

FAMOUS ARTIST ENDS HIS LIFE

Gustav Fuchs Kills Self Surrounded by Pictures

MASTERPIECE FINISHED

Will Distributing Treasures Among Friends Had Been Carefully Prepared

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Gustav Fuchs, delineator of the Arch Triumph at the World's Fair at Chicago and various other notable structures, committed suicide at his East Eighteenth street apartment last night surrounded by his works of art which he had labeled for distribution among his friends.

A note left by Fuchs read: "My last will and testament, Nov. 6. This document to be personally surrendered to Frederick Rothschild. Minute directions for finding Mr. Rothschild followed.

When found, he was sitting upright in his chair dead, while all around on the mantel, the tables, the chairs, and other pieces of furniture were the fruits of his life's work.

Among the pictures ready for shipment was the artist's masterpiece, entitled "The Moses Column." It is a beautiful creation dedicated to the sufferers of the Russian massacre, and was willed to Jacob H. Scheff, president of the society for the relief of Russian sufferers.

Fuchs' latest work and the one which is still to be seen all over the city, "The Portsmouth Drama," was also found. The ton of this picture represents the czar, President Roosevelt and the emperor of Japan, while to the lower left hand are likenesses of the Russian peace envoys, Witte and Kosen, and directly opposite are the Japanese envoys, Komura and Takahira.

Although Mr. Fuchs had been in ill health, it is believed that money and family troubles caused him to end his life.

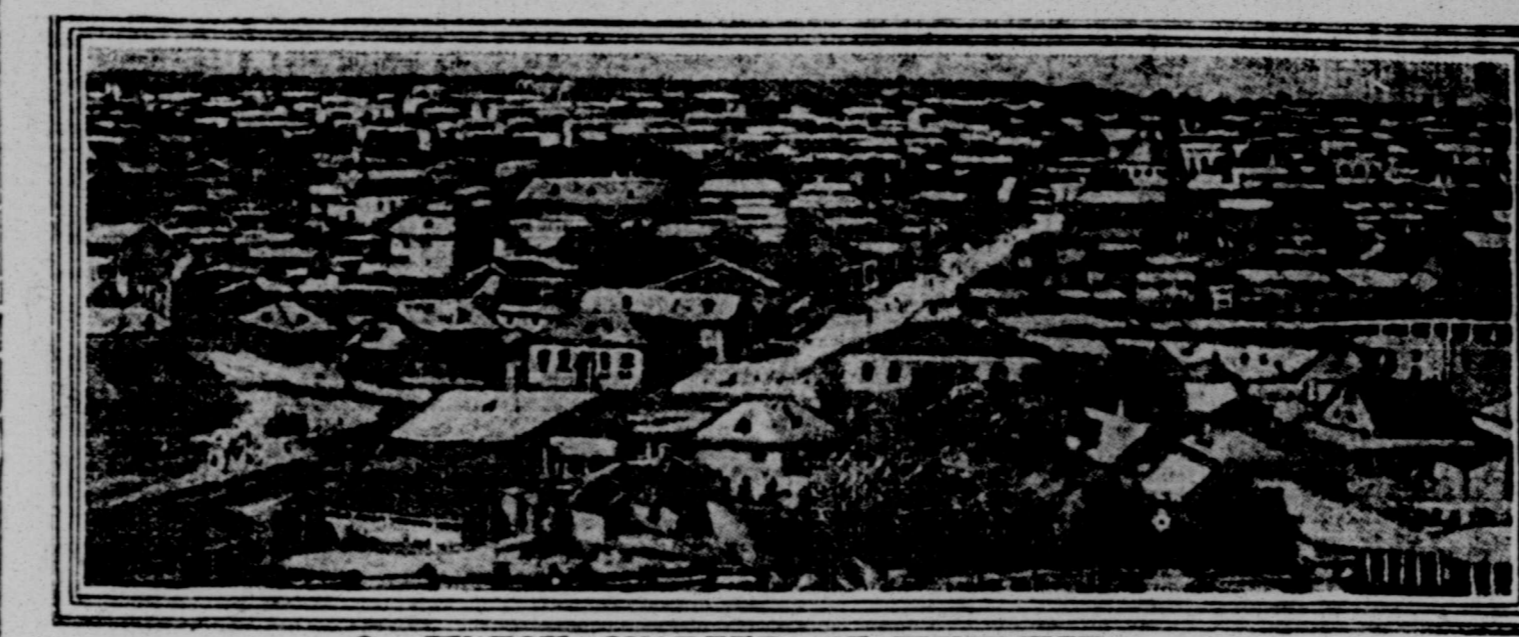

FAIR EXCURSIONISTS IN WRECK NEAR ALEDO

Eastbound Texas and Pacific Cannonball Is Partly Derailed Sixteen Miles West of Fort Worth

ONE MAN DEAD; SEVERAL INJURED

Switch Engine Helping Pull Train Up Heavy Grade, Jumps Track, Followed by Regular Engine, Baggage Cars and Coach—Relief Train Sent From Here

The eastbound Texas and Pacific "Cannon Ball" passenger train, consisting of two baggage cars and sixteen coaches heavily loaded with excursionists on their way to the State Fair at Dallas, was wrecked at 9:50 o'clock Saturday morning, sixteen miles west of Fort Worth, between Iona and Aledo.

The wreck was caused by the helper engine jumping the track. This engine, a box car separating it from the regular engine of the train, the regular engine, two baggage cars and one passenger coach, were piled in a mass of wreckage covering a space of about forty feet.

The wrecked train was coming through from El Paso. It was due in Fort Worth at 7 o'clock Saturday morning, but was running three hours behind time.

MAJORITY OF VICTIMS LIVED IN FORT WORTH By a Staff Correspondent. ALEDO, Texas, Nov. 11.—Eastbound Texas and Pacific passenger No. 6, known as the Cannon Ball, was wrecked about two miles west of Iona, Ariz., at 9:50 o'clock Saturday morning.

ONLY TWO PASSENGERS HURT A remarkable feature of the wreck is that out of 800 passengers who were on the train, the majority of whom were bound for the State Fair at Dallas, only the two whose names are given, received injuries.

WITNESS DESCRIBES ACCIDENT S. C. Massey of Abilene, Texas, a prominent contractor and builder, who formerly lived in Dallas and who was on the wrecked train, said: "I suppose the train was running at a speed of twenty-five miles an hour when the front end hit the track. I was near the center of the train and was considerably shaken up, but not even bruised.
