Attractively Decorated Tables Enhance the Holiday Feast—Statuettes May Represent the Greek Goddesses of Plenty—Toy Footballs and Turkeys Make Appropriate Place Cards—A Contest in Thanksgiving.

The sheaves of wheat in the natural state may be somewhat difficult to secure at this time of year, but if so the artificial sheaves with which hats are trimmed will serve the purpose quite as well. The beauty of this decoration need not be dwelt upon, for a little imagination will picture it. The wild grape vine or bunches of artificial grapes trimmed with dark blue ribbon may be caught to the chandelier and draped at two corners of the table; the wheat, caught together like a vine, falling from the chandelier to the other two corners. At the four corners the vines twine, slightly, about small statuettes of Ceres, the goddess of agriculture and civilization; Proserpina, the goddess of vegetation; Diana, goddess of the chase, and Fortuna, the goddess of plenty. The four goddesses may bear the four candles, shaded with purple and yellow shades—two in each color. The place cards may be small contributions like those laid at the feet of the four goddesses—a candy deer, to represent Diana; a sheaf of wheat for Ceres; fruit or vegetables for Proserpina, and horns of plenty for Fortuna.

Another and more American-like decoration may be found in the use of candy box turkeys which strut about the confectioners' windows these days. An immense turkey for the center may hold in her back long strands of narrow red, white and blue ribbon. At the end of each strand have a small turkey bearing the place card in his beak. For another turkey decoration the strands may come from beneath the turkey at the neck. A small American flag will serve as the place card. At the close of the meal each diner will be requested to draw his strand of ribbon from the turkey. At the other end of the ribbon he will find a blank sheet of paper and a small pencil. At the top of the paper will be found written a quotation descriptive of the guest for whom it is intended, and

beneath will be written: "Count your many blessings, Name them one by one." Thereupon every member of the party must set about putting down

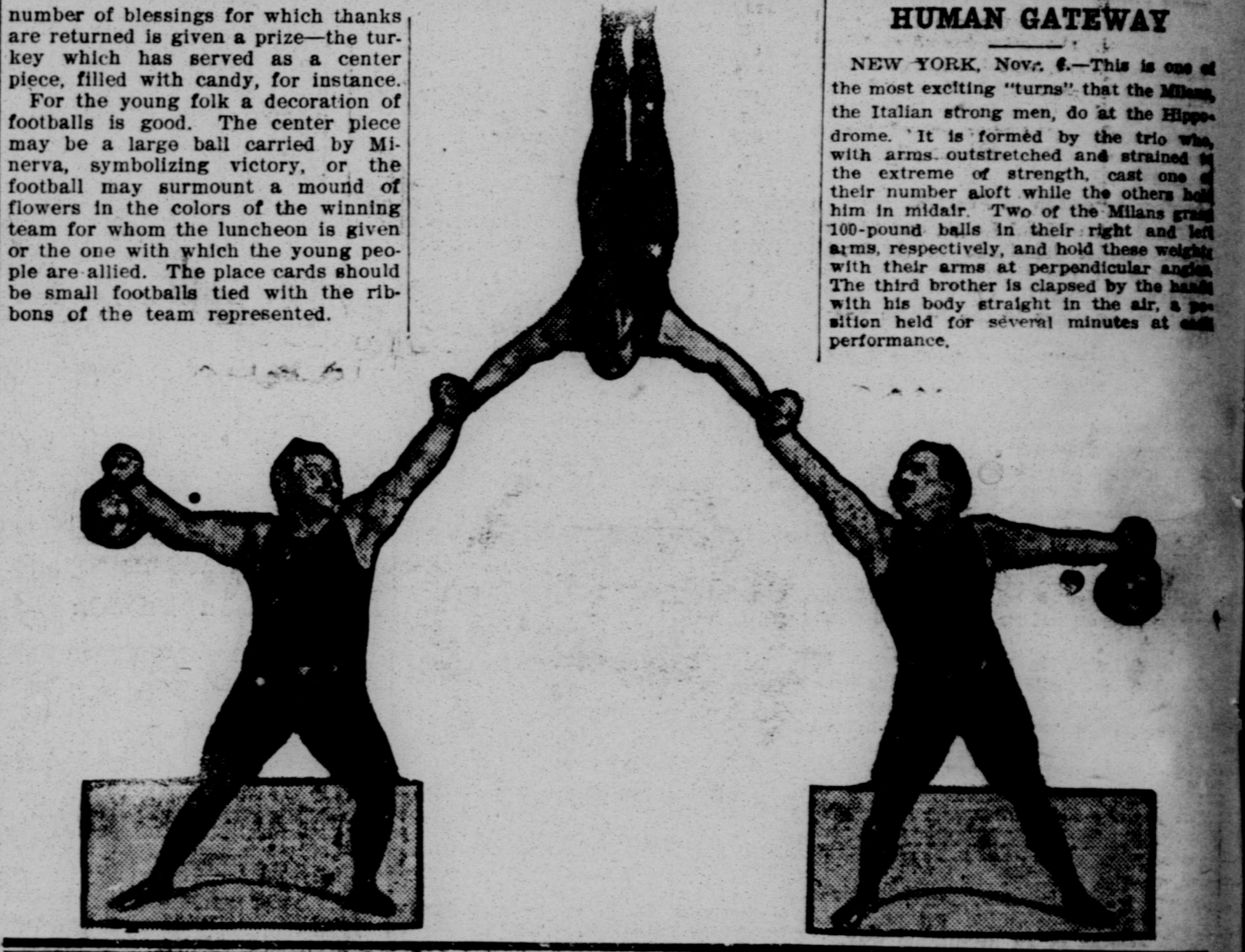
Rev. Ingram N. W. Irvine, Unfrosted Episcopal Priest Who Has Been Ordained a Priest in Greek Church

