Shed. One member stated that the actual benefits of this immense area would literally stagger the imagination when full realization and comprehension is possible.

High Plains Water Relocates Office

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District has announced the re-location of its Castro County office.

Tom McFarland, General Manager of the Water District, stated that the Castro County office will still remain in Dimmitt but has been moved to the City Hall.

He added that E. B. Noble, Dimmitt City Manager, will act as the Water Committee's Secretary, and will assist county landowners in filling out well-drilling permit applications.

McFarland said that the Castro County Committee will continue to hold its monthly meeting on the last Saturday of each month at 10:00 a.m., but in the Dimmitt City Hall.

OUR STRENGTH IS GREAT

EDITOR'S NOTE—Because of the exorbitant amount of publicity, being given the establishment of a U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency by the U.S. Congress, by the regional daily press, we feel that the following news release from Congressman Walter Rogers deserves special emphasis. Apparently a segment of the daily press in the United States is determined to destroy the confidence of the people of this country in their government and in all the agencies of the government. We are happy to give special treatment to Congressman Rogers' news letter and suggest that our readers compare the common sense logic set forth in this letter with the insane rantings, that have been the daily dose for Panhandle readers, in the Amarillo News, on the subject of disarmament. The letter follows:

OUR STRENGTH IS GREAT

This country is not going to be disarmed. No government agency has the authority under any law to strip away our defenses. The Congress of the United States has neither proposed nor approved any plan for the disarmament of this country. No responsible voice in Congress or the Administration has proposed unilateral—"go it alone"—disarmament, or indeed disarmament in any form unless there are iron-clad guarantees that the Soviet Union will reduce its armaments in similar measure. Our sovereignty is not going to be turned over to the United Nations or any other organization or nation. Our defenses are stronger today than ever in history.

These are the facts.

My mail recently has been full of concern expressed by good citizens over a bill passed into law 17 months ago—passed with bipartisan support in both houses of Congress after its provisions were strongly endorsed by President Kennedy and former President Eisenhower and the leading figures of their administrations. By a vote of 290 to 54 in the House (including 194 Democrats and 90 Republicans voting in

favor) and 73 to 14 in the Senate, the Congress established the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency—not an agency to trade away our arms, as some would tell you, but an agency to coordinate and improve upon activities that have been pursued by departments of our government virtually since the end of World War II. We have taken part in more than 70 international conferences touching on questions of arms reduction since the war; we are engaged in another such conference as I write this. By setting up the agency, Congress saw to it that our security position was enhanced as these negotiations continue. The agency brings together in one department diverse activities that had been pursued independently by several branches of the government, usually without coordination, sometimes to our great risk.

In the meantime, we are continuing to spend more for defense purposes than ever before in our history. The President's budget proposal for the next fiscal year calls for defense expenditures of \$55.4 billion. By the end of this year, it is estimated, members of the Armed Forces on active duty are to number 2.7 million. We are proud of our strength and well aware of the cost—more than \$300 billion since World War II, more than half of each tax dollar now earmarked for defense purposes. The cost is great, but Communism's spear is blunted.

In his State of the Union Address, delivered to the Congress on January 14, 1963, President John F. Kennedy said, "Finally, what can we do to move from the present pause toward enduring peace? Again I would counsel caution. I foresee no spectacular reversal in Communist methods or goals. But if all these trends and developments can persuade the Soviet Union to walk the path of peace, then let her know that all free nations will join with her. But until that choice is made, and until the world can develop a reliable system of international security, the free peoples have no choice but to keep their arms near."

"I think it is a matter of our national security just as much as our national defense is," said President Eisenhower's former Defense Secretary, Thomas S. Gates, in advocating passage of bills to set up the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency. "Even if no progress is made on disarmament, it is still essential for the United States to appear before the world as a country which can evolve constructive ideas in this crucial field," said Henry Cabot Lodge, Ambassador to the United Nations in the Eisenhower Administration and Republican candidate for vice president in 1960. "I think this agency will enhance our national security interests... To deal with this problem most effectively, a permanent organization that can attract and hold top talent is needed," said General Lyman Lemnitzer, then Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, now NATO commander. "I heartily concur in your purpose," wrote General Eisenhower, in support of the bill. "This agency can get the security that we are trying to achieve with our Military Establishment and other agencies, if it is understood and misrepresented," said Rep. Walter H. Judd of Minnesota, keynote speaker at the 1960 Republican National Convention.

I was among Southern States Congressmen who authored an amendment to the House bill, an amendment introduced by Rep. L. H. Fountain in North Carolina, to make certain this country enters into no disarmament agreement except in accordance with the Constitution. The act establishing the agency thus requires two-thirds ratification by the Senate of any arms reduction treaty. Last year, I proposed a constitutional amendment that would require majority approval of the House, in addition to the two-thirds approval by the Senate, before any treaty could become law. I've re-introduced the resolution in this session.

