ined. They will tour India from end to end. The peninsula is in itself a great continent, its length being 1,900 miles and its breadth 1,600 miles. The area over which the prince and princess will tour measures 1,850,000 square miles, and including Burmah, which will also be visited, the figures may roughly be given at 1,500,000.

The present prince and princess tour will largely exceed the 10,000 mile tour undertaken by King Edward in 1875-6. when Prince of Wales. The tour begins at Bombay, and proceeds to Rajputana through the native states of that district. One of the first points visited will be Ajmere, the only point of British territory in this wide area of native rule. Then the rente will be to Peshawur at the remote northwest, historic Delhi in the center of the Mohammedan area. and down the plain of the Ganges to Calcutta. From the plain the prince will mount 7,000 feet to Darjeeling and aftcaward will journey across the sea to Burmah; thence to Madras, Mysore and across the central tableland of India to Benares, and westward again to Simla and Quetta, finally leaving the country from Kurrachee, in March, 1996.





WHAT RUSSIAN LIBERTY MEANS

For more than 300 years the people of oppressed Russia have bowed beneath the yoke of the most oppressive autocracy that the civilized world has ever known. The law of the land has been embraced in the imperious Romanoff will, and opposition to that will has sent many a patriot to his long home, while others of lesser degree have been exiled and imprisoned in the gloomy wilds of cold Siberia.

The war with Japan and its disastrous consequences seem to have awakened the czar to the desire for real peace, and when his distracted subjects launched an incipient revolution, he surprised them and the whole world as well by immediately conferring the desired liberty upon all his subjects-accomplishing a greater revolution in Russia within the space of a few minutes than could have been accomplished by an appeal to the sword in the passage of long and bloody years.

But while the czar was ready to confer the bless. ings or liberty upon these people, the people themselves seem to have been hopelessly unprepared for

They have celebrated their emancipation by the heinous murder of more than 40,000 poor, miserable

It is certainly a strange comprehension they have in Russla of the blessings of liberty. Not only a strange conception, but a most unnatural conception. Liberty for self does not carry with it the right to maraud and put out of the way those things and those people whom we do not exactly indorse and

The Jew has had a miserable and sorrowful career in Russia. His existence there has been anything else but a halcyon dream. And now, when his heart has been raised up in the hope of the reforms it has so long hungered for, he only finds that liberty in Russia apparently only means license to kill.

In the face of these deplorable facts, censure of past Russian autocracy and despotism must largely cease. Three hundred years of it has proven insufficient to bring the Russian masses to the point where they can both define and appreciate the meaning of the word liberty.

Fort Worth must cultivate yet closer relations with West Texas. That section of the state is the most rapidly developing portion of Texas, and it has always been very rightfully designated as Fort Worth territory. Fort Worth and West Texas hooked together will constitute an invincible team.

opposed to a state election at this time. "It is only a question of time when we will take the final step and outlaw the traffic on every square foot of Texas soil. LITTLE TALES WELL TOLD

MEANING OF THE RUSSIAN DOUMA.

The douma, or national assembly of Russia, before recent developments was described by W. T. Stead as a horse without legs. The czar supplied the legs recently-liberty of assembly, liberty of association and freedom from arbitrary imprisonment. None of these things were embodied in the first proclamation of a constitutional assembly, hence the national dissatisfaction.

The members of the douma are to be elected in December, and to assemble not later than the middle of January. Mr. Stead says the electoral machinery is a Chinese puzzle. Each peasant householder has a vote for his local volost or district council, and every ten peasants can send one of their number to the district volost. The district volost elects members of the general district assembly, who in turn select the peasant representatives in the electoral college,

which will elect members of the doums. Land owners and townspeople elect their representatives in similar complicated ways. Mr. Stead estimates that the total number of voters eligible to participate in the election of the national assembly will not be over 100,000 (not including the peasants), out of Russia's 100,000,000 inhabitants. But 2,000,000

peasants will vote indirectly. Under the terms of the czar's manifesto recently the national assembly may rearrange the manner of election, giving real popular representation. Another reform granted is that the douma will be the judge of the election of its own members, who, under the earlier scheme, were to be passed upon by an imperial electoral commission, which kept the power in the imperial province.

STORIES BY TRUTHFUL JAMES.

SENATOR BAILEY ON STATE-

"I have always been of the opinion that two states would be better for the people of the two territories, and I am of that opinion still; but you people up there have by your actions demonstrated the met to congress and the senate that you want one state, and if you are still of that opinion, one state is what you should have."

"Are you in favor of that?" "I am in favor of it because you people know best what you want; and while I don't think it the wise thing. I will in no way obstruct the passage of a bill of that nature should it reach the senate."

"What do you think of the new bill, giving the new state seven congressmen instead of five, as the original Hamilton bill called for?"

"I am in favor of giving the new state everything in reason, but they should not ask for too much."

