

WEAVER'S VICTORY COMPLETE PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 8.—The political

revolution in this city and in the state yesterday was the greatest that has occurred in Pennsylvania in nearly a generation. There have been previous upheavals, but this is the first time in years that every office for which there was semblance of a contest has been lost to the regular republicans; also the first time in a quarter of a century the regular republicans have been defeated for the control of the state treasury. Memorable contests have been waged against republicans for this office, but without uccess, and it was worthy to note yesterday's election was the first that has been held for the place since the death of former Senator Quay.





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COMMISSIONER GARFIELD'S STRANGE SILENCE

Commissioner Garfield of the federal bureau of corporations, and author of that celebrated beef trust report, refuses absolutely to discuss the contention of the big packers to the effect that he promised them immunity from punishment in behalf of the government in return for evidence furnished during his investigation. He maintains the same strange and stoical silence that has characterized his attitude since he first came under fire after the beef trust report was made public. Whether this is defiance of public sentiment, or is occasioned by the fact that Commissioner Garfield realizes he is in a deep hole, is not yet apparent. But it is a fact that the packers have taken refuge behind the commissioner and are trying to use his skirts for their own protection. The department of justice at Washington is said to be preparing a denial of the packers' contentions, but it will be noticed that they tell a pretty straight story.

In view of the fact that so much interest attaches to the present situation, it is well to consider the matters involved from the inception of the Garfield investigation. The beginning was a resolution passed by the house of representatives March 7, 1904, directing the secretary of commerce and labor "to investigate the causes of the low price of beef in the United States since July 1, 1903, and the alleged unusually large margins between the prices of beef cattle and the selling prices of fresh beef," and to ascertain whether there was any combination between the packers by investigating "the organization, capitalization, profits, conduct and management of business of such corporations, companies and corporate combinations, and to make early report of his findings according to law." In making the investigation Commissioner Garfield went to Chicago, South Omaha, Kansas City, Sioux City, Fort Worth, St. Joseph, Los Angeles, East St. Louis and other cities, visiting the packing plants and securing the testimony of officials and employes and documentary evidence in their possession.

The packers declare that Commissioner Garfield first informed them of his power under the law, to force them to appear before him and answer under oath any questions he might ask them, and also to produce all documentary evidence desired by him. After asserting his power, Commissioner Garfield promised the packers, according to their allegations, that no evidence given to him would be used against them in any other proceeding by the government. The claims of the packers of bad faith on the part of the government are thus set forth in the special plea recently filed:

"The commissioner of corporations did call to the attention of and invoke to the defendants the provisions of the law as to the powers of said commissioner to compel the giving of testimony and the production of evidence by these defendants, and did require these defendants to testify before the commissioner, but without the administration of an oaththe commissioner in that behalf waiving the administering to the defendants of any oath as such witnesses-and did assure and promise to these defendants that any and all facts which they might disclose would be given by them and received by the commissioner in all respects as if the same had been and in obedience to a subpoena duly served upon | nately situated. the defendants and upon a formal hearing by the commissioner, and that the defendants should have the same rights, indemnities and immunities as if their testimony were given after service of subpoena and administration of oath.

"And this defendant further avers," says the plea, "that the said commissioner, in giving the said assurance and promise to this defendant, did then and there act for and on behalf of the said United States of America, and by and with the authority of the secretary of commerce and labor of the said United

States of America. The packers specifically declare in their plea that Commissioner Garfield gave his official pledge that the testimony information and facts given or disthereof, by the department of justicy, or the atterney a reform, have worked a political revolution. (It may be basis of or in or about any prosecution or proceeding against these defendants."