Doctor Hewatt was born in Gainesville in 1904. He is a graduate of Polytechnic High School in Fort Worth. He graduated from TCU in 1927 with a major in biology and minor in chemistry and geology. He took his M.S. at TCU in 1928. His major was biology and minor was geology. In 1934, he completed his Ph.D. at Leland Stanford University with a major in marine biology and minor in paleontology.

His professional positions include instructor in biology and geology at North Texas State College in Denton, in summers of 1927-1933; instructor in biology and chemistry at Tyler Junior College in Tyler during 1929-1931; Texas Christian University Department of Biology and Geology from 1933 till the present; professor since 1941; and Chairman of Department from 1952 till the present.

Also, he is the instructor in Marine Invertebrates, Marine Biological Laboratory, Woods Hole, Massachusetts, summer of 1942; visiting professor of Marine Biology, University of Puerto Rico, Mayaguez, 1945-46; and consultant in Marine Biology, Texas A & M Research Foundation, 1947-50.

Also, he is Oyster Biology Consultant in Virginia Fisheries Laboratory, Gloucester Point, Va. for the summers 1950 till the present. Marine Biology Consultant, Magnolia Petroleum Co., Field Research Laboratory, Dallas, 1953 till the present; and director of the Fort Worth Regional Science Fair for the past 11 years.

Doctor Hewatt has also been premedical, predoctoral advisor at TCU for the past 30 years.

Rev. Frank Peery Will Be Speaker At Men's Meeting

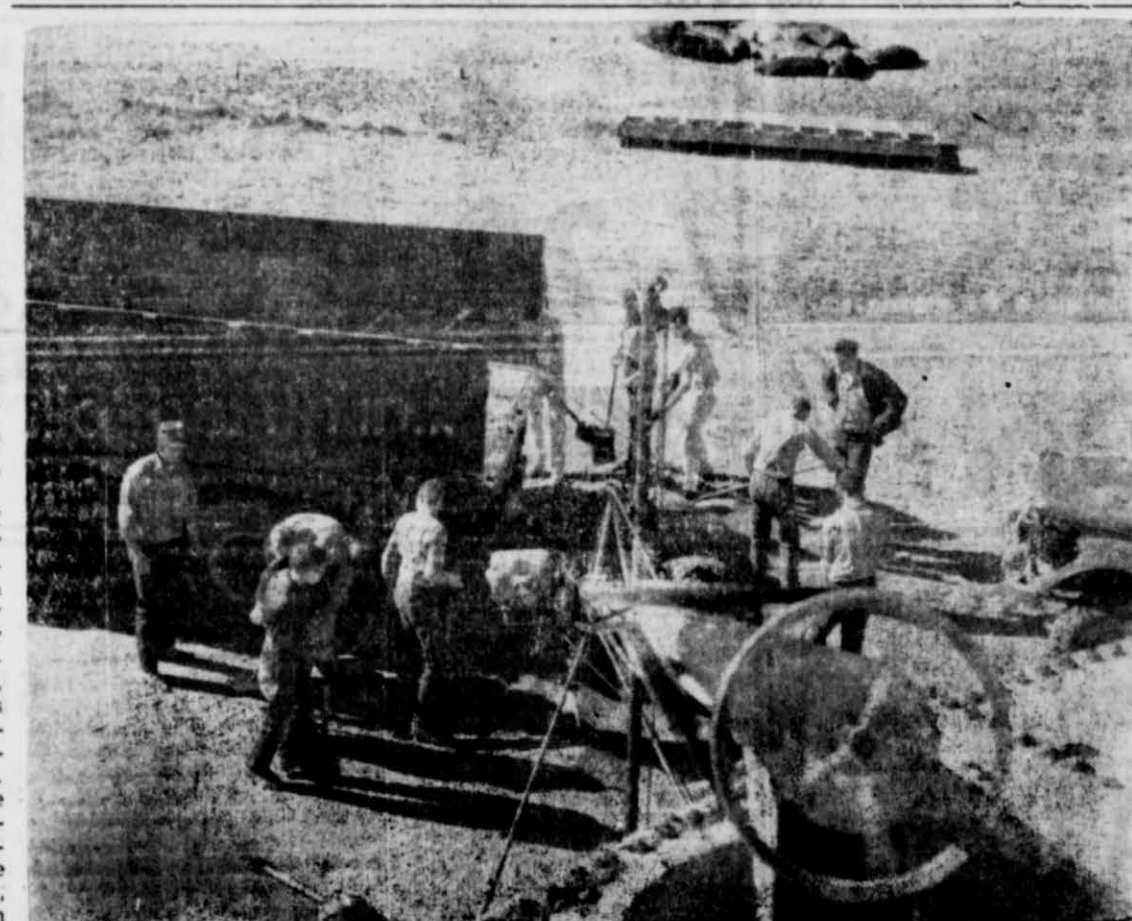

An honorary grain club formed by the Dimmitt Jaycees with its main objective being to collect and deliver grain sorghum to Boys Ranch at Tascosa to be fed to ranch livestock succeeded again as they massed 144,840 lbs. in their collection. The 1962 grain club committee consisted of Rayphard Smithson, Raymond Crum, and J. G. Davis.