"How about prohibition?" "Get statehood first; minor matters will take care

Senator Bailey throughout his conversation plainly showed that he was in favor of immediate statehood for the two territories. It is well known, however, that Senator Batley is surrendering a principle when he agrees to one state, but he will not stand in the way of the passage of a bill granting one state since the people of the two territories have shown this is what they desire. He stated, however, that the people in both territories had been led to believe that one state was inevitable when as a matter of fact they had heard no argument in behalf of two

Senator Bailey was the leading opponent to single statehood in the last session at Washington, and the people of Oklahoma are glad to know that he will surrender a principle in order to satisfy a craving populace of a commonwealth of over a million people. Hobart (O. T.) News-Republican.

THE INITIATION OF BACON

Robert Bacon, first assistant secretary of state and former partner of J. P. Morgan, was recently initiated into the Kitchen Cabinet by President Roosevelt. The other members of the Kitchen Cabinet, we are told by the Washington correspondent of the New York World, are Gifford Pinchot, forester for the United States; James R. Garfield, commissioner of corporations; Senator Lodge of Massachusetts and one or two other close personal friends of the President. The correspondent writes:

"It rained pitchforks, and the President had a reception to the American Bankers' Association on hand. He got tired after a time and sent word to Pinchot and Bacon to come to the white house at 4 o'clock. 'Put on some old clothes,' the President's message said, 'for I intend to initiate Bacon.'

"Bacon is rich and so is Pinchot, and the question of clothes does not bother them much. They were at the white house at 4 o'clock in natty business suits, patent leather shoes and all that sort of thing. They found the President dressed in a very old and disreputable suit, with a rough rider hat and a pair of heavy shoes. The President looked at Bacon and Pinchot, grinned and said: 'Come on we'll take

MORE WORK FOR THE "BIG STICK"



The Fort Worth Record of Sunday morning contains an attack on The Telegram that for brazen effrontery completely caps the climax, and as much as The Telegram dislikes personal journalism, it feels that its own self-respect demands that it not be passed unnoticed.

The Record was caught in the act of aiding a deliberate misrepresentation. It published conspicuously in its holy colmuns on the morning of the election, too late for an expose, a petition for political effect, containing names appended thereto without the authority of some of the people concerned, and when a prominent citizen demanded to know by what authority his name was placed there, he was met with equivocation and evasion of the most exasperating nature. That gentleman, after waiting twenty-four hours, in vain, for an explanation, came to The Telegram with a signed statement of the facts in the case, and The Telegram published his complaint and his protest, just as it would publish the complaint and protest of the humblest laborer in Fort Worth who had been aggrieved in so shameful a manner. The Telegram is a paper of and for the people, and it knows no higher duty than the discharge of its obligations as a paper of the people. The Record says:

As to The Telegram, its publication of the slander was a malicious libel, for The Telegram knows perfectly well that the management of the Record would not falsify facts, or could not afford to do so if it were so basely inclined. The Telegram can offer no defense of an inflamed temper or of a persona! grievance. The libel did not slip in during a rush of news. It was deliberately accepted and deliberately displayed out of pure malice or cheap sensationalism. Impetuous persons are prone to rush into print with grievances, and many of them are too apt to impute dishonest motives, as Mr. Winters has done, but proper and self-respecting newspapers decline such communications

The Telegram would not have dared to publish such a slander against an individual, for it knows it would be haled to court as soon as a damage suit could be filed. In publishing the libel against the Record it convicts itself of a malicious desire to injure the Record or proves itself a common scandal No decent newspaper would have done it.

The methods of the Record are as ingenious as they are contemptible. It seeks to cover up the heinousness of its own offense by a malicious attack on The Telegram, but the thing is too thinly veneered to stand inspection. The motive is too apparent.

A small boy, caught in the act of stealing apples, always howls at the injustice of the world and the owner of the apples in particular, when his ears are boxed for the misdemeanor.

And the effort of the Record to read The Telegram a homily on journalistic ethics under such circumstances is as amusing as it is frenzied.

Truly, the esteemed Record, caught red-handed in the deliberate act of giving circulation to a misrepresentation, an eleventh hour misrepresentation of the sort a Tammany ward heeler would scorn as beneath even his shady code-is a proper exponent of the ethics of reputable journalism. The Telegram owes the Record neither defense nor explanation. The Record's own acts have placed it without the pale of decent journalism.

The Record has not yet offered any explanation as to why a petition, so manifestly prepared for political purposes, was allowed to appear in its columns and displayed under a heading indicating that It was pure news matter, without baving first investigated the petition's reliability if it was printed as news matter, or disclaiming its own responsibility if it was printed as advertising.

It is known that the Record displayed more than ordinary caution in printing communications opposing the Arlington Heights franchise and in several instances demanded the original manuscript together with the genuine signature of the author.

The Record has not apologized to the indignant citizens who declare that the publication of their names in connection with the "petition" has made them out hypocrites before their friends and The Telegram is forced to assert that the printing of the "petition" was a contemptible trick, immeasurably beneath the dignity of a reputable newspaper.