The direct charge is made by the packers that Commissioner Garfield, notwithstanding his promises, gave to the attorney general and his assistants and the United States attorney and his assistants "each and all of the facts and information" given under compulsion by the packers to Commissioner Garfield, and that the same have been and are being ed against the packers in the present criminal

prosecution. In their final plea the packers declare that under the laws of the United States they are entitled to immunity from prosecution because of the promise made by Commissioner Garfield, and the court is therefore asked to dismiss the criminal suit pending

The leading papers all over the country are united in denouncing the alleged action of Commissioner Garfield in promising the packers immunity from punishment. The following editorial from the Kansas City Journal will give an intelligent idea of the drift of that criticism:

When Commissioner Garfield made his whitewashing report showing that the beef trust was a philanthropic institution, doing business at an infinitesimal profit and often at an actual loss for the benefit of the public, intelligent people over the country formed an opinion as to that young man's ability that was in inverse ratio to his lamented father's greatness. But the plea set up by the packers as a bar to government prosecution, to the effect that at the time of Garfield's so-called investigation he promised them immunity from prosecution by the government on account of the matters disclosed in the inquiry, is still a more astounding revelation. If true it caps the climax of official incompetency or worse. Instead of "straining the machinery of the law to the utmost to bring the packers to justice," as President Roosevelt declared, it appears that his young assistant in the department of labor and commerce has smashed the machinery beyond all hope of repairs.

It will now be in order for these much-abused packers-martyrs of injured innocence-to demand damages of the government for their lacerated feelings and the irreparable injury to their spotless reputations. Their newspaper organs should also soundly berate the misguided and corrupt United States prosecuting attorneys who have undoubtedly been prompted by political motives in instituting these

prosecutions against innocent men.

In the meantime the patient public will do well to sit up and pinch itself to make sure that it is awake. Here in Jackson county, as elsewhere over the country, we have grown somewhat accustomed to seeing justice chloroformed and the law cheated of its dues by wretched technicalities cunningly employed by the "best lawyers." But it is doubtful if anybody has yet heard of such a travesty on justice as is involved in this plea of the packers, that the high government official employed to secure evidence of their guilt opened the door for their escape.

STANDING UP FOR TEXAS

There was no halting or equivocation in the remarks of Judge Charles K. Bell of this city when he touched upon the charges of graft and official corruption alleged to be prevailing in Texas, in his speech at Dallas Monday evening. He spoke to the point and showed his utter lack of sympathy with the efforts being made to use this issue as a means of boosting candidates for high political office in this state. In closing his address Judge Bell said:

I do not believe and have no reason to suspect that corruption in office prevails in our state, and am not willing by insinuation to reflect on those whom I would not dare to openly charge with crime, but all honest men court investigation. They know that the shafts of envy and malice will glance from the armor of their integrity or fall harmless at their feet, and that they will rise above the assaults of their calumniators triumphant and victorious.

As a vindication of those who have kept the faith, for the detection, punishment and eternal disgrace of those who have betrayed their trust, if any such there be, I would urge a rigid investigation of the governmental departments and institutions.

If such an investigation should show that any of those whom we have honored have proven false we will hang our heads in shame, but if it should disclose as I feel-as I know-it must, that our officials have been faithful, true and loyal to their friends and to their country, then will we rejoice, and then will Texas continue to stand proudly up among the sisterhood of states, and our glory be upheld by the common devotion of an undivided people.

And that is the kind of talk that ought to reach the hearts of Texas people. If one-half the allegations that have been already made in the campaign were true there would be no method of convincing the people that all our public officials are not corruptionists and men who have no higher conception of public office than to regard it as a private snap. And the intelligent voters of this state know how utterly untrue such allegations are. They know that honesty is one of the cardinal virtues of Texas democracy, and that no breath of suspicion can legitimately attach to any public officeholder of prominence in Texas today. They know that the affairs of the state government have been wisely and economically administered by the men who have held office in this state in an unbroken line since the democracy has been in power, and that while errors may have been committed, they were errors of the head and not of the heart.