The caravan of trucks loaded with 144,840 lbs. of grain sorghum reached Boys Ranch February 3 by pre-arranged schedule.

Donating trucks were Nelson Trucking, Holland Trucking, Bruegel and Sons Elevator, and Bob Dulaney. Drivers were Willie John Word who drove the Nelson Bros. semi-trailer, Buddy Price who drove the Holland Trucking semi-trailer, Fred Bruegel, Jr., and Bob Dulaney.

Cal Farley and the Boys Ranch Staff have expressed their gratitude to everyone who donated grain equipment, or services to the program.

The grain sorghum given will help feed 46 dairy cattle, 63 horses, over 100 hogs, and 10 to 20 head of beef cattle at Boys Ranch. The Ranch has received a new storage tank recently donated and installed by Phillips Petroleum Co. The capacity of the new tank is 500,000 lbs. Boys Ranch now has 1,000,000 lb. capacity including old storage space for feed grain.

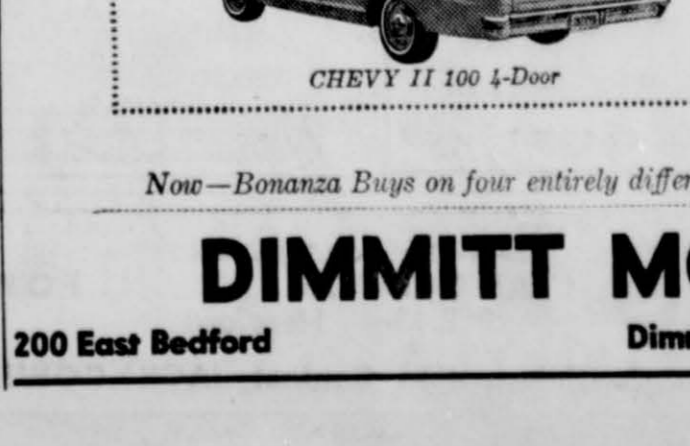

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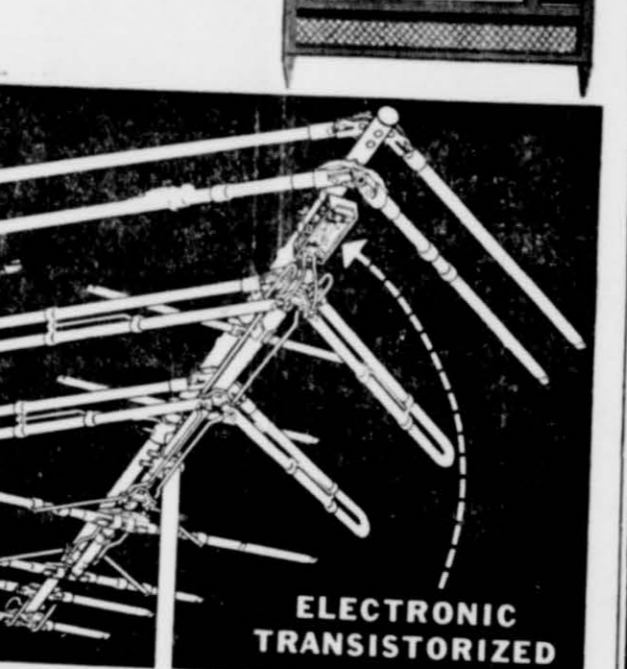

Grain Sorghum Chat

We are told that if we could get freight adjusted so that we could compete with corn shipped down the Mississippi river that these four states in the Southeast US could use all the grain surplus we have for their poultry and livestock feeding.

Your local and national Association is trying very hard to get legislation passed so we may access this market.

If you gave two scoops full of grain for every 15,000 lb. of grain you raised, you have paid your share to support GSPA. Pretty small amount isn't it?

Would you please check with your elevator man and see if he held out your two pounds for GSPA. "How would you like your hair cut, Sir?" "A little cheaper."

Bench Leveling Pays Dividends

Does bench leveling of irrigated land with 2 and 3 percent slope pay? James C. Valliant, associate water engineer at the High Plains Research Foundation, says it does. In Research Report No. 5 issued in January 1963, it is shown that three year results on both cotton and grain sorghum planting on bench level land paid off in comparison with sloping land at the Foundation.