COAL BARONS HAVE PALACES IN LAND OF POVERTY, MISERY AND SQUALOR

Palatial Summer Homes, Guarded by Iron Fences, Set Down in Midst of Mining Fields' Desolation

READING, Pa., Nov. 7.—In all this land of striking contrasts—where half-starved children peer curiously through iron bars at the palaces of the rich—there is no greater place than George F. Baer's home in Reading. "Divine Providence" Baer! The name will stick until his millions have vanished. Out on Mineral Springs road is Baer's summer home, covering five acres and guarded by a spiked iron fence. It has another palatial home in Philadelphia, but the home in Reading, the first taste of luxury Baer won for himself as attorney of the coal combine before he became president of the Philadelphia and Reading is his favorite. The house is a splendid gray stone mansion, crowning a height and surrounded by trees and shrubbery. At the rear are the hot houses, the vegetable garden, the stables and a lodge guarding the carriage entrance. The grounds face on two streets and are laid out in formal pattern. Every tree has its own niche in the picture. Even the flower beds are laid out and the flowers planted according to a geometrical design. You see in all this carefully trimmed landscape the mind of a narrow, formal man.

Business Ability!
George F. Baer is a dutiful religious man—he is a constant attendant of the Second Reformed church. He is a member of the church consistory.

And only the other day ten poverty-stricken wretches, men, women and children, were arrested by special officers of the Philadelphia and Reading company, of which Baer is president, for PICKING WASTE COAL ALONG THE TRACKS.

The prison and law officers have not been able since to rub out of their eyes the poor, smug, wee faces of those little children behind the bars.

"What sort of a man is George F. Baer?" I asked Baer's pastor, the Rev. S. R. Biedenbach.

The gentle, kindly old minister colored up and remarked, hesitatingly: "Mr. Baer is a very capable man, very capable. He has great business ability."

But he discoursed volubly of Mrs. Baer and her five daughters, who are more popular than Mr. Baer.