Every cent of public money that is handled by a state official has to be accounted for. Every proper safeguard has been placed about the public funds, and Texas has no state treasury scandals. It is true that there is a large deficiency in the state treasury. but that deficiency is not the result of mismanagement on the part of any Texas state official. It was not occasioned by any form of official extravagance or graft in any department of the state government. That treasury deficiency is the net result of legislative neglect in failing to equalize the taxes of the state so that revenue sufficient for the state's needs would be provided. The legislative branch of the state government only failed to correctly estimate the increased cost of state government under the rapid development that is now in progress. The state was left to meet these increased expenses absolutely without any provision in that direction, and under such circumstances there could be nothing else but a deficiency. Means have been taken, however, to provide for the wiping out of this deficiency, and it will be accomplished in due time and the state again placed on a cash basis. In the meantime taxes remain low. At least, they are not so burdensome and onerous as in other southern and western states. and the people of Texas are enjoying the blessings of a good and efficient government at a very low given by way of testimony under oath and pursuent cost in comparison with other states not so fortu-

The Telegram commends Judge Bell for his bold and manly stand for the fair name of his state. It shows that he has no sympathy for the methods too often used by designing politicians for the advancement of their own interests. He is standing up for Texas, and in standing up for Texas he is winning golden opinions from all that great element of Texas people who are opposed to the methods he is fighting. Judge Bell has taken the right position and it is a position that will be indorsed by every loval son of Texas.

AMONG THE EXCHANGES

"It doesn't make any difference who kept yellow fever out of Texas," remarks the Fort Worth Telegram. "The fact that it was kept out is the point in the situation that is of material interest to the people." But the yellow fever was not kept out. The only case known which attempted to enter Texas succeeded, but the victim was sufficiently considerate to leave the state before the fever put him to bed and ultimately in his grave. The Telegram can verify this by referring to its files.—Beaumont Journal,

Very well, then. The Telegram will qualify its remark. It makes no difference who brought yellow fever into Texas, since it was permitted to do no harm.

* * * * The packers in their plea before the federal court allege that Commissioner Garfield promised them that their evidence before the federal inquiry should not be used against them in the criminal prosecution of their cases. Mr. Garfield says that the department of justice at Washington will probably call for the facts in the case. The insinuation is that there will be something revealed when the department of justice calls on Mr. Garfield. If the claims of the packers are substantiated, there will be something hot in the vicinity of Mr. Garfield's spine. He will have to show that there is nothing in the claim of the packers, or he will go down and out at the earnest solicitation of public sentiment.-Sherman Register.

The Gartield report has furnished the packers with just about all the defense they have yet been able to advance in the cases pending against them. Its introduction for the purpose puts the federal gov. ernment in the anomalous position of seeking to convict men and at-the same time furnishing them with a strong line of defense.

A great deal of jealousy is creeping into politics in Texas, and the wise and thinking ones are of the opinion that as a result of this feeling on the inside and the demand of the people upon the outside for wiser legislation and better stewardship upon the part of public officials generally that the future holds anything but perfect peace and prosperity for the democratic party in Texas.

The democratic party in Texas would be all the better for a general shaking up. As matters now stand there is too much diffidence among the masses. When 200,000 Texas voters remain away from the polls on election day it is a sign that the people have lost interest.

* * * * Farmer Shaw is not driving the Bell band wagon. He is only occupying a front seat and rubbing elbows with the real driver, who is Judge Bell himself. And Farmer Shaw is only exercising good judgment and his personal privilege in the premises.-Fort Worth

Mistake, my dear Gaston. Farmer Shaw never rides unless he is permitted to hold the reins. Judge Bell must be content to sit with folded hands or get a new wagon and a new team. The Dallas man would scorn to occupy a front seat in a political tallyho and permit another to crack the whip. The editor of The Telegram is not acquainted with the idiosyncracies of "these people."-Dallas Times Herald.

It will be noticed, in spite of the Dallas paper's prognostications, that Judge Bell is doing his own driving. Farmer Shaw is well up on the front seat, but Bell holds the reins.