The returns from bench-leveling are three-fold. They are (1) increased yield; (2) decreased water usage; and (3) saving valuable soil from eroding while building up soil fertility.

The difficulties of early bench leveling were that the benches were frequently not of uniform width for equipment use, point rows were numerous and border maintenance was difficult. The benches at the Foundation were constructed parallel so that four-row equipment could be used and point rows could be eliminated. A new bench border maintainer, used for the first time in 1962, apparently solves the problems of border maintenance and border weed control. The use of these modern methods has paid for the cost of constructing and maintaining benches and farm profits have increased over a period of years.

In grain sorghum on benches over sloping land was \$22.69 per acre. On cotton the three year average was \$21.39 per acre. Capital loss from soil erosion on sloping land is far greater than many realize. Fertilization, pumping cost, cultural practices, time of irrigation and yields were included in report No. 55, released to supporters of the Foundation this week.

Dr. Robert Miller Will Speak At Heritage Dinner

Plainview, Special-Chairman of the department of political science at Baylor University, Dr. Robert E. Miller, will be speaker at the Plains American Heritage dinner at 6:30 p.m., Monday, Feb. 11, at Wayne's Restaurant in Plainview. In addition to the regular meeting, a brief session of the Steering Committee has also been called for that evening by Lyle Brown, director.

Representing Dimmitt on the committee is Mrs. Avis Smith, representing Hart is H. L. Cavanaugh, Social Science teachers from Dimmitt and Hart and nine other participating cities will attend. Directed by Brown, assistant professor of history and political science at Wayland Baptist College, the program is coordinated by the college.

Dr. Miller, who received his B. A. and M. A. degrees from Baylor, Waco, and his Ph.D. degree from the University of Texas, Austin, is co-author of two books, "Church and State in Scripture History and Constitutional Law," and "Church and State." An authority in his field, he also serves as associate editor of "A Journal of Church and State."

From June 1961 to August of 1962 Dr. Miller served as administrative assistant to W. R. Poage, congressman. He is a member of American Political Science Assn., Southwestern Social Science Assn. and Pi Sigma Alpha.

County TSTA Members Met In Hart Cafeteria

County administrators and teachers met Thursday night in Hart Cafeteria for the second program of Castro County TSTA.

During a short business session delegates were elected to the Teachers Convention in Amarillo, March 7-8. They are Alvis Purgay, Evin Froehner, both of Dimmitt, Gerald Rue of Nazareth and Malcolm Alwood of Hart.

Also, officers were elected for the Castro County Unit TSTA for next year. Bill Residorph of Dimmitt will be president, Carl Wayne Tribbeck will be vice-president, Mrs. Glenn Hatcliff will be secretary; and Malcolm Alwood will be treasurer.

Local administrators were guest speakers on the program. Paul Hillburn, superintendent of Dimmitt schools brought the first talk on "Texas Legislative Program." His talk emphasized the three bills affecting teachers and education which are before the Texas legislature at the present time. These bills are the Retirement Bill, the Sick Leave Bill and the Regional Film Bill.

The Retirement Bill relates to the calculation of the standard annuity allowable to members of the Teacher Retirement System. The Sick Leave concerns providing a sick leave policy for all public school teachers. The Regional Film Bill provides for purchase and distribution of educational motion picture films in the public school system.

Mrs. Helen Richardson spoke concerning "How Textbooks Are Selected in Texas." She commented, "There are differences between the Texas textbook program and those of other states which cannot be discussed here because of limited time."

"It is difficult to conceive of a textbook program that is more practical, flexible, or adequate than the one now used in Texas," continued the grade school principal. She summed up her topic by saying, "Thirteen years of practice have proved its effectiveness; and during this time there have been few objections from teachers, school officials, and patrons."

Paul Kennedy, superintendent of Hart, brought the last topic on the agenda. He spoke about the "Henry Stillwell Home for Retired Teachers." He said, "The home is being constructed for Texas retired teachers who are 62 years of age or over, who have taught at least 10 years, and are members of the Texas Retired Teachers' Association." According to Kennedy, the residence will contain 92 units and will provide a home for 111 occupants. The living units will include 54 single bedrooms, 22 double bedrooms, 16 designated for one or two occupants (8 of the apartments will have kitchenettes and extra living and closet space).

Kennedy said, "The minimum monthly rate per person for double occupancy will be \$115." "Included in the above rates are all utilities, good nutritional meals, heavy cleaning, and limited health service," he said.

The Stillwell Memorial Residence is located adjacent to the Lake Air Shopping Center in Waco. The residence covers 3 1/2 acres of land according to Kennedy.
