

> NEW YORK, Dec. 14 .- The Times today says:

Information reached New York yesterday that President Roosevelt will probably send a special message to congress, asking for legislation designed to cover illicit transactions in the insurance business.

The message, according to the present program, will deal only with inurance matters in the District of Coumbia, over which congress has jurisdiction. The President, it is said, desires to set an object lesson by recommending legislation for the District of Columbia, which may be considered by the state legislatures.



"The money all went to the loan sharks," he said. "They kept threatening to garnishee my wages and I knew if that happened I would lose my job and be able to do nothing for the children."


Smith lived with his wife and two children in a cottage.