Markle's Wallied Home

John B. Markle is not allied with the coal combine—he has money enough to defy it. Yet John Markle is the most cordially hated mine owner in Pennsylvania, next to "Divine Providence" Baer. John Markle attends to things in person at Jeddo, a town a few miles from Hazleton, which he owns absolutely.

Down in a basin between the mountains Jeddo crouches like a creature of despair, amid the desolation of wooden shanties, gray from the elements and the haze of mixed mine dust and sulphur water, there is one spot that is beautiful. It is John Markle's home.

Its huge iron gates are about ten feet from the stone office buildings of J. B. Markle & Co. Four fences placed a few feet apart keep you at a distance. Within the multiple inclosure trees and shrubs are planted to screen the occupants of the large, rambling structure. Drives and walks of fine white gravel, brought from Vermont thread the grounds. It is all so luxurious, so restful, that ONE STANDS IN AMAZEMENT AT THE CONTRAST BETWEEN WEALTH WITHIN AND POVERTY WITHOUT.

Plenty of Fences

The first fence surrounding this miniature paradise is of barbed wire. The next is a five-barred iron one. Then comes a tall screen of netting, such as is used to inclose tennis courts. Then there is a thick, prickly hedge. A house for his manager is located at Markle's front gate. It is a sort of picket to the more pretentious residence.

No More Nurses

J. B. Markle used to keep a trained

nurse at the hotel to render "first aid" to the miners injured in his collieries. SINCE THE STRIKE OF 1902 THERE HAS BEEN NO NURSE MAINTAINED IN JEDDO. Instead of being mercifully bound up or given an anesthetic to help them bear their pain, the injured miners are taken—none too swiftly—

to the city hospital at Hazleton, ten miles away.

In Jeddo there is a small wooden school house. The pupils are mostly girls and boys under 10. There is no library, no rest or reading room where the miners could spend a pleasant evening—nothing but the "company" store.

WHY WOMEN ARE IMPATIENT WITH GROVER CLEVELAND

Such courtliness as Mr. Grover Cleveland has indulged in, in his late article on woman's suffrage. Every few lines he "hopes it will not be deemed ungracious," or believes "it could not be deemed discourteous" for him to indulge in the view which follows.

This anxiety on the part of the opponents of woman's suffrage, to content the feminine gender with blandishments, arouses the impatience of women who are earnestly occupied with the question.

Mr. Cleveland assumes that women's sphere is mapped out for her by divine wisdom. One is reminded of Coal Baron Baer, by the ease with which Mr. Cleveland's theories merge into those he ascribes to the Almighty.

The most enthusiastic advocates of woman's suffrage are not so stupid as to claim physical equality with man. They do claim that woman is the mental equal of man, and should share with him equally all labors in which the mentality in particular is employed.

Mr. Cleveland argues that women are not naturally adapted to war. True, but he carries his simile into the strife of politics.

He admits that woman possesses the weapon for politics. Would he have that weapon rust? Does he realize that the women of the country are suffering from lack of mental occupation? Will he not confess that the rearing of children calls into play the spiritual and physical, more than the mental life of the mother?

General woman suffrage, says he is inexpedient.

How does he know until experiment proves the fact? Mr. Cleveland assures his readers that women are not the only taxed property-holders from whom the ballot is withheld. The fact remains that a woman's possessions are subject to law, in the making of which she has no part. And that is injustice.

Mr. Cleveland says: "A woman has the inalienable right of attacking without being attacked."

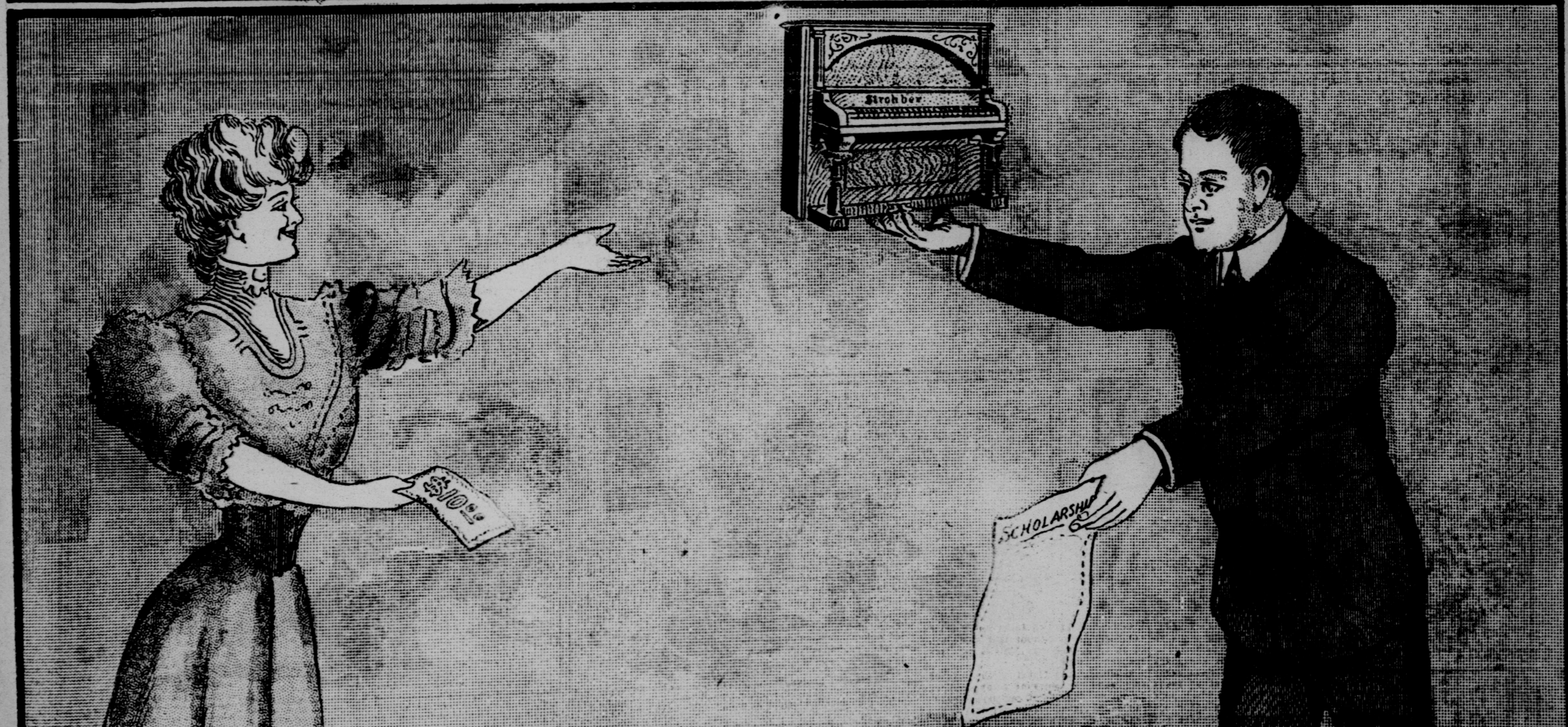
Mr. Cleveland is doing the latter himself.

Women do not like to feel that it is by chivalry they live in safety. They feel that it is by right, not privilege, that they should progress with civilization.

Mr. Cleveland selects certain western cities in which woman's suffrage has been granted and points out that no good results have come from it. There is always an upheaval and a disorder before the establishment of a great reform. What may, according to Mr. Cleveland's ideas of culture, be mandatory features, may prove, when judged by the broad standards of the great, healthy west, to be only the natural outgrowth of the putting of power in unaccustomed hands.

Only time and thoughtful experiment can show us the way. Just now we are groping for the truth, and who cries down our groping, however blind, is stifling progress and strangling the seekers after truth.
